

Salopian mixed pair win National Fives title and make EFA history

Thursday 2 April 2015

In the National Schools' Championships at the end of the Lent term, Third Formers Daniel Humes (I) and Nina Lange (G) became the first ever mixed pair to win the Beginners Tournament in the 26 years of the competition.

Shrewsbury entered 22 pairs in the Beginners Tournament, including four girl pairings. Nina and Daniel played at 1st pair and battled their way through three days of challenging play. At midday on 21st March they eventually defeated Eton 1st pair by 3 sets to 1 in the final of the competition, to claim the title and make Eton Fives Association history.

This is the 14th time Shrewsbury has won the Beginners' Trophy since the competition began in 1990.

Nina was part of another historic first for Shrewsbury Fives earlier in the same week when she and her partner Tilly Reynolds became National U15 Girls Champions - see report: Shrewsbury School win their first ever U15 Girls National Fives Trophy.

Tilly Reynolds and her partner Sophia Breese also won the Ladies Festival Tournament, beating Shrewsbury's 2nd pair and fellow Third Formers Phoebe Wasdell and Lizzie Ware in the close and hotly contested final.

This is a great achievement for Harry, who also appeared in last year's NYMT summer production of *The Hired Man*. Competition for places in the National Youth Music Theatre is fierce; it is described by Andrew Lloyd Weber as "the best youth music theatre in the world" and boasts alumni including Jude Law, Eddie Redmayne and Sheridan Smith.

Harry has had leading roles in a number of plays during his years at Shrewsbury, including the title role in this year's Senior School Play, *Cyrano de Bergerac*.



Shrewsbury win English Indoor Rowing Championships

On Sunday 29th March, a team of four J16 oarsmen won the English Indoor Rowing Championships held in the velodrome at the National Cycling Centre, Manchester.



The team consisted of Jacob Rand, Rory McKirdy and Barney Fox from RSSBC and Matt Farrow, who currently rows at Pengwern Boat Club but who is joining Shrewsbury School in September.

They covered the 3000m distance in a time of just 8'44.2", beating Trentham Boat Club into second place by over 12 seconds, and setting a new Championship Record in the process.

This week, the cricket 1st XI.

It was after I had spent a magnificent day with my family climbing Todd Tor to view Lake Windermere that I became aware of the possibility that the sniff of summer was in the breeze. Upon my return to Shrewsbury I realised that my personal solar panels had been over exposed to the sun as a result of hat avoidance. I have been much more careful since, and not even the most powerful rays will get through my Gunn and Moore wide-brimmed extra large sportswear sunhat!

Having drawn attention to this most useful article of clothing, I would ask you not to look at it too carefully should you see me wearing it in the coming weeks. I have just discovered I am not allowed to hand wash, machine wash or soak it and if it were a small child I would say that it could do with a bath!

There are, of course, other signs of the imminent arrival of the sunny season. Stumps have been sighted all over the beautifully cultivated commons. Tulips are gracefully swaying out of the way of firmly struck cricket balls in their newly prepared beds. Cars near the nets where our top players are practising are beginning to resemble those spotted on TV in areas of conflict. Snippets of conversation around the School at this time of year include phrases such as 'he got one in the face from a nasty bouncer', 'he's bowled another maiden over', 'he's been caught again', and 'she just got back in time', illustrating the obsession with cricket rather than a social life of a dubious nature.



The 1st XI have already played five matches and the under 15As three. There have already been three centurions, as Oli Westbury dominated the XI pre-season match against Millfield which



was ultimately rained off, George Hargrave scored 100 not out against St Edward's, and Lysander Adair also enjoyed the hospitality laid on at Millfield for the under 15s. If we are honest, the Millfield game was not going Shrewsbury's way. But Oli was keen to tell me that as an RS student he did feel that the sudden rain storm was down to his influence with the Almighty. "I have always relied on God, Sir; I had to with your teaching!"

