Our Head of School regularly writes in <u>The Salopian</u> towards the end of their tenure. This article was originally printed in the Summer 2011 edition.



As I write this, less than five days away from my last timetabled lesson, my time as a Salopian is fast nearing its end. My brother Rob and I are the last of four siblings to have passed through the School so the end of term will also mark the end of a nine year family connection. Afternoons spent watching regattas, and my first nerve-wracking experiences of Shrewsbury in auditions and entrance exams now seem a very long time ago. So now, five years on, what feelings will I take away with me about my time at Shrewsbury?

Above all, I will look back on five years of fantastic opportunity, whether that be in the form of football and rugby tours to Spain and

Italy, two-week runs at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival or trips to Prague and Bordeaux. Perhaps just as important as these experiences themselves is what they have done for me as a person. Certainly, as a somewhat shy third form clarinettist, I would not have seen myself getting up on stage four years later with school friends to play at the Big Chill Festival.

For me, it is this emphasis on a more rounded education, rather than one focused entirely on the classroom, that has made my time here so enjoyable. With the recent arrival of girls in the sixth form and a new headmaster, much has been made of the changes that have taken place. But for all these changes, that indefinable 'Salopian spirit', which was clear to see during my brothers' time here, still remains and will remain with me after I have left. For all my very positive experiences here, I certainly feel ready to move on, and this is something for which I feel my time at Shrewsbury has prepared me very well.

Beekeeping at Shrewsbury

The following article was originally published in the Summer 2011 edition of <u>The</u> Salopian.

Geoffrey Hopkinson's interesting article in the June edition of Beekeeping Quarterly on "The Decline in School Beekeeping" and his mention of Shrewsbury School prompts me to review the history of the School's Beekeeping Society and to outline some of the problems we now face.

The Shrewsbury School Beekeeping Society was founded in 1974 by myself and a colleague. It began with just two second-hand hives but over the years it increased in size and was moved around the School site, finally ending up in the orchard of a boarding house and an adjacent woodland. Numbers of boys taking part varied. Some years they exceeded twenty; at that time, the ethos of the School was very much to encourage extra-curricular activities such as beekeeping, but fitting meetings into a crowded School timetable was not easy. However, the problem was largely resolved in about 1977 when the School instituted a 'Societies Hour' after lunch on Mondays, with a corresponding reduction in time allocated to sport.

The programme was straightforward. During the winter terms, we offered a course of lectures based on the British Beekeepers' Association Junior syllabus. In summer, there was practical instruction in hive management. Towards the end of the summer term, boys took the Junior exam – twenty written questions and a ten-minute interview with Geoffrey Hopkinson, for whose help and encouragement we were most grateful. Nearly all pupils passed and were awarded the Junior certificate as well as the School's beekeeping tie.

The Junior syllabus was later extended to include a requirement that pupils should keep a diary. While this accords with good practice, it proved unpopular with students whose pleasure in beekeeping gave them the chance to get away from the exigencies of academic work; they were not prepared to do it and the Junior exam was dropped. This did not, however, diminish our activities.

I look back with nostalgia at those early years. Hives produced an average of 30 pounds of honey, which was sold in the School shop to fund the purchase of equipment. There were no varroa mites and little evidence of disease. We took off supers (separate boxes placed above the hive chamber, which have a series of shallow combs where bees store extra honey) in September at the beginning of the Michaelmas term and hives were given sugar syrup if needed to help them gain extra stores for overwintering — usually it was not. During the summer, some inspection of hives took place as part of the instruction on swarm control, but generally the hives were left undisturbed and combs lasted from one year to the next. The Shropshire Beekeeping Association were very supportive and welcomed small groups at their apiary meetings.

Running a school beekeeping society has certainly become more demanding in recent years. There are two main reasons for this. In the first place, students face increased academic pressure, while sport seems to receive greater emphasis. Changes to the academic timetable have reduced the Societies Hour to 45 minutes, which is not really enough for in-depth study of a number of colonies. Then the advent of computers and the Internet are compelling distractions; a boy needs to be really keen to leave his console for the apiary.



