OSGS - Campion Trophy 2013 Winner - Report by the President, Anthony Smith

The Campion Trophy Final 2013 was played in March, 2014, having been postponed due to bad weather last year. Anthony Smith (I 1954-59), the President, reports:



Winning through several rounds of match play golf, John Parker (SH 1952-57) and the holder, Mark Ferguson (Rt 1992-97) played the Final at Royal Birkdale Golf Club. On a day when the weather was initially cloudy with showers, but turned to bright and very breezy, the course was unrelenting. As one of the great 'Open' Championship courses, there are few holes that do not require golf of a high order. In the conditions of the day the course took no prisoners.

John Parker, conceding over 40 years to his opponent, started slightly better, and for much of the first nine holes was 1 up. However three holes around the turn went Mark's way, and although John was only 1 hole down with four to play, both the 15th and 16th were into a strong wind, and youth was allowed to prevail 3 + 2. A couple of holes were halved in splendid threes, but there were others that had to be conceded.

John and Mark are to be congratulated on reaching the final from a field of well over 70 entrants. John came through the Southern section of the draw, while Mark prevailed from the Midlands and North most notably beating previous two time winner Will Painter in the semi-final.

Mark Ferguson has now won the Campion Trophy for the last two years. As Bradley Walsh might say on 'The Chase', "Can nobody beat Mark Ferguson?"

Old Salopian Fergus Macleod to take up a conducting post at English National Opera

Wednesday 23 April 2014

Former Music Scholar Fergus Macleod (Rt 2001-06) has been appointed as Mackerras Conducting Fellow at English National Opera. In a feature article published in The Scotsman, he describes his excitement at being given such a wonderful opportunity to develop his experience and skills as a conductor. He also talks about the inspiration he gained from the Music Department at Shrewsbury School.

"There was a really strong music department at Shrewsbury, run by John Moore, who grew up in Edinburgh, and saw no reason why the school orchestra couldn't play Shostakovich 5 or Dvorák 9," Fergus is quoted as recalling.

After leaving school, during which time he had regularly played with the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain, he went to Cambridge University as a Choral Scholar and found himself conducting within a week of arriving. "It was one of these odd quirks of fate. My director of music at Shrewsbury had been very keen to help me conduct, and I had put on concerts there conducting friends from NYO, so I came to Cambridge having done quite a lot.



My college found out about this, and when, in my second week there, someone pulled out of an orchestral concert because they couldn't conduct Stravinsky's Pulcinella, I was asked to do it."

Besides taking up every opportunity to conduct during his time in Cambridge, including making his professinal conducting debut in 2009 with the Tokyo Philharmonic Orchestra, Fergus also set up his own contemporary music ensemble. He then went on to study in Zurich with Johannes Schlaefli before moving to Glasgow to take up the position of Leverhulme Conducting Fellow at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland (RCS). He has recently conducted one of the performances in the RCS's production run of Mozart's La Clemenza di Tito.

Fergus' Fellowship at English National Opera - a two-year post - will mean assisting the Music Director (currently Edward Garden but soon to be Mark Wigglesworth) in anything up to 13 productions in his first year before being let loose to direct a production of his own.

Fives: Shrewsbury retain the National U16s title

Tom Breese has successfully defended the National Schools U16s Fives title he won last year — this time with George Panayi, one half of the U15s winning pair in 2013.

Six Shrewsbury pairs battled it out in the qualifying rounds of the National Schools' U16s Fives Tournament at Eton on the final Monday of the Lent Term.

Jack Fox and Luke Lloyd-Jones cruised through their group of five, winning all of their matches comfortably apart from dropping a game to Highgate 5. Asked to describe their performance in three words, Jack replied "better than usual". Shrewsbury 3, the mighty Matt White & Stéphane Cotty, despatched all of their group without dropping a game but felt there was "room for improvement". Shrewsbury 4, James Harris & Tom Flowers, missed out on instant qualification; Shrewsbury 5, Rory Champion & Alex Bennett, won 2 and lost 3 so suffered the pain of heading into plate A along with Shrewsbury 6 (Leighton Webber & Tom Hart) and Shrewsbury 7 (David Clark and Ben King).

Those knocked out competed well in plates A-F, subsections, C, D and E; while at the business end of things, Fox and Lloyd-Jones - improving with every shot played - had a great win, putting them through to the next round.


