House Play review: Oldham's 'The Real Inspector Hound'

Based on Stoppard's own experiences as a critic in the 1960s, the play 'The Real Inspector Hound' provides an entertaining twist on the classic whodunnit, parodying not just the twists and turns of mystery plays such of Agatha Christie's 'The Mouse Trap', but also the very critics who provide the reviews, as egotistical as the actors themselves.

In the hands of a talented group of actors from Oldham's Hall, this provided a thoroughly enjoyable and entertaining evening of fast-paced farce.

Freddie Fullerton and Gus Haynes were well-cast as the two critics, reviewing a play that they unwittingly find themselves entwined within. Fullerton was on fine form as the self-consciously second-rate critic Moon, who desperately attempts to shake off the shadow of the critic he is replacing, Higgs.

Haynes, as the self-claimed "respectable married man" Birdboot, was entertainingly pompous, full of riotous energy and vigour. His thinly-veiled philandering provided much humour, particularly when he joins the action of the play istelf, caught between the affections of the youthful ingenue Felicity and the seductive 'widow' Cynthia.

James Brown was suitably louche as the mysterious newcomer to the neighbourhood, Simon Gascoyne, skilled not only in his acting, but also in his excellent direction (alongside Fullerton, no doubt with some pointers from resident stage sage PAF). There were further commanding performances from Jonathan Wood, playing with dead-pan discipline the wheelchair-bound Magnus, and Ed Shawe-Taylor, an impressively assured performance playing Hound himself.

All in all a polished and enjoyable House play, something we have come to expect from this talented group of actors and directors.

A Week in the Life of Freddie Fullerton (O LVI)

Thursday 10 February 2011

I am Freddie Fullerton. A small lower sixth former from the triumphant house of Oldham's Hall and this was my week:

Monday was the beginning of a hectic and exhilarating week for the thespians and technicians of Oldham's Hall. It was the week in which we were to perform Tom Stoppard's classic, 'The Real Inspector Hound.' After weeks of rehearsals in the Moser Library and days wondering if the play was going to come together, James Brown and I slowly strolled into the Ashton Theatre to see an empty stage. The thought ran through our heads that we were going to have to transform this bare stage into a Manor fit for a murder mystery. With a rub of the hands we got to work on the stage hoping that all was going to run smoothly, though we both knew that wasn't going to be the case. We started by putting up the French windows which seemed to provide no problems. We then proceeded to put up the first of the flats which were a little trickier. After the final flat we took a long deep breath and stepped backwards to look at what was the basis of the set. It looked good, though something didn't seem right, but we couldn't work it out. We went to lessons but returned to the Ashton straight after to prepare everything for the rehearsal. We brought the props and placed them in the correct positions and then Mr Fanning came through the doors and told us what was wrong with it, "You need to bring everything forward a few inches, the set is too far upstage." At which point James and I looked at each other with a short sigh, having spent all afternoon drilling down the flats and French windows we were going to have to unscrew and shift forward. Then came the first rehearsal, which was not as good as expected, but it was the first night in the Ashton and that never goes according to plan. Monday had been a long and exhausting day and the first of many. There was nothing more that could be done; all that was needed was a good night's sleep.

Tuesday consisted of moving the set forward which meant that more than two pair of hands was needed. With the help of a few lower sixth and members of the cast, we just about manage to drag the set upstage, with minor splinters on the side but all for a good cause. Afterwards, many scattered back to the house or to the grot shop and there were only a handful of us left to sort out the sound and the lighting. Again that night we rehearsed and it went much better than the previous night, thank God.

On Wednesday, we decided to get together all the other props for the play. We needed a wheelchair, plants and some carpets. I, along with Edward Shawe- Taylor, went off to Mr Haworth's classroom to get the plants. He didn't seem too bothered about getting them back, "Please, keep them." We clasped onto the best looking ones and made our way back to the theatre, receiving some mysterious looks on the way. I then ran over to the San to get hold of the wheelchair, which was waiting for me when I entered. I wheeled it to the theatre, again receiving some unusual looks. We put everything together, brought the tables and sofa in and moved part of the Ashton seating out for the two critics in the play. All that was left to do was paint. Mr Fanning had kindly gone into town and got some lovely deep, red paint for the walls.

Once morning lessons had finished on Thursday and we had had some lunch, James and I raced over to the Ashton to begin the painting. There we found what seemed to be a bunch of third



formers trying to kill each other. However, we soon found out that it was Mr Hann's drama group who were acting out fighting on stage, much to our relief. We proceeded to paint, trying not to get in the way or get kicked in the head. We put on our white coats and slapped the red paint onto the bare, white flats. Occasionally, a third former would slam into a flat or try and do a kung-fu kick and fail badly, but we managed to finish in the end. We then laid out the red and white carpets to add the finishing touches to the set. It had turned out great in the end. All the long work that we had spent on it paid off. Though, as we enjoyed the colourful set, we then realised something quite important; "the first performance is tomorrow night!" We suddenly felt a gush of mixed emotions, excitement but then nerves. We hurried back to the house to fetch our costumes, ready for the dress rehearsal. I had managed to get hold of mustard chords, a purple shirt, and a tweed jacket and suede boots. I was slightly frightened by my appearance. Dr Samworth kindly came in to do our make-up and did a great job. We were ready for our dress rehearsal. Everything was in the right place and the show began. The dress went very smoothly and hardly any lines were forgotten, we had got through it. It was our first taste of what it would be like on the actual night. Afterwards, Mr Fanning gave us his wise words on how to improve things and then we sunk into the chairs and sofa which were on set and rested for a short while before returning back to the house for a well needed sleep. Friday was going to be a busy dav.

