

Oxford awards a second OS undergraduate a German prize

We were delighted to learn that Will Hedley (Rt 2003-2008) was awarded the David McLintock prize in Germanic Philology. Will read German at St Hilda's College, Oxford.

This prize is awarded, if there is a candidate of sufficient merit, to the candidate whose final papers in Old High German they judge to be the best. Chris Minns, Head of Modern Languages, commented "Will was an impressive Germanist, who excelled in both the language and the literature."



Only a few months ago, we also learned that Alex Beaumont (SH 2005-2010) was awarded a College Exhibition in German from St Hilda's College, at the end of his first year there.



Alex was a Foundation Scholar at Shrewsbury, who was always extremely focused and organised. Despite attending every possible Oxbridge seminar and talk while he was here, Alex wasn't confident that Oxford was the right university for him. His housemaster, Giles Bell, thought otherwise, and eventually persuaded Alex to try for Oxbridge. Giles then had to apply even more pressure to get Alex to his interview, all the while promising to keep his application quiet, but he was confident that Alex would fall in love with

Oxford once he'd been for his interview and seen it for himself. Giles is unlikely ever to forget the phone call that he later made to Alex's family, which started with the suggestion that they should sit down before he told them some good news.

Chris Minns said "As one of our best Germanists in recent years, with a particular flair for literature, Alex is clearly continuing to impress."

Shrewsbury represents the UK at The International Young Physicists' Tournament (IYPT) 2012

Wednesday 15 August 2012

Having won the national finals of the IYPT, the Shrewsbury team went on to represent the UK in the international final of the IYPT in Germany during the summer holidays.



Shrewsbury School was honoured to represent the UK in the 25th International Young Physicists' Tournament which was hosted by Germany and took place in Bad Saulgau, a thermal spa town two hours south of Stuttgart. The competition ran for a week at the end of July and involved presenting and defending solutions to challenging open-ended research problems that had been set back in September 2011. We took an able but young team (four lower and one upper sixth formers) to compete against 27 other nations, many of whom have extensive and nationally

supported selection and training regimes, so we knew this would be a tough challenge and so it proved.

The team of Alex Facey (captain), Ratanon Suemanothom, Ed Elcock, James Brent and Alistair Fisher were superb ambassadors for the School and learnt a great deal from the experience. The lower sixth formers are particularly keen, having seen the high standards set by teams from countries such as Korea (overall winners), Singapore and Iran, to try to win the right to represent the UK again next year in Chinese Taipei. However, to make a real impression on the competition and to challenge for medals we will need to find much more time to focus on the preparation (this year it mainly took place during societies' hour when students did not have other commitments such as debating, sport or music ...). The team improved throughout the competition, finishing strongly, and in the end they were ranked 20th out of 28 nations (in contact with the pack chasing the top half of the field). There is no doubt that the team members found this a stimulating and inspiring experience, as did we! Even after the competition ended the New Zealanders and the Swedes decided to have an extra round at 1 am in the Stuttgart Youth Hostel! It is great to see so many young people excited about Physics.

The IYPT is not only about the physics competition, it is a truly international event with a number of exciting cultural visits, and this year these focused on the automotive industry that began with Daimler's invention of the car at the end of the 19th century. We visited the Daimler museum in Stuttgart and the Daimler Factory where the new V engines for Mercedes Benz are being produced. We also visited the FZ research facility where we had the opportunity to enter a 3D virtual reality projection of a new engine. The Zeppelin museum at Friedrichshafen and the thermal spa at Bad Saulgau were good too! The team were led by Martin Kirk and Steve Adams.





Meanwhile, behind the scenes, John Balcombe presented the UK's bid to host the 2014 IYPT in Britain (at Shrewsbury School) to the International Executive Committee. The bid was accepted and now the hard work begins (think London 2012well, maybe not quite on such a large scale, but we hope it will have the same 'feel good' factor!) *Steve Adams*

The 2012 Junior School Play: Billy Liar

Thursday 16 August 2012

The Junior School Play was put on in the Ashton Theatre in the final week of the Summer Term. This review of it was originally written for The Salopian.

For those of a certain vintage, the name 'Billy Liar' evokes images of a young Julie Christie in her black and white, photogenic prime, all cheek bones, pouting lips, and smoky eye make-up, and an innocent looking, somewhat bewildered Tom Courtney. For others too young (or too old) to remember the 1960s John Schlesinger film which launched the celluloid careers of this magical pairing, the Junior School Play in July, adapted and directed by Paul Fitzgerald, afforded the opportunity to see the original stage play on which the film was based, this time spiced up with the insertion of black and white video vignettes to represent the daydream sequences.

The play spotlights one day in the life of William Fisher, a bored undertaker's clerk who escapes the humdrum reality of his drab life through daydreaming; but more than that, he lies. He lies to his parents, he lies to his employers, and he lies to his two, very different fiancées, while trying to connect with his one true love, Liz. Sir Walter Scott put it so well; 'Oh what a tangled web we weave when first we practise to deceive.' This was never truer than for William Fisher, whose sobriquet creates the title of the play, as his world comes crumbling around him over the course of three acts. This play was ambitious material for juniors to pull off. But they did just that. On a remarkably professional set, Joe Bell took on the responsibility of the lead role. To play Billy just for laughs is to miss the point. Yes, it was a funny play, with many moments of laughter.