But the fun was really beginning with Matt White and Stéphane Cotty. Having taken a very comfortable 2-0 lead with Cotty volleying with aplomb, the Shrewsbury pair decided it would be far more sporting if they allowed their opposition a chance to regroup and get back in the game, which they duly did. We all know that we teach everyone at Shrewsbury to play the game in the right spirit, but this pair was taking it to a new level. As the game levelled at 2-2, Matt White seized up with cramp. The sight of White lying on his back with legs in the air being manipulated and massaged whilst bananas and water were being forced down at the other end was a picture to behold. Surely the opposition must have tasted victory... But, wait a minute... new plan! Cotty was told to get out there and win it on his own, volley them off court! This he duly did. White, barely able to move, returned some critical cuts and they ran out winners 12-5, 12-7, 8-12, 9-12, 12-10 in the fifth game, showing tremendous guts and determination, ably supported by the rest of their year group. We were all exhausted just watching! Note to all players: please finish it off when you have the chance.

Sadly on Tuesday White and Cotty came unstuck, unable to repeat their death-defying performance of the previous day. Nevertheless they showed great promise for the 2015 season, taking a game from second seeds Highgate 1. Fox and Lloyd-Jones continued on their way, beating a good Eton 2nd pair.

George Panayi arrived on the swift wheels of a minibus otherwise full of Third Formers, he and his 1st pair partner Tom Breese having been excused the drudgery of qualification for the last 16 and Geroge having had a saxophone exam on Tuesday morning. On Wednesday, Tom and George demolished Eton 4, 12-4, 12-3, 12-7: clinical as ever. On the other side of the draw, Jack Fox and Luke Lloyd-Jones, who had been showing tremendous form and were continuing to improve out of sight, met Highgate 1 but were unable to recreate the form that had brought them this far, being knocked out 10-12, 9-12, 8-12. They were both very disappointed but are looking good for next season, a vastly improved pair who benefitted enormously from their time playing at Eton.



Friday saw Breese and Panayi back on court after a day off, playing their semi-final against Eton. These two were by now beginning to enjoy themselves: George was making his trademark charging runs up the court from the back. By the semi-finals, though, the opposition are not necessarily so easily intimidated: Eton waited for the charge then looked for passing shots and managed to negate the tactic. Tom similarly was standing well up the court on top step and was looking a little hurried. While not their finest display of the tournament, they were nevertheless good enough to see off Eton in straight games and it served as a useful wake-up call before the final. It also showed they were fully deserving of their number one seeding, having not dropped a game all season.

Saturday was finals day: Tom and George were up against the surprise pair of St Olave's 1, who beat Highgate 1 in the semi final. St Olave's gave it their best shot, but there are times when you are mismatched and on this occasion they were unfortunate enough to come up against one of the best U16 pairs to have made the final in the tournament's 34 year history. Tom and George were far more focused, like lions circling antelopes in the Savannah. They found all of the discipline and tactical nous they had put into storage before their semi. The score of 12-2, 12-2, 12-3 is the widest margin ever in a National Fives U16s final. Tom has successfully defended his title.

Their progression to senior level bodes well for Shrewsbury School, improving our chances of bringing the Williams Team Cup back, as we have relinquished control of it for the last couple of years.

RSSH: Inter-House Steeplechases 2014

Friday 25 April 2014

Matching last year's impressive 22 squads entered for the annual Inter-House Steeplechases, this year's event was equally exciting and competitive with almost every House entering an 'A' and a 'B' team for the relays. Teacher in Charge of the Hunt Peter Middleton reports.

The modern version of this historic event is a six-man relay of 1.5mile legs (4 legs for the girls) with the first leg runner being a Third Former, second leg runner a Fourth Former, third leg runner a Fifth Former, fourth leg runner a Sixth Former, and the final leg coming from any year group. In recent years, Severn Hill have proved dominant in the event, with the 2013 event seeing them take the 'A' and 'B' team trophies and also the trophy for the fastest leg (Huntsman Ed Mallett). In the girls' race, the past two events had been won by Emma Darwin Hall who this year were looking to maintain their dominance over the event.

The girls' race in fact proved to be a much closer race than perhaps anticipated, certainly in the opening stages. Indeed, it was Mary Sidney Hall who took the early lead with their tactic of going out hard, placing Captain of Girl's Running Lucie Cornwell-Lee in the first leg, opening up a gap of nearly two minutes between them and Emma Darwin Hall. In fact, it was MSH 'B' who were in 2nd place at the end of the first leg following an excellent run from speedster Jasmine Douglas. By the end of the second leg, EDH had clawed back a position, moving past MSH 'B', but the lead was still comfortably over a minute. The damage was done, however, in leg three when Tory Mobley got going. Her fastest lap of the day was considerably faster than any of the other runners, and as such the positions were reversed by the end of the penultimate leg, with EDH now controlling the race. With Tatty Hunt in the anchor leg – the second fastest runner in the Hunt this year – the result was never in doubt, and EDH came home to clinch their third consecutive win, with a margin of nearly three minutes. The quartet of Tatty Hunt, Tory Mobley, Cecy Price and Eliza Thompson continued the strong tradition of running in the House, and they were deserved winners of this race. Next year, of course, will see the debut of The Grove in the girls' competition which will add further flavour to this race!

