RSSH: Shrewsbury Relays, Sunday 30th November 2014

Monday 1 December 2014

Excellent individual performances and the first major victory of the new season for Shrewsbury's girls' A team.

Beautiful autumn weather greeted us in the Quarry as the runners lined up for this year's Shrewsbury Relays. A total of four girls' teams and six boys' teams were contesting this year's event, from Shrewsbury, Sedbergh and Adams' Grammar.

In a change to previous years, this time there were three separate routes across the six-leg (for the boys) and four-leg (for the girls) relay race. The shortest leg (legs 1 and 4) comprised a simple out-and-back route from the suspension bridge to Kingsland Bridge and back, a total of 1.2km, and dead flat. The longest leg (legs 2 and 5 in the boys' race, just leg 2 in the girls') was 2.5km and took in several hills, the toughest of which went from Pengwern Boat Club up the steep bank to Oldham's Gap. The medium-distance route (legs 3 and 6 for the boys, just 3 for the girls) was just under 2km, cutting out a couple of the larger hills of the long leg.

In the **girls' race**, Abi Attenborough (MSH UVI) in the RSSH 'A' team set out strongly but struggled to keep the pace set by Libby Hedges (G 3) for RSSH's 'C' team, who finished the first leg in 4:01, just over 20 seconds ahead of her nearest rival – an astonishing effort from this promising Third Former. Sedbergh's team started slowly, finding themselves in 4th position after



the first leg, and had their work cut out to stay competitive, but they did, thanks to a very strong second leg.

In the RSSH 'A' team, Tory Mobley (EDH UVI) had a cracking run in the long leg, setting the fastest time of the day over that distance in 10:33. It's clear that Tory is coming back into considerable form at the moment. This effort placed the 'A' team back in the lead, after the 'B' dropped back as a result of an injury to Rosie Davies (EDH 3), who nevertheless struggled through bravely to finish her leg. Sophia Dixon (MSH 3) ran extremely strongly for the 'C' team over this leg, meanwhile, in a time of 10:36 – only three seconds slower than the pace set by Tory Mobley.

At this point in the race, RSSH 'A' had established a commanding lead, with a superb run from Sally Joyce (G LVI) over the medium-distance course, in 7:31 – the fastest girls' effort over that distance of the day. Sedbergh were over 90 seconds back at this point, and the only question mark of the race order was whether they would hold off the RSSH 'C' team, who were nine seconds behind with one leg to go.

That final leg was dominated by Olivia Papaioannou (EDH LVI) for RSSH 'A', who ran a fantastic leg of 3:58 (faster than several of the boys managed over the same distance) to take the gold medal for Shrewsbury School. Sedbergh had a very strong final leg and took silver. Third place went to the 'C' team, 30 seconds behind, while the RSSH 'B' team took 4th less than a minute behind that.

In the **boys' race**, an early lead was established by RSSH's 'A' team under Charlie Rogers (Rb LVI), who set a blistering pace with his short leg in 3:22, which ended up being the fastest short lap of the day. Sedbergh were in close contention though, about 12 seconds behind, and in the second leg, Charlie Tait-Harris (S V) struggled to maintain his lead. At the end of this long leg, Sedbergh had closed the gap to just two seconds (partly through Charlie getting a bit confused by the route). Adams' Grammar were dropping back and at this point found themselves trailing by around 30 seconds, and continued to fall behind over the remainder of the race, but retained their position in 3rd, ahead of RSSH's 'B' team.

Will Hayward (R V) worked very hard to retain the RSSH lead over Sedbergh in the 3rd leg, after which we found ourselves seven seconds ahead – another gritty performance from Will who showed a real none-shall-pass attitude. Alex Shaw (Ch UVI) in the second short leg found the going nice and easy, but the competition a little closer than he'd like – his time of 3:36 to Sedbergh's leg of exactly the same time meant that it was everything to play for as Theo Clarke (S UVI) set off for the final long leg.

Theo struggled to hold off Sedbergh's star runner of the day, John Campbell, who appeared to be taking chunks out of Theo's lead with every hill. He was finally caught going up the steep verge up to Oldham's Gap – perhaps the infamously hilly terrain around Sedbergh gave them an advantage here – and Theo finished his leg six seconds behind.