The older audience on the final night certainly appreciated the more sophisticated humour. But as Billy's excuses, lies and tall tales turn on him, we see a young man who's desperate for something better in his life; a young man who cannot see what he has already got; a young man whose dissatisfaction is to be pitied, as well as laughed at. Joe Bell was both funny and evoked our pathos. He played the role

with a softly spoken naivety which complemented his blustering father who loves yet is frustrated by his son. Ollie Murray clearly relished playing this part, and he did so to perfection, his flawless Yorkshire accent a wonderful pastiche which the audience delighted in. Theo Simmons played Billy's mother, Alice; playing a female role is not easy, and the pitfalls are legion. This was in essence a serious part, but it could so easily have degenerated into a junior version of Danny La Rue on a bad day. I am delighted to report Theo played the part of the protective mother with real sensitivity. If you find yourself forgetting the character on stage is really a boy, that must be a sign that the actor has truly succeeded in suspending your disbelief. Supporting cast members were all strong. Thomas Barthen as Billy's best friend Arthur, finally frustrated by the avalanche of lies, provided an effective foil to Joe Bell; Jamie Nugent as Billy's elderly grandmother, shocked by her grandson's shocking attitude to 'free love' (it is the 1960s, after all) delivered his flat northern vowels with the creakily thin voice of an octogenarian convincing the audience she would not be long for this world. (At a stroke, she wasn't); and Liz, Billy's real love,



paced and projected with clarity and astonishing maturity by Martha Pownall from Shrewsbury High School; she made us want to believe that the couple would live 'happily ever after'. The bitter ending, acted out so eloquently with no dialogue whatsoever, told us it was not to be. The video inserts were real crowd-pleasers, too. As director, Paul Fitzgerald's idea to use a different medium, shot in monochrome and treated with a crackly, old film quality, as the means for portraying another world was spot on, and the 'screen actors' – Charlie Duckworth, Will Bayliss, Jack Nelson, Ben Smith and Dominic Dootson – clearly enjoyed the filming process while the audience lapped up the light relief they provided on screen. Nobody, I think, stole the show, but two actors came mighty close. No-one will quickly forget the gloriously surreal catfight between Billy's homely fiancée Barbara, wonderfully underplayed by Guy Cabral, and the force of nature topped with a peroxide blonde beehive that was Rita, his other fiancée, wonderfully overplayed by Dan Edwards.

Backstage crew too all delivered on the two night run, Andrew Humpish and James London behind the scenes, with Greg Bunting, Rory Dootson and Nick Watkins on sound and lights; mention must also go to Mrs Bovill and Dr Samworth for costume and make-up, Alex Davies, Will Allott and team for a set which has surely raised the bar for future productions, and Miss Woo as the ever-calm producer.

A Levels 2012

Shrewsbury School reported another strong year for A Level results, with over 78% of the exams awarded the top A^* , A or B grades, which compares favourably to the national average of 52.8%.

There are many individual success stories in this year's results, not least the 7 pupils whose grades in all their subjects were at the A* level.

In addition, all 11 pupils at Shrewsbury School with offers from Oxford or Cambridge Universities, achieved the required grades to meet their offers and will be taking up their places later this year.

The school's AS results from the lower sixth pupils were also extremely impressive, with 66% of grades achieved at A-B grades. 40 pupils gained A grades in all their subjects and over 70 gained nothing less than a B.

The headmaster, Mark Turner, who has just completed his second academic year at the helm of this historic school, expressed his delight at his pupils' success.

"I am extremely proud of this year's splendid collection of A Level results, which are a tribute to the hard work of our pupils and staff alike.



"The outstanding set of AS results from our lower sixth pupils also bodes well for further success in next year's A Levels," commented Mr Turner.

Pictured leaping for joy here are Howard Stringer, Megan Cherrington, Dave Beeston and Tom Cousins. Howard and Tom both got 3 A*s (and Howard got an additional A grade too, just for good measure), and both are now heading to Medical School at Birmingham. Megan has led the way in accepting a place on KPMG's six year school leavers' programme, after which she will have a degree from Birmingham University, as well as her accounting qualifications. Dave Beeston's 3 A*s and 1 A grade confirmed his place at London's Royal Veterinary College.

Along with many other top schools in the UK, Shrewsbury will not be including its results in the press league tables again this year. Our curriculum now includes the new Cambridge Pre-U alongside the increasingly complex AS/A2 qualifications and the Extended Project Qualification. This fragmentation makes precise comparability with A Levels far from reliable, undermining the value of the league tables.



RSSBC: Bronze medals in the World Championships

Two Salopians and one Old Salopian row for Britain in the World Championships, gaining two bronze medals between them.