After the dominance of Severn Hill in recent years in the boys' event, there was a sense this year that now their stalwart seniors had left Shrewsbury there was an opportunity for new challengers to emerge. There were a number of houses that looked to be capable of running quick times, with Rigg's tipped as favourites (according to their Housemaster!). The nature of this race with a runner from each year group perhaps suited Rigg's particularly well, given that the last three winners of the New Boys' race have come from Rigg's. Indeed, following the opening leg, New Boys' Race winner Owen Mock had established a 24-second lead for Rigg's over Radbrook's Sam Elliot, with Rigg's 'B' in third following a strong run from ever-improving Niklas Amthor. Sadly, Churchill's top Third Former George Garrett was unable to run as he was competing in the Fives Nationals, so the eagerly-awaited duel between Garrett and Mock was not to be, and Churchill's were severely disadvantaged in their bid to go one better than their silver medals last year; at the end of the first lap their squad were trailing in 16th position. What they would later achieve by moving into a podium spot was an astonishing achievement given their initial starting point from right at the back of the pack.

The second leg saw Rigg's further assert their lead, extending it to over a minute after an excellent run of 8.15 from Will Hayward (the 8th fastest of the day – a superb effort from a Fourth former). Ridgemount pushed through into the silver medal position following another quick time from a Fourth Former (8.28 from Charlie Home). Severn Hill began their challenge with Charlie Tait-Harris dipping under 8 minutes to put the house in 4th just a matter of seconds behind Rigg's 'B'. By the mid stage of the race, Rigg's looked to have secured the victory with an extremely quick time of 7.45 for Oscar Dickins (the joint second fastest time of the afternoon). Exactly the same time was run by Churchill's Ben Remnant, an astonishing coincidence, particularly as they had run exactly the same time at the Shrewsbury Relays a few weeks earlier. (The pair have developed something of an Ovett/Coe rivalry over the past few years!) Particular mention must go to Remnant who simply tore through the field to take Churchill's from 14th place to 7th place over the course of his lap. Churchill's were back in it!

The final two legs saw Rigg's further extend their lead with a solid captain's run from Toby Harvey-Scholes and a blistering final leg from Fourth Former Freddie Huxley-Fielding, with his time of 7.55 making it onto the top 5 times of the day and bringing home the team trophy and winning the fastest junior lap trophy in so doing.

Rigg's won by a decisive three minutes over Severn Hill, with next year's Huntsman Theo Clarke bringing his team home for the silver medals. He was just able to hold off the challenge of his predecessor, this year's Huntsman Rory Fraser, who had begun his leg in 6th place and had charged through the field to get past Port Hill, Radbrook and Ridgemount. He very nearly caught Clarke, but in the end, a six-second margin separated the two rival Houses. It was an extremely exciting end to the race to see Churchill's push up into the medals having gone into the second leg in 16th position, and Rory Fraser's time of 7.42 was unsurprisingly the fastest of the day, with Rory concluding a glittering Hunt career by taking home the trophy for the fastest senior, fittingly presented by OS Hunt chairman Peter Birch who had himself won the trophy as a schoolboy in the 1970s. In many senses, it was an emotional moment as Rory came up to collect the trophy, officially marking the end to his Hunt career, one that has been extremely successful, including multiple national team medals and individual titles at the County Championships and at the Midlands & Northerns' Championships. Rory has been a superb Huntsman, leading the club in a highly successful season, encouraging and inspiring others, and ensuring that The Hunt remains a very special and unique club, and one that seeks not only to achieve at a high level but also to maintain its traditions and heritage.

Thousands of eels released into the River Severn by Shrewsbury's Conservation Group

Friday 25 April 2014

A group of Fourth Form boys, who have been spending their Thursday afternoons engaged in a range of different conservation activities in Ridgemount Wood, yesterday helped with the release of some 50,000 glass eels into the River Severn – and were featured on BBC





Head of Biology Andrew Allott, who leads the Conservation Group, was contacted by Mike Morris of the Severn Rivers Trust during the Easter holiday, asking for the group's help: "We are about to catch over a million glass eels at the bottom end of the Severn in order to relocate them further up the system as they are unable to cross impassable barriers in their migration, namely weirs."