Having defeated Worksop, St Edward's Oxford and Myerscough, drawn with Millfield and lost to a very strong Worcestershire Academy side, there is a quiet confidence in the cricketing camp. Head of Cricket Andy Barnard takes his cricket very seriously. "I take my cricket very seriously," he told me. I imagined that our cricket professional Paul Pridgeon must be the one to inject a little levity into proceedings, but when I caught up with him to have a chat about the squad I quickly realised this is probably not the case. "I am a serious cricket coach," he said.

I spotted another important member of the cricketing establishment working on his wickets, Head Groundsman Andy Richards, and went to ask him about the pitches he prepares. "It is a serious business," he told me. It certainly is, as Andy has tried to inject more bounce into the wicket so that it is more like the indoor centre surfaces the team practise on all through the winter months. As a result, the modern Shrewsbury School cricketer tends to be more comfortable on the back foot, and perhaps that is why we have over ten recent OS cricketers who have played First Class cricket, including this year's Cambridge captain Alastair Pollock.

Watching the first team squad practise, it was clear that there are some 'serious cricketers' at Shrewsbury at present. This was drilled home to me when showing an Australian family around. The young man I was trying to impress is a keen cricketer. He instantly recognised the standard was exceptional and wanted to know who the fastest bowler is and the name of the best batsman. It is quite easy to show off when one can say, "That batsman [Oli Westbury] plays for Worcestershire 2nd XI and that bowler [Geroge Panayi] is in the England under-17 squad."

I was also able to underline Shrewsbury's prowess in the Prince of Sports by pointing out that it was a good day for ex-Shrewsbury school cricketers as James Taylor scored 62 for Nottinghamshire, David Lloyd scored 59 not out for Glamorgan and Steve Leach scored 110 not out for the Oxford MCCU side, although he did not get quite as much press as KP!

Messrs Pridgeon and Barnard are looking forward to working with the present squad. I sensed, despite their grizzled looks, the boyish enthusiasm that has kept them going this long is still there! They work well together; I was going to say a bit like Morse and Lewis but actually more like Morse and Morse. They described the present crop of players as "young and promising".

The squad are also full of eager anticipation for the season ahead. New signing Dan Lloyd has enjoyed the set up at Shrewsbury and on the Tuesday he told me he would be relieved when he had taken his first wicket. I noticed Oli Westbury at prayer and sure enough, on Wednesday against Myerscough his wish was granted. Similarly, Harry Adair who was striking the ball with great confidence in the nets on Tuesday, admitted to me in confidence that he would like to score more runs than he had thus far this season. Oli Westbury was listening in, dropped to his knees, and Harry scored 70 on Wednesday against Myerscough.

The success of this team will be no miracle, although they may make a pilgrimage to Lourdes/Lords? It will be down to an abundance of natural talent, good coaching, confidence and serious enthusiasm for the game. The news 100 years ago: 10th - 17th April 1915

Friday 17 April 2015

This week we remember:

Private Charles Grundy, 51170, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (Eastern Ontario Regiment).

Head of House in Hall's (now Rigg's), he left in 1897. He went to New College Oxford and, after taking his degree in 1900, studied law and eventually became a solicitor. He emigrated to Kootenay, British Columbia, and in October 1914 enlisted in Princess Patricia's Regt. Killed in action while on duty in the trenches near St Julien in Belgium, 17th April 1915 aged 36 Remembered on Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial, Belgium. Panel 10.

Of interest is the number of Salopians who, having served in the O.T.C. at school, enlisted as Soldiers rather than taking up a Commission as an Officer. In the early stages of the war when older men were still enlisting, it was not uncommon to find an Oxbridge graduate, now a professional (as in Charles Grundy, remembered today), enlisting as a Private.

As for the effect of teachers on their pupils: "He kept on lecturing us in the PT classes until we marched out under his leadership down to the local office to enlist. I can still see him, his eyes peering at us through his spectacles and his voice trembling with emotion as he asked "You'll all go, won't you, lads?" (All Quiet on the Western Front, Erich Maria Remarque.)