Tom Marshall (SH, 2012 leaver) and Harry Lonergan (UVI O) competed in the 2012 World Rowing Championships in Plovdiv, Bulgaria, where they were representing Great Britain.



On Sunday 19th August, in 30-degree heat, Tom stroked the Junior eight to a bronze medal in the final, just being pipped by Germany by a canvas. Italy won the gold. The Junior 8 is shown in this photo, with Tom in the middle of the front row.

Later in the day, Harry rowed in the junior mens' coxless four, but finished just outside the medals in fourth position.

It is a huge achievement for any boy to be selected for the GB team, and we are extremely proud to have had two Salopians in the 2012 GB Junior Team.

The staff particularly enjoyed handing out the results to some delighted pupils who returned to school early in the morning to find out how well they had done (seem photo below).

An outstanding 44% of Shrewsbury School's GCSE grades were awarded the top A* grade, and 73% were either A* or A grades. 41 boys managed to get either A* or A grades in every single one of their subjects.

The school's overall pass rate was 98.2%, substantially higher than the national average of 79.5%.


The headmaster, Mark Turner, who has just completed his second academic year at the helm of this historic school, was overjoyed with his pupils' success.

"By every criteria, records have been broken, and this year's GCSE pupils have set a new benchmark to inspire our students in future years.

Medic Malawi Community Service Expedition 2012

Thursday 30 August 2012

So, what were the highlights? For me, it was seeing the hand-painted world map take shape on a Primary School wall. Then there was the last meal we shared with the orphans, after a fantastically fun afternoon playing five-a-side football, three-legged races and musical statues... there weren't enough chairs to go round, so it was the Salopians who, uncomplaining, sat on the floor for their meal – and did the clearing up afterwards.



The plan is to make this the first of many visits to the Medic Malawi project. At the

orphanage, home to 60 children, we weren't really visitors at all – we were warmly welcomed as family, and all of us, male, female, staff and students, helped with the chores that needed doing – washing nappies, by hand, in cold water, for 10 babies, sweeping and mopping, minding the 20 toddlers, weeding the vegetable garden, cooking over an open fire for 60, bottle-feeding 10 babies and helping to move hundreds of bricks for the new extension.



Meanwhile, some Salopians found that teaching Primary School was fun, if exhausting, while others, belatedly, joined the adult volunteers who are digging the foundations for a new church. Work had begun at 4.30am!



There was a chance to do work experience with the dentist and the lab technician at the rural hospital which is next door to the orphanage, and to look at malaria parasites down a microscope. Important data about wells, water pumps and drainage was collected by the geographers.

The week before we arrived, a team of visiting British eye surgeons had driven their truck-load of equipment to the hospital and operated on over 100 blind people so that the next morning they could see again. Inspiring stuff, and they could do even more if the hospital had a permanent specialist eye clinic. Back in the UK, we had already raised £10,000, and it was great to see the space where the Shrewsbury School Eye Clinic will be built.

A few days of 'R &R' on safari, coming face-to-face with elephants and leopards, completed the African experience.

Old Churchillians Dinner: 30th June 2012

Nearly 100 Old Churchillians, wives and partners drawn of all vintages gathered at Shrewsbury on Saturday 30th June for a reception and dinner to celebrate the first 137 years of the House's existence – the foundation of which by the Revd C J S Churchill predates by seven years the construction of the current building in 1882. Since that time, of course, Churchill's has been extensively and repeatedly extended and modernised, but the essentials of the building remain the same. The latest



enhancement is the new porch and stained glass window designed by James Wade of Arrol & Snell, and the evening began with a champagne reception in Churchill's to dedicate the window to, and toast the memory of, the late legendary <u>Michael 'Fred' Hall</u>, well-known to so many Churchillians as a beloved and eccentric tutor, brilliant mathematician and head of the loved or loathed Basic Year. A plaque commemorating this unique man was unveiled in the presence of Headmaster Mark Turner, Old Churchillian Chairman of Governors Richard Burbidge, and current housemaster Richard Hudson whose speech of dedication included many personal reminiscences of Michael Hall. (In his previous career as a publisher, Richard published Michael Hall's autobiography *Around the World in Forty Years.*)





The company then moved on to Kingsland Hall for an excellent four course dinner. After dinner musical entertainment – a barbershop quintet, a re-run of the 2011 House Singing Competition Part Song and a ukelele trio was provided by current Churchillians, including their housemaster, several of whom had been invited to the dinner with the Old Churchillians. The noise levels as well as the quantity of wine consumed, particularly by the younger alumni, bore testimony to the extreme conviviality of the occasion. Former housemasters Peter Owen (1977-83) and Philip Lapage (1994-2005) were also of the company, and speeches were given by Richard Hudson, his speech constructed around quotes taken from the Head of House Fasti of which Churchill's has a complete set dating back to 1874. Richard Burbridge replied on behalf of the guests.

The company broke up, with extreme reluctance, at 11 pm, with many of the younger members continuing their celebrations in the town until the early hours.