Everything was down to Oscar Dickins (R V) on the final, medium distance lap. He set off at a tremendous pace, and had caught his man by halfway round the course. It seemed he was destined for a great victory, but Sedbergh's runner ran a terrific race and stuck to him like glue. The effort Oscar had expunged to make up the gap started to tell in the closing stages of the leg, and Sedbergh once more took the lead. Oscar had nothing to answer, and finished just five seconds behind. There was some consolation for him in learning that he had managed the fastest leg over that distance (5:58), but not much! A fantastic race to watch, and though it was tough to



be beaten so narrowly, we had to hand it to Sedbergh, who ran a tactical but very gutsy race and who ultimately deserved the win.

There were plenty of positives for RSSH though; the boys had shown real heart and there were some excellent individual performances among this team reconstituted after a sickness bug had decimated our squad overnight; and of course our girls showed their huge promise for the year ahead with their first major victory of the season – the first of many, I am sure.

It should also be noted that there were also some great efforts by the boys' 'B' team, especially by Charlie Davis (PH UVI) and Naveen Garikapati (Rb LVI) who ran times not far off those of our top 'A' team runners. Well done to all who raced. *IPH*



Senior School Play 'Cyrano de Bergerac' - a review

This year's Senior School play, Edmond Rostand's tragi-comedy Cyrano de Bergerac — the first School production by our new Director of Drama Helen Brown — has been generally acclaimed as a 'tour de force'.



Staging Cyrano de Bergerac as a first production in the Ashton Theatre is like diving from the top board when arriving at the swimming pool. Edmond Rostand's turn of the century tragi-comedy is not for the faint hearted. An epic tale, written in French and translated by Anthony Burgess, it is Shakespearian pastiche, with echoes of Hamlet, Henry V and Romeo and Juliet – complete with Balcony scene.

Our hero (Harry Al-Adwani) is a romantic soldier-poet, who despite being nasally challenged, can write a sonnet and fight a duel simultaneously. His soaring soul is tortured by a ridiculously large proboscis – which prevents him from declaring his love for his beautiful cousin Roxanne. Instead of which, his verses and billets doux are delivered by proxy – apparently by his handsome but utterly stupid protégé Christian. Above all, this is a play which calls for lofty, lyrical verse speaking and, in Cyrano's final words, more than a dose of 'panache'.

Helen Brown, Shrewsbury's brilliant new Director of Drama, presented a wonderfully costumed show with a set full of cobbles and balustrades, oozing Seventeenth Century charm. Her able cast were fully up to the challenge and but at their strongest in the more intimate scenes, where players such as Will Harvey (Le Bret) and Jessica Walker (Pauline) went for the lines with verve and 'élan'.

Tom Knight, played the handsome hunk with endearing bravura – and Emily Skelton's dizzy Roxanne made Burgess's lines sound naturalistic and credible. Guy Cabral brought a louche sleaziness – completely out of his own character – to the part of the odious Comte de Guiche.

As for Cyrano, Harry Al-Adwani was given the task of climbing the Alps – in a vastly demanding part, with pages of poetry to memorise and sudden shifts of mood from the heroic to profound self doubt. There were some excellent moments of comedy – not least when Cyrano takes the place of Christian under the balcony. Here was a fluid actor, who was fully engaged with the role, whilst understandably challenged by the vocal demands of lyric verse. For Rostand is no Shakespeare – and, if possible, more wordy; words and images pour from the page and there is always a danger that the weight of the verbiage will clog and drag on the momentum. Even professional actors sometimes struggle to communicate the urgency of drama when the medium is verse. Nevertheless, this 'Frog Prince' with a heart of gold, captivated the audience from the moment of his first appearance on stage to his desperate (and doomed) last duel with Death.

This magnificent production of *Cyrano de Bergerac* suggests that Shrewsbury has found a director of distinction who promises an exciting future for Shrewsbury School drama.