Success in Chemistry Olympiad 2015

Monday 20 April 2015

Twenty-four Sixth Form students took part in Round 1 of the International Chemistry Olympiad. This year there were 23 students from Lower Sixth and one from the Upper Sixth. The results were outstanding, with three gold, ten silver and five bronze medals being awarded.

This competition is designed to challenge and stimulate the most talented young chemists in the country, and is open to all post-16 students in the UK. There are three rounds to the competition, at the end of which the UK team is selected to train for, and compete in, the International Chemistry Olympiad.

The paper itself is based on the core of the Chemistry A-level specifications, so that students taking any of the different exam board A-levels can compete fairly. The exam lasts two hours and is composed of a series of structured questions designed to stretch able students by making them apply the principles they have learnt to new and often more complex situations than they would meet in their A-level course. Thus, in order to score marks, it is essential to have a very sound base of knowledge and understanding, but also have the ability to think and reason - often "outside the box" - at a high level.

The students concerned worked at this, attending a weekly session since last June, initially taking the on-line LVI Chemistry Olympiad, and then beginning intensive preparation for the more demanding Olympiad itself, which they sat in February.

The Richard Hillary Essay competition provides an opportunity for Sixth Formers to spend two hours pitting their wits against a one-word essay title. The event was modelled on the historic competition undertaken to select fellows of All Souls College, Oxford. Thirty-four pupils volunteered to take part last term, and each competitor opened an envelope on their exam desk to reveal this year's one-word title, "Power".

The competition was judged by Dr Mark Wormald, Old Salopian and Senior Tutor of Pembroke College, Cambridge. The winner was Loren Kell (EDH LVI), with Olivia Bradley (EDH UVI), Dan Edwards (S UVI) and Jonathan Trenchard (S UVI) all highly commended.

Last week then saw the Junior Essay Prize take place, with 70 pupils from the Third and Fourth Forms taking part. They had to choose one title from a range of over 20, covering all subjects. The choice included 'Should we believe in life after death?', 'What makes Great Art?', 'Are renewable fuels worth the investment?' and 'What makes a great hero in literature?'.

The name of the winner will emerge later in the term, and the prize will be awarded on Speech Day alongside the Richard Hillary Essay Medal.

Recipient of one of these was Peter Birch on behalf of C. R. Birch & Son.

Peter (DB 66-71), Chairman of the OS Hunt and also the OS Sports Committee, said that the award was given in recognition of 106 years of helping people. In contrast to the large DIY chains C. R. Birch provides a personal service, with help and advice. When the business was first in operation it was somewhat more agricultural, with the cattle market being directly opposite. They also used to deliver candles and paraffin out to surrounding villages. Although the business has changed and become more domestic, the focus on customer service and a flexible, helpful attitude remains. From his Grandfather, to his Father and himself Peter thinks that this has come naturally to them.

Sadly C. R. Birch and Son will close later this year - the end of an era. The business will no doubt be sorely missed, but it is very good to see them rewarded for the part they have played in serving Shrewsbury for more than a century.

Before a packed audience of Salopians in the Ashton Theatre each candidate was first invited to lay out his or her party's key policies. We heard from Daniel Kawczynski for the Conservatives, Emma Bullard for the Greens, Laura Davies for Labour, Christine Tinker for the Liberal Democrats and Suzanne Evans for UKIP - all clearly conviction politicians with strong links to their local constituency.





Over the next hour our co-chairs Dan Edwards (S UVI) and Esmé O'Keeffe (EDH UVI) invited representative questions from the audience covering the economy, the NHS, education issues, the UK, Europe and wider immigration, defence and the threat of radicalisation and terrorism on our shores.



With the co-chairs adroitly facilitating fair opportunity to all the candidates, we were treated to a serious and high quality debate. Clear political divides could be seen in many of the candidates' responses, and thus all present learned a great deal about the range of ideas now to be found in the political arena. The thought of coalition came up here and there, along with the potential consequences of such an outcome on 7th May.