"Eels are an amazing species," explained Andrew, "They migrate to the Sargasso Sea to breed and then young ones (glass eels) return to rivers such as the Severn to grow to adulthood. There used to be large numbers but, like most wildlife, populations are far smaller than they were. One problem is weirs on the river, which form an obstruction to upstream migration. Another is water quality, though the Severn isn't bad. A third problem is excessive catches of glass eels as they move from estuaries up into rivers. They are considered a delicacy in some parts of the world. The aim of the relocation was therefore to get much larger numbers of glass eels up into the Upper Severn than would otherwise reach it."

The group are also planning to rear some glass eels in Mr Allott's biology lab for a few weeks and then release them. They will gain weight and so have a better chance of survival.

The Conservation Group have been working in Ridgemount Wood with Mr Allott and Dr Torin Morgan on several other projects:

- making steps to improve access into the wood
- making a path through the wood to serve as a nature trail
- treating Japanese Knotweed with herbicide to try to eliminate it
- clearing large amounts of trash, including discarded bottles that can prove a hazard to some species
- constructing two ponds to increase biodiversity
- building and putting up bird boxes
- stacking dead wood to form refugia for invertebrates
- making seats at points where there is a view or interesting wildlife to watch.



Shrewsbury lost their first game of the season against a strong Millfield side by 70 runs. After reaching 118-2 in pursuit of the host's total of 223, a mid innings collapse ended hopes of what would have been a superb victory. Earlier, fine bowling from George Garrett (9-2-23-0) and Harry Gregson (9-0-45-4) had helped to restrict a strong Millfield side to 223 from 45 overs, when at 178-1 on an excellent batting pitch, a much larger total seemed inevitable. Charlie Home (37) and George Hargrave (53) got the reply off to a fantastic start, but despite a battling 21 from Garrett, the rest of the batsmen struggled against the accurate spin attack, and Shrewsbury finished well adrift on 153-9.

Shrewsbury recorded their first win of the season on the second day of the festival, after defeating Oakham by 20 runs. Batting first, Shrewsbury posted 216 from their 45 overs, with classy half centuries from Lysander Adair (61) and Charlie Home (58) providing the backbone to the innings. Another healthy contribution from George Garrett (23) enabled a competitive score to be posted on another good batting track.

In reply, Oakham were left reeling by a dazzling new ball burst from Garrett, who single-handedly reduced them to 34-4. Despite several contributions from the lower order, Oakham finished 20 runs short on 196-9, with all of the bowlers performing admirably. Garrett finished with figures of 4-35, and Pat Jacob 2-34. Shrewsbury will look to finish the tournament on a high tomorrow when they meet Tonbridge.

Shrewsbury completed a comfortable victory over Tonbridge on the final day, to round off what was an extremely pleasing pre-season festival. After opting to bat first, Tonbridge were in disarray after exemplary new ball spells from both George Garrett and Harry Gregson. Gregson



picked up 3 wickets, two of which were to excellent Ollie Dixon catches, and a sharp run out meant that after 9 overs, Tonbridge found themselves 14-4.

Despite a recovery that saw them post 152-9, Gregson's 5 wickets (5-28), along with support from all of the other bowlers, meant that this was a target well within reach. Charlie Home and George Hargrave shared a century opening stand, but even though both fell just short of their individual half centuries (48 and 41 respectively), an impressive 21 n.o from Dixon saw Shrewsbury home with almost 10 overs and 7 wickets remaining. *RHM*

Athletics: Bromsgrove, Saturday 26th April 2014

Wednesday 30 April 2014

Coming only four days into the Athletics season, the Bromsgrove fixture was a huge test of the strength of this year's squad, and a great opportunity to put down a marker for the rest of the term. Having had only two training sessions, fitness levels were some way off what they might have been and technique was certainly a bit rusty in some of the field events, but enthusiasm was high as we made our way down the M5 on a Saturday afternoon that promised typical April weather: glorious sunshine interspersed with brutal but mercifully short downpours of rain coupled with some pretty bracing winds. (As a matter of fact, in each of the four years I've been to this event, the Bromsgrove sky has treated us to exactly the same performance, so we'd have felt short-changed with anything less.)

After an hour of warm-ups and practice (not to say 'initiation' in some disciplines), the events got underway. The first highlight of the day was to see Lower Sixth entrant Tom Knight (Rb) win the Senior Boys 110m hurdles in a time of 16.1 seconds, over a second quicker than 2nd place - a great achievement in what was actually a pretty strong field.