50th Anniversary Reunion of Shrewsbury's 1964 Football 1st XI

Fifty years after achieving the distinction of being the only football team to beat all other public schools in a single season, every member of the 1964 Shrewsbury 1st XI returned to the School last Saturday for a memorable and hugely enjoyable reunion with their coach, Robin Trimby.

Two of the team even made the journey from overseas - Peter Platt flew over from Perth, Western Australia and goalkeeper David Gale (and former RSSH Huntsman) came from Florida.

Their season culminated in a gripping 2 -1 victory over Repton on the last Saturday of November 1964 and it was fitting, therefore that the reunion was timed to coincide with the School's annual fixture against Repton. 1964 1st XI player and one of the main organisers of the day, Robin Brooke-Smith, who is now the School's Archivist, spoke for his fellow team mates in describing the occasion as, "the very best of Salopian occasions, much enjoyed and to be savoured for many years, no doubt".

Having narrowly missed out on Bunbury selection two years ago, his outstanding performances at Shrewsbury School (leading allrounder last season), Warwickshire CCC and Shrewsbury CC have promoted him into national selection. The hard work carried out with Paul Pridgeon, the School's Cricket Professional, has



helped develop George's game and effectiveness on the pitch.

"Tomorrow he departs on tour with the School squad to the UAE and South Africa - a trip that will now prove to be excellent preparation for his upcoming matches against Pakistan U17s, one of the strongest age group teams in the world."

Only the top 0.8% of students achieved the Roentgenium medal in 2014. Ross and the other medal-winners attended a residential chemistry camp at the University of Cambridge in September.

The Cambridge Chemistry Challenge aims to stretch and challenge students interested in chemistry and provides an excellent experience for anyone considering taking their studies further.

Shrewsbury's 14-strong MUN team were on stunning form at the Paris Conference last weekend, held in the prestigious setting of UNESCO Headquarters and involving more than 900 delegates from 25 countries.

The 14 Shrewsbury delegates representing China and North Korea spent most of the conference in their respective committees, debating all sorts of different topics. These included debates on how best to combat ISIS, what to do to stop the spread of Ebola, the rights of women in the armed forces, the human rights of prisoners, the arms trade, protectionism, how best to fight poverty in sub-Saharan Africa and whether it is right to use genetically modified foods to combat world hunger.

As always, Salopians were right in the thick of the debates and made a big impact.

At the end of the committee stage, on Sunday morning, all 900 delegates reconvened in the main hall in UNESCO to debate a resolution, which was put together by delegates from a number of schools, including Shrewsbury, and then turned into a workable document by Sasha Arridge and Ed Plaut, alongside two girls from a school in Monaco.

Sasha and Ed's preparatory work on this resolution was the greatest achievement by our team at the 2014 conference. As in the real UN conferences, the two boys burned the midnight oil with their counterparts, making sure that everything was ready for Sunday's concluding debate. Their work is a good example of everything that MUN is about: research, preparation, intensive debate and disagreement, dialogue, consensus-building, compromise, and finally a document to be proud of.



The result of the General Assembly vote on Sunday morning was a massive majority for Sasha and Ed's resolution without a single amendment; this is one of the finest achievements by any Shrewsbury team at PAMUN.

No fewer than four of the Shrewsbury team were given Honourable Mentions in the closing ceremony of the conference: Sasha Arridge (Rb LVI), Krem Todorova (G UVI), Rhys Elliott-Williams (PH LVI) and Tiger Vechamamontien (M LVI).

And two were named as Best Delegates in their committees: George Young (O LVI) in the World Health Organisation Executive Committee; and Ed Plaut (S V) in the Human Rights Panel.

The news 100 years ago: 9th December 1914

Tuesday 9 December 2014

No OS lost their lives this week 100 years ago.

Between 11th and 21st November, British and Ottoman forces had fought in Iraq for control of the city of Basra. The Ottomans ultimately abandoned the city which was occupied by British forces. By early December, the Ottoman forces who had retreated from Basra were dug into fortifications around the city of Qurna, a vital strategic location where the rivers Tigris and Euphrates meet. Two Indian regiments, one British company and several gunboats attacked the Ottomans at Qurna, again driving them back. Qurna became an important base for British operations in central Iraq.