To conclude the evening the candidates were offered the chance to sum up their positions and to make final appeals for votes. After the formal hustings the candidates graciously accepted our invitation to meet students over refreshments and the political discussion continued for some time.





I should like to thank all five candidates for their willingness to come to the School to engage with our students. Although many votes were clearly sought and gained by each candidate, the wider highly principled and shared objective of raising political awareness and interest was clearly achieved and will have a lasting effect. It was a very memorable and thought-provoking evening - few of those present will ever doubt that politics and politicians really do matter!



The news 100 years ago: 18th - 24th April 1915

Friday 24 April 2015

This week 100 years ago was a sad week for School House — it lost both a Housemaster (the second Member of Staff to die in the war) and two old boys. Of those who died, some were involved in the early stages at Gallipoli, and others in the stalemate of trench warfare.

We remember:

Private Fothergill William Swinfen Cottrell, 288, 11th Bn. Australian Infantry, A.I.F. School House, left in 1909 and emigrated to Australia. Killed in the charge up Anzac Hill, Gallipoli on 25th April 1915.

Remembered on Lone Pine Memorial, Turkey. 33

Lieutenant Charles Stockley French, 2nd Bn. Royal Dublin Fusiliers.

Churchill's, left in 1910 and completed his degree at Trinity College Dublin in 1914. "Cheerful, unselfish, simple, true, Charlie was one of the best and most loyal of Old Salopians." – The Salopian. Gazetted on 26th August from the Dublin University O.T.C., 2nd Lieut. in the 2nd Bn. of the Dublins, he was wounded in December 1914, and left again for the front on 23rd March 1915, to meet his death in action near Ypres on 25th April 1915 aged 22. Younger brother of Capt. CA French (Ch), died 1st June 1915.

Remembered on Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial, Belgium. Panel 44 and 46.

Captain John Russell Pound, 3rd Bn. attd. 2nd Bn. King's Shropshire Light Infantry.

Maths Master, acted as Housemaster of School House, under the Headmaster. Educated at Merchant Taylor's School, Scholar of St John's College, Oxford, graduated with a First Class Honours. He was shot through the head by a sniper and died without regaining consciousness. The Salopian comments, "We are proud of him... and know that we have lost one of the most loyal and single-hearted of men". Killed in action in Belgium 27 April 1915.



Lieutenant William Miller Major Gilliland, 2nd Bn. attd. 1st Bn. Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers.

School House, Head of House, Preaposter, left in 1912 for Sandhurst. He went to France at the very beginning, was wounded and back in England within a week. As soon as he was recovered he was specially elected to go to Egypt.

Killed in action in Gallipoli 28 April 1915 aged 21.

Buried at Pink Farm Cemetery, Helles, Turkey. Grave IV. C. 2.

We also remember Anzac Day, 25th April.

6 Victoria Crosses won before breakfast in the Dardanelles

Gallipoli: The peninsula that was part of the Ottoman Empire, infamous for the death of many between 25th April 1915 and 9th January 1916 (now Gelibolou in modern Turkey).

In order to secure the sea route to the Russian Empire via the Black Sea, the passage from the Mediterranean via the Dardanelles strait was important to the Allies, who launched a naval bombardment followed by an amphibious landing with the intent of securing the Ottoman capital, Constantinople (now Istanbul). As well as gunboats and cruisers, there was much submarine activity, including transit of the shallow straits largely underwater.

25th April was the day of a major landing and intense fighting; no fewer than six Victoria Crosses were won before breakfast in what became known as Anzac Day.

However, after eight months and with no lasting success to show, the Allies abandoned the plan, Asquith was forced into a Liberal-Conservative coalition, Churchill was demoted from First Lord of the Admiralty and the remains of the invasion force were withdrawn to Egypt.

The remarkable Ottoman success in the face of its own crumbling empire formed the basis of the later Turkish War of Independence under Mustapha Kemal Atatőrk, a prominent commander at Gallipoli who later nurtured the fledgling independent country.