After the hurdles were cleared, the **100m** races began, where Charlie Tait-Harris (S) proved what a versatile athlete he is with a fantastic 5th place in 12.2 seconds in the Inters race (astonishingly quick for someone so proficient in cross-country and middle-distance events). The juniors found themselves up against a field considerably taller than them, and struggled to keep pace with the strapping six-footers from the likes of Rugby and the hosts. Nevertheless, Eldon Kwok's (M) time of 13.7 secs in 11th place showed some early promise here. In the seniors, James Plaut (S) picked up from where he left off last year with a cracking second 50m, only just being pipped into 3rd place in 11.5 secs, one-tenth of a second behind the leading two athletes who were tied. In the **800m**, Oscar Dickins (R) showed what fine form he's in after a great cross-country season, taking the Inters gold in a fantastic time of 2:10.0, while Freddie Huxley-Fielding (R) placed a very strong 4th in 2:19.2 – a great time for the first event of the season. In the seniors, Roman Faithfull (O) worked his way through the field to take 6th place in a time of 2:15.7, just ahead of Alex Shaw (Ch) in 7th. In the juniors, Monty Hardcastle (I) had a terrific run coming back from injury to take the bronze in 2:26.8.

Monty continued a fine afternoon for him with a strong run in the **300m**, placing 9th, before going on to take another third spot in the **Javelin** with a fantastic throw of 28.93m. In the **400m**, Oscar had another impressive performance, placing 6th in a time of 57.4, with Charlie Tait-Harris just behind in 7th.

Tom Knight continued his excellent afternoon to take 4th in the **senior 200m** (though winning his heat) in a time of 23.6 seconds. James Plaut ran even faster, taking the gold in 22.9 seconds, showing that he's lost none of his pace from last year. James is a central figure in this squad, and his performances today were a real inspiration to the younger sprinters in the team.

In the **1500m**, Freddie Huxley-Fielding led the Inters race from the front to take first position in 4:36.2. He'll be hoping to break 4:30 over the next few weeks, but this was a fantastic early marker. Charlie Rogers (Rb) wasn't far behind in third, crossing the line in 4:43.5. It was during



this race that the heavens opened, so both these two crossed the line more closely resembling drowned rats than athletes. Bearing this in mind, their times are all the more impressive. In the senior event, Roman again ran strongly to place 7th in 4:57.9, ahead of Charlie Godman (M) in 10th in 5:06.6.

The track events finished, as is customary, with the **4x100m** – surely everyone's favourite athletics event from a spectator's point of view. Considering that none of the juniors had tried this before, their time of 58 seconds flat, with three very smooth baton changes, was encouraging, placing them 7th. The inters had much more experience in this event, and it as no surprise to see them post a really good time of 50.3 seconds, finishing 6th. Ladi Okusanya (SH) ran particularly well in the first leg, as did Tim Robinson-Boulton (R) in leg three. It was in the senior event that we had placed our highest hopes though. A fantastically strong field saw us just pipped on the line by Rugby by one-tenth of a second, posting 47.1 secs. All four runners – Alex Shaw, Max McClure (Rb), Tom Knight and James Plaut – ran exceedingly well. This was a really good confidence boost going in to the Achilles Relays in Oxford on Wednesday, where we hope to be extremely competitive on the national stage.

We have tended to do rather less well in the field than on the track in the last few years, but there was on Saturday a real sense that Shrewsbury is beginning to make its mark in certain disciplines. George Day (R) winning the **Long Jump** in 5.42m was the highlight of the afternoon in the field – especially impressive given that he considers his main event the Javelin (which sadly he didn't get to compete in this time due to a shoulder injury). Elsewhere, Ladi Okusanya threw very well in both the **Shot** and the **Discus** to place 7th in both.

Though we didn't manage to take a girls' team to this event (something we hope to manage next year as girls' athletics continues to grow), Tory Mobley (EDH) took her excellent cross-country form – where she has been simply outstanding this year – on to the (less-favoured) track, to run in the **senior girls' 800m and 1500m**. Having taken silver in the 800m in a very encouraging time of 2:30.1, Tory engaged in a fantastic battle in the 1500m, remaining in second position until the final lap where she made her move on the back straight. Her strong finishing time of 5:12.8 was less significant than her tactics in this race, which she got spot-on.

The individual performances in this very competitive event were really pleasing to watch, but what I felt even more proud of as we embarked back onto the coach for the journey home was the really positive team spirit that emerged over the course of the afternoon, as our athletes watched, applauded and encouraged each other as they competed in their respective events.