Friday had come and all I could think about was the play. I seemed to be watching the clock waiting for time to slowly tick by so that I could rush to the theatre to make sure everything was well. Lessons eventually finished, and then James and I hurried over to the theatre. We made sure that all the flats were level and that all the props were in the right place. James checked to make sure all the lighting and sound was prepared whilst I put up the photos in the foyer which Dr Wade had taken in the dress rehearsal. Soon came the time when we all had to be in the theatre. We ran through a few chunks of the play to polish it up. Once Dr Samworth, we started to get make-up and costumes on. It was half an hour before the performance and there were various actors wandering backstage muttering their lines to be certain they were ready. The butterflies soon came and everyone was saying "break a leg" over and over. The audience had taken their seats and it was time to start the show. The music started and I walked on stage and then over to my seating. The play had begun. It was going very well and there was laughter which we were praying for. All the actors started to get into the play once the adrenaline began to pump. It was a fun performance and the audience seemed to enjoy it, even though there was a hic-up from the sound. The audience went for drinks, but we stayed behind to make sure all was in place for tomorrow's performance.

Saturday was the final day and a sad one. We had so much fun putting together the play that we were sad to see it about to end. Though there was some relief in there as well. We got to the Ashton Theatre for 6:00 pm to get make-up and run over a few bits of the play. I wasn't as nervous as last night, but I still felt them slightly. The audience weren't as many as the previous night, but that was expected on a Saturday. However, the Saturday night audience did laugh more and seemed to get more of the jokes. Saturday night seemed more electric and we just gave it all we had as we knew it was the last night. As the lights came down at the end of the play, we knew it was the end. We had had so much fun in the process and were surrounded by great people. We were hugely grateful for Mr Fanning's superb support. Straight after the performance, we tore down the stage and gathered everything together. Returning to Mr Johnson's for drinks, we thought about what an amazingly enjoyable time we had had and that we were sad to see it end. It was the end of my week and the end of the "The Real Inspector Hound'.

I have been fencing for 8 years. Firstly at Wrexham Fencing Club, then for a year at Packwood Haugh, where with another teacher's support we got the club up and running again after it had closed for 3 years, and now at Shrewsbury School.

The school and in particular the coach, Ken Holding, have always been very supportive. Training takes place twice a week on a Wednesday and Saturday and I go to Wrekin on a Tuesday to help coach and for further practice.

This year, as we did last year, three fencers have qualified for the British Youth Championships: Jack Viljoen, Charlie Godman and myself. The number of fencers is steadily increasing and standards have improved for all ages in recent years, due to the efforts of the senior boys and the coach.

The school regularly fences other schools including Rugby, Wrekin and local clubs such as Wrexham. It is expected that a number of pupils will attend the Public Schools Championships during March.

I am fully involved in the arrangement of all fixtures, team selection and maintaining the armoury. I feel that there is a lot of new potential in lower years and aim to make fencing more widely recognized as I can predict increasing success.

The Hunt were aiming to pick up their fifth trophy of the year at the annual Shrewsbury Relays, a trophy they were looking to retain from last year.

After a strong performance at the National Relays, we were confident of a strong defence, and indeed, a time of 8.34 by Otto Clarke in the opening leg placed us amongst the lead runners from Wrekin and Loughborough. It didn't take long until Cal Winwood provided our A team with a clear lead following a strong second lap (7.50, the fastest Senior lap of the day). After further strong laps from Ed Mallett, his brother George (a blistering 7.52) and Ed Lloyd, the race had turned into more of a time-trial event with the race clearly wrapped up. Aubrey Higgin did the necessary and ran a solid 8.25 to ensure victory for the A team, but meanwhile the B team had managed to break through into second place overall, with some strong running from Guy Vernon (8.31) and Rory Fraser (8.44). To beat Wrekin, Loughborough and Lucton A teams was a fine achievement, and further evidence of the depth currently being nurtured at the club. It was great to see, for example, that the Hunt were able to field a record four relay teams, each of six runners.

In the girls race, an outstanding first lap from Imola Atkins (9.29) ensured that the RSSH girls team had a commanding lead going into the second lap. It was a lead that we were unfortunately not able to hold onto, though there were strong laps from Hebe Dickins (11.11) and captain Lucy Birt (11.20). The team were, however, winners of the silver medals, beating Lucton into third by some distance.

