#### Welcome from the Headmaster

In March 2024, the School welcomed an eight-strong team from the Independent Schools Inspectorate (ISI) for our long-awaited routine inspection. Such visits ensure a thorough assessment of the pupil experience as we educate and care for over 830 boarding and day pupils at Shrewsbury. As well as meeting and exceeding all the many standards against which schools are carefully judged, we were recognised as having what the ISI now call a 'significant strength'. This accolade is a rare bird: only about 10% of schools are receiving them.

The Inspectorate noted the 'extent and sustained nature of pupils' contributions to external communities'. Most hearteningly of all, they observed that 'pupils are kind and recognise the value of service to others'. In a competitive world, it is deeply reassuring to know that our culture of social responsibility and generosity to others is thriving. As well as the pursuit of 'serious fun', we really do believe in the 'Survival of the Kindest' – a compassionate outlook that runs deep in the Salopian DNA.

The opening of Queen Elizabeth Hall, our fifth girls' house, saw girl numbers hit the 40% mark. With co-education fully embedded, we continue to provide a diversely challenging, contemporary but traditional whole person education for life. We aim to foster future leaders who go out into the world with confidence to deliver change for the better. Social responsibility and public benefit are at the heart of what we do. Our mission is to educate and empower the children in our care to flourish in life and contribute positively to the world around them.

2023 – 2024 was another golden year for the School. We were once again shortlisted for the Times Educational Supplement Boarding School of the Year award, named in the Spear's Index of the top 25 private schools in the UK, and in Tatler's top five public schools in the land. Such institutional accolades are the fruits of all the endeavours of our pupils and staff. The Class of 2024 headed off from Shrewsbury to a starburst of remarkable destinations: 10 Oxbridge offers, 87% first choice offers at over 70 universities, in 8 countries and over 100 different courses. Two leavers became professional cricketers, two went on to Sandhurst, six to globally-leading music conservatoires and drama schools, 19 going to North American destinations, with both Heads of School securing scholarships to Harvard.

As well as enjoying a national reputation for music and drama, our sporting programme delivered some magnificent results. Our boys' U18 footballers won the English Schools' Football Association Cup as well as the Independent Schools Football Association Sixes. Many of the squad had also won the national U18 cricket title months before. We won two golds at the National Schools' Regatta and a host of county titles in girls' hockey and netball. Not surprising then that Shrewsbury was named 21st in all the nation's state and independent schools for Sport.

Such achievements are great cause for celebration: success is a magnet as well as an inspirational fire. But above all, it is the thriving spirit of the School that is most important.

This flows from the energy and values of the people in our community. With the economic and political headwinds blowing increasingly strongly on all institutions, not least independent boarding and day schools such as ours, we continue to value greatly the generosity of donors. Philanthropic giving is a driving force in allowing us to provide excellence in the pupil experience and pursue our ongoing commitment to widening access through The Means Tested Bursary Fund, with both its Help With Fees and Transformative Bursaries Programmes.

The more diverse our community, the fuller the experience for all our pupils. Investment in the site and facilities benefits our pupils and staff, and is shared with more than 50 different state school partners, through our nationallyrecognised Partnership and Community Engagement programme, as well as our ongoing support of The Shewsy, our youth and community club in Liverpool. As a Champion School of the School Partnerships Alliance, and a partner of the Foundation for Education Development, we are in the engine room of national efforts to drive school improvement across the education system. Whatever the political weather, Shrewsbury School is not just excellent, it is good.

In this spirit, we go forwards. We are profoundly thankful for the wonderful support of our donors and friends of the School.

#### From the Director of Development

On 24 January 1965 the clock ran out on the opportunity (if indeed there ever were to have been one) to resolve Churchill's opinion from 21 May 1928 on the capacity of education on the human condition: 'unteachable from infancy to tomb – **there** is the first and main characteristic of mankind.'

Challenge accepted. Fewer than four months from his death, on 18 May 1965, the foresight of the Governing Body of Shrewsbury School, believing infinitely – as I do – that education is the master switch for advancement in our world, brought about the establishment of the Shrewsbury School Foundation. It is thought to be the first such charitable foundation associated with a British independent school, and we invite you to join with us in celebrating its 60th anniversary this year, through the success of Campaign 2020 – 2030.

Our own Churchill's Hall (so named after its first Housemaster, Reverend C. J. S. Churchill) celebrated its 150th anniversary in 2024 with a multi-million pound remodelling and extension, breathing new life into fabric and form for the next generation of pupils who will call it 'House'.

As part of my many interactions with our wonderful Salopian family this year, I have been struck that this sense of 'House' and belonging returns with reassuring frequency in conversation, as people reflect either in the immediate, or a past context on their place in Shrewsbury School, feeling the authenticity of *Shrewsbury: For Life*.