For staff, too, running the Society has become much more demanding. Fewer hives come through the winter than was the case previously and we have become increasingly dependent on splitting colonies that survive or on swarms to repopulate them. Much of the work has to be carried out in holiday time, for example, taking off supers in July, putting on Apiguard in August and preparing feed. Whereas in the past, we seldom had to replace brood comb, the need to make up large numbers of new combs with foundation takes up time and is costly. At least this is a good winter activity for members, who also make candles and brew mead, along with more formal instruction.

Despite the difficulties, our Beekeeping Society continues to attract a number of boys who either have previous experience or are sufficiently interested to embark on a new hobby, to which many will return in later years. We are encouraged by the complete refurbishment of our store and extracting room to comply with food processing regulations. We are conscious of the importance of beekeeping to the national economy – in fact, we are the only School activity that contributes to agriculture in both theory and practice. The challenges are great but we look to the future with some small degree of optimism.

A Level results break the records

Thursday 18 August 2011

Our recent leavers from the Upper Sixth have broken records with their A Level and Pre-U exam results.

2011 is a particularly tough year for university applications, but despite the extra competition, the vast majority of our leavers have achieved the grades they needed to continue to their chosen universities. The average UCAS points per candidate was our highest ever at 401.0.

Well above 99% of the exams taken were passed, and a record-breaking 22% of our exams were at the top A* grade. We had 160 A Level candidates this year, of whom 60 (38%) achieved three or more A*s or As, or the Pre-U equivalent, and an outstanding 13 students achieved three or more A* grades.

In total, 56% of our exams were awarded either A* or A grades, and 81% were awarded an A*, A or B grade.

Along with many other top schools in the UK, Shrewsbury will not be including its results in the press league tables again this year. Our curriculum now includes the new Cambridge Pre-U alongside the increasingly complex AS/A2 qualifications and the Extended Project Qualification. This fragmentation makes precise comparability with A Levels far from reliable, undermining the value of the league tables.

England won the four-day match by an innings and 242 runs

Ben has impressed so much at Oxford that he has already been named as MCCU Captain for the 2012 season. He has commented:

World Challenge 2011 - Malawi

Friday 19 August 2011

Please find below brief reports from Rob Wilson, leader of the 2011 World Challenge expedition to Malawi that

took place over the summer holidays.



Tuesday 9th August

After a long while without an internet connection, I now find myself on a hired laptop overlooking the sunset on Lake Malawi - it's a hard life at some points on expedition!

Last week we were in the small rural village of Thanthwe in Southern Malawi. We were there to help lay the foundations for a new building to contain a library and a new office for staff. Our help mostly consisted of collecting building materials from around the local area (bricks, sand, stones, water) in any container we could find (rucksacks, buckets, a broken wheelbarrow). It was back-breaking work at points, and was always uphill; but the team pulled together and got the job done. The community is also in the process of making bricks for some new buildings. These unbaked bricks were strewn across the school playground so we helped by adding manpower to clear them into one area so that when school starts in September the children have somewhere to play. Some members of the groups also taught some lessons in the afternoons ranging from English to Maths, German to Bible Studies.

The last couple of days have been spent in the Liwonde National Park where we were lucky enough to see elephants, hippos, crocs, antelope, kudu to name but a few.

Now; back to that sunset....

Friday 29th July

I am pleased to report that the team now finds itself in the town of Blantyre having all completed a trek across the Mulanje Massif. Our guide, George, who has lead a number of school groups across the mountain, said that the Shrewsbury team were by far the fastest he had seen, often making it to our nightly destination by lunchtime, and on a couple of occasions beating our porters!

The next two items on our itinerary are our project, and a safari in the Liwonde National Park. It seems strange to say that we only have two weeks left of the expedition!

Saturday 23rd July

We have now returned from the Dzalanyama Forest Reserve where the whole team completed a very challenging 4 day trek.



We now head to Dedza tonight (a slight change to our planned route), but will be back on track to take on Mount Mulanje next week.

Sunday 17th July

The team arrived safe and sound in Lilongwe at lunchtime yesterday. We head off tomorrow for our acclimatisation trek in the Dzylanjama Forest Reserve.

5th September 2011

The members of the 2011 World Challenge expedition have now gone their separate ways, some to university, some and gap years, and the remainder have returned to school to complete their studies. I am sure that the experiences of Malawi and the lessons learned there will stay with them for a long time to come.