The attrition on both sides is poignantly remembered annually on Anzac Day, 25th April, in the Antipodes (ANZAC: Australia and New Zealand Army Corps), being the equivalent of Remembrance Day in the UK.

Approaching 57,000 Allied soldiers met their death in this campaign; a further 130,000 were wounded or taken prisoner. Around 11,400 of the dead were from Australia and New Zealand.



James Taylor to captain England in ODI against Ireland

James Taylor will captain England for the first time in their one-day international match against Ireland on 8th May.



Taylor (R 03-08), stands in for regular captain Eoin Morgan, who is playing for Sunrisers Hyderabad in the Indian Premier League.

The one-off game is England's first limited-overs match since being eliminated at the group stage of the World Cup in New Zealand and Australia last month.

"It is a new era," Taylor said. "Hopefully it is the start of good times ahead for English cricket."

Taylor, who made his debut in the same fixture four years ago, was recalled to the England team on their tour of Sri Lanka in December and has played in all of their ODIs since.

In 17 matches, he has made 492 runs at an average of 35.14, with a highest score of 98 not out, made against Australia in England's opening match of the World Cup.

"To be given the opportunity to lead your country is a huge honour," said Taylor, who has captained Nottinghamshire's limited-overs teams and the England Lions. "It's going to be brilliant leading an England team in a one-day international."

'Built Heritage' Award for Shrewsbury School

Shrewsbury School has been given a Built Heritage Award by the town's Mayor, Councillor Beverley Baker, at this year's Mayor's Awards ceremony - a tribute to the care that has been taken with recent building projects such as the Yale Boat House and the new Academic Block. An excuse for a sneak preview inside the new building...

The awards are presented to organisations, groups, individuals and businesses whose achievements have benefitted the town of Shrewsbury.

In introducing the award, the Mayor paid tribute to the School for the way in which its recent building projects have enhanced the town: "It goes without saying that Shrewsbury School has one of the most visually prominent sites in the town and any development on the site has the potential of having a dramatic impact on the vistas of Shrewsbury and the Conservation Area. Over the last few years we have seen a number of high profile building projects; the Shrewsbury School Boat House Extension, the New Teaching Block, Replacement of Stained Glass Windows in the Chapel, a new accommodation block for the girls, to name a few. All have been carried out in a very respectful manner, slotting new next to old whilst maintaining the character of the area."

Jon Taylor, Shrewsbury School's Head of Estates, has responsibility for the project management of all the School's building projects, overseeing the works from initial design and planning stages, through every phase of the building works, to the time when the doors are finally opened to pupils and staff – and indeed beyond, as he also oversees the work of the School's Estates and Maintenance Teams, who look after the ongoing day-to-day running of all the School's buildings and grounds.

He is very conscious of the fact that the School site is not only historic but also sits in a wider Conservation Area. "We are the custodians of the site for a short period of time, so it's really



important that everything we do to it while it is in our care is an enhancement rather than detrimental. We work closely with the Shropshire Council Planning Committee and there is lots of discussion from the very early stages of our new building projects with all interested parties."

Great care has been taken with the building of the new 19-classroom Academic Block, for example, to ensure that it not only provides a quality teaching environment but also that it fits and blends well with the other buildings on the site – particularly with Oldham's Hall, one of the most attractive buildings on the site and immediately adjacent. "It's a modern building – designed by Old Salopian Adrian James (S 1976-80) – but simple and solid-looking in its design and with a colour palette that ties in as closely as possible to Oldham's. We've been very careful, for example, with details like matching not only the brick colour of Oldham's but also the colour of the mortar."

With at least three or four site visits a week since building began last July and daily consultations with the building contractors Paveaways, even on details like the length of screws being used, Jon has ensured that the building is on target for completion in July. Decorating work is now going on inside, the boiler plant is being commissioned, lights fixed, doors hung and furniture being ordered, including the all-important new chairs, which have been selected following a pupil and staff vote on five possible samples (which revealed a clear and comfortable winner).