Those like you who know, not only understand but believe in the voice, values, vision and mission of Shrewsbury, as it continues on its unbroken timeline since 1552 to lift the pupil experience ever-higher, and above the itinerant changes and chances which fleet through the short term chapters of our political fora.

The need to invest in and uphold our 473 year tome of constancy of commitment is never more apparent than now, and Shrewsbury School Foundation's success today, rendered through Campaign 2020 – 2030 welcomes your support to sustain and increase our progress. The Means Tested Bursary Fund, The Infrastructure Fund, and The School's Current Area of Greatest Need Fund have all enabled next investments in the people and place that make both 'House', and Shrewsbury, our home.

To remain at the front as a global leader of excellence in education, Shrewsbury must constantly move forward. Fees only cover the School's recurring expenditure, so Shrewsbury has always relied on the generosity of donors to enhance and optimise the School's environment for our pupils today and tomorrow. The result of this, powered by the incredible generosity of our donors, is that we have raised in excess of £2.25 million of in-year donations for the Shrewsbury School Foundation this year.

Moreover, this record-breaking success is coupled to our securing not less than a further and additional £3 million in pledge commitments during the year, meaning

that now, as a whole campaign, we carry in excess of £15 million in gifts and pledges – an incredible milestone to have passed on Campaign 2020 – 2030. I offer my unreserved thanks to all those donors in our global community of alumni, parents, friends and supporters who share in their authorship of this success for Shrewsbury School, and which we endeavour to convey, instil, and invite people to come to know.

You will find my own family listed on the Donor Roll in the Gold Sponsors' Giving Club later in this publication. We are proud to support the School in this way with a regular gift, as Shrewsbury numbers amongst our philanthropic priorities as a family. We appreciate the value and importance that fundraising continues to play as a vital part of the School's capacity to deliver its mission. If you wish to add your own family's name to the Donor Roll and join our global community of donors, may I be prompt in saying both 'thank you' and 'welcome'.

Planned gifts continue to be an important component of our income year on year, and we are humbled by the ever-increasing number of donors who choose to make gifts both during their lifetime, and a further commitment to the Shrewsbury School Foundation in their Will. In so doing, they become members of The 1552 Legacy Society, and we honour and recognise those very special donors later in this publication.

By 21 March 1943, and during his first term of office as Prime Minister - a point I prefer in his outlook on education -Churchill remarked that: 'You cannot conduct a modern community except with an adequate supply of persons upon whose education, whether humane, technical, or scientific, much time and money have been spent.'

Hear, hear! We remain motivated by your unwavering support, engagement, and generosity which enables Shrewsbury to remain strong as a community united in purpose, and with clarity of vision for its future.

## The Means Tested Bursary Fund

With its auspicious founding by Royal Charter in 1552, and subsequent identification as one of the 'Great' Public Schools by the Clarendon Commission in 1868, it should come as no surprise that the foresight of the School brought about the establishment, on 18 May 1965, of the Shrewsbury School Foundation. It is thought to be the first such charitable foundation associated with a British Independent School, and to this day, the Foundation exists to create, support and enhance the provisions of Shrewsbury School, including its commitment to the provision of Means Tested Bursaries.





Our Ten Year Global Advancement Strategy: Campaign 2020 – 2030, is ambitious, with a focus of supporting Means Tested Bursaries, whilst also welcoming some new projects alongside each year.

## 2023 – 2024 Overview


The School awarded Scholarships and Means Tested Bursaries worth £4.72 million to 375 recipients during the year.





204 (54%) of these were Means Tested Bursary recipients who received 75% of the funds (£3.54 million) distributed in the form of fee remission awards.

Scholarship recipients, 169 (46%)of these were who received 25% the funds (£1.18 million) of distributed in the form of fee remission awards.

## The 1552 Legacy Society

Making a planned gift in your Will, large or small, establishes a living legacy and a benefit to young people and the life of Shrewsbury School reaching beyond your lifetime – a bond which lives in perpetuity.

We will work in partnership with you to direct your support in precisely the manner you wish, and provide you with the opportunity to connect with the life of the School today joining our global community of alumni, parents, friends and supporters.

The Shrewsbury School Foundation is a charity registered in England and Wales (number 528415). All legacy gifts made to the Shrewsbury School Foundation are exempt from UK Inheritance and Capital Gains Taxes.

Your Estate can also pay inheritance tax at a reduced rate of 36% on some assets if you leave 10% or more of its 'net value' to the Shrewsbury School Foundation in your Will (the net value is the Estate's total value minus any debts).

We recognise legators during their lifetime through membership of The 1552 Legacy Society, so called in recognition of the School's year of foundation by Royal Charter.

## Campaign 2020 – 2030 Donor Roll