I have already heard plans being made by various team members for exciting trips to far flung places in the not too distant future.

Walking Home from Mongolia - Rob Lilwall undertakes a major new expedition this winter

Monday 22 August 2011

Rob Lilwall (SH 1990 - 1995) will be undertaking a major expedition this winter: **Walking Home from Mongolia**.

Rob says that it will be the toughest thing he has ever done.

Accompanied by his friend, Leon McCarron, starting on 1st November, Rob will set off from the windswept wilderness of the Gobi Desert in Mongolia, and then walk south for over 3,500 km until he reaches his home in Hong Kong. As well as travelling by foot, the two will also carry portable kayaks in their backpacks to make use of the waterways they will encounter en route (namely the Yellow and the Pearl River, which both flow south for extended stretches).

A sequel to Rob's previous <u>Cycling Home from Siberia</u> expedition, the planned highlights of the journey are:

- Walking through the Gobi Desert as winter sets in
- Hiking along a deserted section of the Great Wall
- Paddling down the gorges of the Yellow River for almost 1000km
- Trudging through the snow-swept hills of central China until finally making it to the skyscrapers of Hong Kong

The exhibition will raise money for **Viva**, a charity which works with children at risk around the world and also for **Shrewsbury House**. Rob has been working with Viva in Hong Kong for the last year.

Rob says: 'We are aiming to raise as much money as possible to help these children, so we would be grateful if you wanted to show your support to us, and help children by sponsoring us.

If you are in the UK you can donate to Viva through <u>Virgin Giving</u>. If you are in Hong Kong or the USA, the donation pages will be coming shortly. This is really a major goal for the journey, so please do consider giving.'

'What You Will' receives 5* reviews from Edinburgh Fringe

The thoroughly talented young cast perform with zest and dedication and sing beautifully with some impressive harmonies.

Malvolio finally dressing up in black leathers and chains was hilarious and worked superbly, as did the simple white wrought iron set.

With powerful performances from the main characters and strong support from the remainder of the cast this was a production that oozed professionalism and was performed with energy and commitment.

Director Peter Fanning should be exceedingly proud of this sparkling production. I urge you to go. This show should be high on your must see list.

Broadway Baby Review What You Want: 5 Stars Reviewed by Fen Greatley

Shrewsbury School here lives up to its gleaming reputation with a technically flawless production. Their telling of Twelfth Night, cleverly titled using the play's alternative name, is of the highest quality in every respect. Gleaming vocals, beautiful couture and the work of, I suspect, a dozen stage hands feature in this show.

Most importantly, of course, the rendering of the plot is marvellous — never have I ever seen a cleaner, clearer exposition of the storyline; and Twelfth Night's a complex one, what with all the deception amidst the general tomfoolery and skulduggery.

It was a pleasure to watch, a real treat for the eyes and the ears. Each cast member possesses the necessary empathy and intelligence to really engage with their part and bring it to life. All size parts were artfully played, each actor bringing in something personal.

The role of Antonio was highly emotionally charged and for once didn't seem oddly under-developed. Gus Haynes's solo brought shivers to my spine, caressing every note and delivering it beautifully.

Maria (Hebe Dickins) and Sir Toby (Ed Key) are brilliant as the agents of conspiracy, as were the Festes (an unusual choice to have two, but having them as Artful Dodger types did work), Rob Cross and Ali Webb. The Festes' voices were the strongest male vocals, so it was wise to manipulate the role of Feste into a narrator of sorts, as it gave them more stage time and opportunity to showcase their talents.

Malvolio's melodrama brought the house down, his pomp and ceremony played out wonderfully. His singing style reflected his role nicely, overly florid and operatic, and complementary to Olivia. At no point did he seem like a boy or an actor pretending to be someone else. It was most fascinating.

A paragraph must go to our leading lady, Viola (Izzy Osborne), whose voice was heavenly. A heautiful actress, she captured the essence of her character fantastically, conveying the torment Viola feels at heing torn hetween loyalty to, and love for, Orsino.