At sea, the Battle of the Falkland Islands was fought between British and German battlecruisers. After their heavy defeat at the Battle of Coronel on 1 November, the British had sent a large force to track down and destroy the victorious German squadron. On 8 December, German Admiral Graf Maximilian von Spee, ordered an attack on Port Stanley on the Falkland Islands, with the intention of raiding the British radio station and coaling depot. Spee was, however, unaware that a British squadron, including two fast, modern battle cruisers, Invincible and Inflexible, had already got there and were waiting for him. In the battle that followed, four German crusiers were sunk, including Spee's flagship Scharnhorst. 2,200 German sailors were killed in the encounter. Spee's squadron, which up until this point had successfully disrupted commercial shipping in the South Atlantic, had been wiped out.

David was chosen by audition from literally hundreds of applicants worldwide for a coveted place on this scheme, which gives up and coming young singers a two year contract at Covent Garden, during which time they receive world-class coaching and training in opera as well as taking part in productions, often taking small principal roles in productions and much more.

David was Head Chorister at Lichfield Cathedral, and a Music Scholar at Shrewsbury, where in addition to being a member of the Chapel and Chamber Choirs, he was Principal Horn in the School's Symphony Orchestra, and created the role of Professor Waldeman in the Fanning/Moore musical 'Frankenstein'.

David is just finishing his studies this year as a post-graduate at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama on the opera course, having previously studied at the Royal Academy of Music as a pupil of Mark Wildman, Head of Vocal Studies. Later this year, David will also be singing solos in Bach's B Minor Mass with John Eliot Gardiner and the Monteverdi Choir on tour, with whom there are also plans to make a new recording of the work, as well as in Claudio Monteverdi's Opera, 'Orfeo', with performances in America including Carnegie Hall and at the Aldeburgh Festival.



James Taylor continues to maximise his chances with the World Cup Squad in Sri Lanka

Shrewsbury Saracen, James Taylor (R 2003-08) has so far acquitted himself brilliantly during the England v Sri Lanka World Cup ODI Series.

Taylor scored 90 in Colombo on 7 December. Cricket pundits consider that he may well have secured a place in the World Cup Starting XI. He was re-selected for the next match in Kandy (10 -11 December) where in a winning partnership with Joe Root, he scored 68. Root went on to score 104 not-out.

According to the Daily Telegraph, Sri Lankan captain, Angelo Mathews, was impressed by James Taylor. "He looks a very good player," he said. "In these conditions it is going to be a challenge for the English – it's turning, it's slow – but he seems to be batting on a different pitch for the last two games. I've not seen him that much but he looks a really good player."

Alastair Cook, the England captain said: "The way we played over two days, we deserved to win. The way we bowled first was fantastic – Chris Woakes, I think, has got two of the three best figures [for England], that's great credit to him – and the way James Taylor and Joe Root batted was just phenomenal.

Earlier in the week, the Telegraph's correspondent, Scyld Berry, had commented:

'One swallow does not make a summer, but a swallow that can go into bat in the second over of his first proper one-day international, and score 90 off 109 balls in 40-degree heat and 90-degree humidity, can fly anywhere in the one-day world.'

The news 100 years ago: 16th December 1914

Tuesday 16 December 2014



This week, the war came to Britain. On 15th December, a German airship was sighted off the East coast of England, the first appearance of hostile aircraft over the British Isles. German air raids would later cause significant damage to civilian targets in the south and east of England.

The more immediate threat, however, came from the sea. On 16th December, a squadron of German battlecruisers bombarded the towns of Scarborough, Whitby and Hartlepool. In Scarborough, the Grand Hotel, three churches and various other properties were hit; in Whitby, a coastguard station and the historic Abbey were badly damaged. Hartlepool, a more significant target due to its docks and factories, was hit by over 1000 shells, causing damage to the steelworks, gasworks, railway lines, seven churches and 300 houses. The Hartlepool attack killed 86 civilians and injured 424. The raids were quickly seized upon by the British propaganda machine and used in posters to encourage men to enlist into the army.