The second goal was not long in coming, as was the third. This was going to be a walk-over. Sadly Shrewsbury failed to make their total domination tell in full, despite a further two more goals in the first half, including a delightful reverse stick shot high into the corner of the net from Will Leigh-Bramwell. Much of the reason was a lack of team discipline, as various players attempted to take on the opposition on their own. The several narrow misses from Will Phillips and Will Moorcroft were unfortunate, but would have flattered if they had gone in.

The second half was much more aggressive, and more importantly, clinical in its execution. Every attack threatened at least the 'D', if not the goal itself, and the confidence exuded by every member of the team was sky high. All three attacking forwards had to be substituted for a short time in the second half, such was the exertion required to keep ahead of an extremely rapidly moving ball.

LeagueTables: Fit for Purpose or Had Their Day?' A view fromThe Registrar

This article was published in the spring issue of **Shrewsbury News**, a new publication written primarily for prospective parents.

You will not have seen Shrewsbury's exam results in the league tables published in the press this year because, along with sixty or so other leading schools in the UK, Shrewsbury feels that far from providing a clear and useful snapshot of a school's quality and qualities, the information provided by the league tables is oversimplified and confuses more than it clarifies.

Mark Turner, our new Headmaster, made his thoughts quite clear to me when he said that education at Shrewsbury was an experience and not an average score. In other words, the information provided by the league tables says little about the quality of teaching and learning and cannot possibly address the engagement of pupils in life and activities inside and outside the classroom, through which knowledge and understanding develops alongside the confidence and good judgement required for life beyond school.

We believe that the richness of experience at Shrewsbury – maybe in the lab analysing the data from our experiment currently orbiting Earth on board a satellite, performing Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto in London, taking the school play on tour to Edinburgh, walking in theWelsh hills with the Rovers, or simply doing one's best with one's friends in the House Football and Fives leagues – is exceptional.We won the Independent Schools FA Trophy in 2010, the Silk Trophy for cricket in 2009, and we were the second fastest British schoolboy boat on the water last summer at Henley. So the sky's the limit. Of course the majority of pupils aren't in the Ist XI and don't play concertos. But it is through participation at one's own level that pupils will learn to take responsibility for themselves and others which will stand them in good stead for the rest of their lives. Things not measured by the league tables.

The Headmaster's case, of course, is strengthened by the fact that the national Sixth Form curriculum is in such a state of flux. Boys and girls can now enter for A Levels, the International Baccalaureate, and the new Cambridge Pre-U.To balance the grades achieved under each style of assessment and produce a figure that reflects standard achievement is so complex as to make it virtually worthless.

And then there is the culinary model. As one parent put it so delightfully to me the other day, "One cannot produce the finest meal without the finest ingredients." He was, of course, referring to the academic quality of the intake, mainly in Year 9. Although I mentioned that one couldn't have the finest meal without the very finest chefs, he was really saying that the end exam result lacks value as a measure of the quality of the learning experience if it does not also identify the quality of the intake.

At Shrewsbury our Common Entrance pass mark is 55%, so our average of 82% As and Bs (and now A*s) at A Level represents terrific teaching and learning across the board, for both the academically crisp lettuce leaves in Set 1 as well as those slightly crinkly ones in the lower sets, for whom a good and stimulating education is equally important.

Last year 65 of our pupils gained 3 As or more at A Level – and that accounts for the top three crisp sets; 17 of them gained places at Oxford and Cambridge, an excellent number for a school



of our size, which shows even more clearly that genuine scholarship is alive and well at Shrewsbury. From the slightly crinklier sets, two boys who had barely scored the pass mark at Common Entrance, left with 3 As – and there was as much if not more joy for them and boys like them who exceed beyond expectation than for those who fly to the heights more easily. We're that sort of School – and the league tables don't tell you that.

Bentley Elocution Prizes, adjudicated by Robin Moulsdale

The Bentley Elocution Prizes are awarded in memory of Thomas Bentley, who served the School for over fifty years and is commemorated by a window on the south side of the School Chapel. He may be described as the bridge between the Old and the New at Shrewsbury since he held the post of Punishment Master and introduced Modern Languages to the School.

Noted for his enthusiasm for reading and his fine voice ("When he read prayers at night, the whole School used to howl like a rising and a falling wind following the cadence of his voice"), Bentley introduced 'Penny Readings' in 1867, which may be regarded as the origin of the Bentley Elocution Competition.

The competitors' voices in the 2011 competition rarely approached a howl, but the complexity of the poetry chosen for recitation, ranging from Shelley to Wallace Stevens, demanded a considerable variety of vocal, intellectual and emotional cadences. Twenty-three Salopians performed to a full house in The Maidment Building, including Robin Moulsdale Esq., former athlete, teacher and housemaster extraordinaire, and this year's guest-adjudicator.

We thank Robin sincerely for performing the impossible task of finding degrees among superlatives – that is, choosing the winners from among recitations of the highest technical skill and emotional intensity.