The score is a real triumph. The script is cleverly and skilfully adapted into song form, with each song enhancing the emotions felt in what is really a series of private monologues, perfectly suited to a musical presentation. There are a couple of numbers with an inspired coming-together of the the play's themes, which gently reminds you what's going on and refocuses the dramatic tension, as well the wonderful duet between Cesario and Olivia that I'd been wanting, and a rousing anthem at the end.

The Stage

What You Will Shrewsbury School C Venues 15th - 20th August

If you are a die-hard fan of the Bard, this almost entirely sung version of Twelfth Night may not be for you. However, it is not without its own charm. For one thing, amongst dozens of glitzy musicals with trans-Atlantic Disney influences on the Fringe, it was refreshing to see one that had not only a live band but also a quaintly English feel. The set – white painted iron garden decor with climbing roses – reflected this, as did many of the melodies, which were reminiscent of the Music Hall tradition, particularly those sung by the two Artful Dodger-styled Festes (Ali Webb and Rob Cross, a fine tenor and baritone pairing).



Composer John Moore's vocal parts intertwined in rich harmonic polyphony and the young cast showed great ability for maintaining the key and time signatures, which were challenging at times.

Director Peter Fanning preferred a happy-go-lucky breeze through the synopsis to a thematic interpretation of the text; that said, the elements of farce were strong, particularly the Sebastian and Viola/Cesario identity confusion in the last two acts, and there were some toe-tapping numbers. Top marks to Shrewsbury's ensemble, within whose midst were some truly excellent singers, notably Webb and Cross, Izzy Osborne (Viola) and Sam Ansloos (Malvolio). Adopting the play's alternate title, this was an enjoyable alternative retelling of Twelfth Night.

Biology trip to Indonesia Summer 2011

Wednesday 24 August 2011

Please find below a couple of reports from Richard Case on the 2011 Biology trip to Indonesia. Thursday 4th August

We are now in Bau Bau in southern Sulawesi having completed all our flights. It has been a long and exhausting journey but all are well and in good spirits. Our transfers have all gone smoothly and in a few hours time we will begin a three hour journey by road to the village of Labundobundo (5 mins from Lawele on your schedules). We will spend the night in the village in local houses before our 5hr trek into the forest tomorrow.

Bau Bau is a small place and all are excited by the atmosphere and sights. As Ramadan has just started, the evocative call to prayer resounds everywhere and the local karaoke bar (which sounds remarkably similar) evidently stayed open for most of the night as the locals celebrate.

I'll try and report back on our jungle experience before we head for the Island of Hoga - opportunity permitting.

We have now completed our time in the jungle and are now on the Island of Hoga. Apart from a few minor upset stomachs, all remain in good health.

We spent three nights in Labundo Bundo with local villagers which was a fantastic experience. On each day we went into the forest in small groups with scientists choosing which groups we wanted to go with. Options included birds, civets, bear cuscus (google it!), butterflies and bats. We then trekked deeper into the jungle to the remote and lovely Bala camp where we spent the following three days. Highlights included seeing frogs which are so new to science they have not yet been named and the third ever specimen of a new skink species. We have bathed in jungle pools, swung from lianas and seen some great wildlife. Conditions have been tough. In the humidity it is impossible to remain dry, the terrain has been very tough (steep and muddy) and leeches were abundant. Fortunately, everyone in the group has dealt with the hardships with great fortitude (indeed some have flourished) and all have made the most of their time, enjoyed the experienc and learned much from the encyclopedic scientists on site (all of whom have trench foot after ten weeks in the forest).

Hoga is another world and the ideal antidote to the rain forest. It is a tropical, coconut-fringed paradise (search on Youtube for diving on Hoga to see for yourselves). Today we completed our first dives (a refresher dive first and, after lunch, the first dive of the Reef Ecology course looking at coral identification). We also had a chance to snorkel which is as good as the diving. On these first dives we have seen colourful nudibranchs, camouflaged scorpion and crocodile fish, banded sea kraits (very poisonous but docile sea snakes), blue-spotted rays and a multitude of beautiful fish, invertebrates and coral.

We have another three full days of diving before we begin the very long journey home. We are all looking forward to home comforts, sit-down loos and settled stomachs, but it will be difficult to leave!

Lapage rowing dynasty featured on Radio 5 Live & Radio Shropshire
