The Saracens just miss out in the Second Round of the Cricketer Cup



Fresh from their impressive Round 1 victory the Saracens came into Round 2 full of confidence, despite their hopes of turning out with a number of 'pros' from the Shrewsbury roster dashed due to a combination of unavailability and injuries.

Ben Williams (Rt 2008-10) lost the toss and the Saracens were asked to field first on what looked like a very used wicket away to Uppingham. The home side got off to a quick start as the Saracens' opening bowling attack struggled to control the new ball, and whilst the breakthrough came early in the 5th over Uppingham were 31-1 with extras the highest scorer (17). With the wicket showing early signs of inconsistent bounce the Sarries bowling attack started to take control, reducing the hosts to 119-4 and dismissing their 'form' batter. Spin twins Pat Jacob (PH 2012-17) and Matt Gregson (Rb 2008-13) bowled very well through the middle overs, ultimately returning figures of 3-39 and 4-43 respectively, before Steve Barnard (Rb 2009-11) cleaned up the Uppingham tail leaving the hosts 153 all out. A below par score, albeit the Sarries would have been disappointed to have given away 48 extras.

At the half way point the Sarries were in poll position, and despite the deteriorating wicket, would have hoped for a quick start to tee-up a comfortable chase. Unfortunately, through a combination of poor shots and some mixed umpiring decisions, that proved not to be the case with the visitors 19-3 and under pressure. Ben Price (O 2008-10) and Ben Williams rebuilt for a period before Williams fell caught at slip bringing Tom Cox (M 2000-05) to the crease. Cox played a measured innings to build what could have been a match winning partnership but was dismissed for 30 with the Sarries 94-5 and the game in the balance. Despite a valiant effort from Price who finished on 50* the Saracens middle and lower order fell in clusters with the visitors all out for 149 and falling 4 runs short.

Overall a disappointing day and a match which the Saracens would have expected to win. That said this year's campaign saw several new Saracens make their Cricketer Cup debuts, and with a good crop of cricketers leaving the school this year, the prospects for 2019 look brighter than years gone by.

Thank you all that played this year and wish all those touring in Devon later this summer all the best. Hoist it up!

An apple a day keeps Richard away...

In the final week of term, the Ashton Theatre hosted Heather May's Shrewsbury School directing debut, Shakespeare's 'Richard III', performed by a cast of 27 Third and Fourth Formers. Many thanks to Charlie Tonks (L6) for her review and to William Temple <u>(William Temple Photographer)</u> for the photographs.

When watching the play one is immediately struck by the astonishing professionalism demonstrated both on and offstage by such a young ensemble. Tom Allen of Churchill's Hall played the eponymous Richard exuding confidence, affirming to all those watching that the theatre is his natural habitat. The opening direct address captivated the audience with Tom's clear annunciation, a rarity for young actors performing Shakespeare.

Not to be deceived by the pink, girlish exterior, Amber Worthington beautifully embodied a strong and empowered woman fighting attempts of an oppressive patriarchy. Georgiana Cooper was full of emotive expression with her grace and elegance taking the entire stage by storm. Moreover, her monochromatic costume reflected her bold and gutsy attitude.

The technical team put a clever twist on transitions, juxtaposing the Shakespearean language with the live singing of Imogen Morgan; one must admire her ability to fill the auditorium with such spine-tingling sound.

Ed Tarling fruitfully embodied the manipulative Buckingham, brilliantly marrying the suave with the slimy. On the theme of villainy, Orlando Williams carried off his malevolence with a subtle yet self-assured demeanour, setting a good example to his younger cast members.

Statuesque and feisty, Phoebe's power-suit reflected Miss May's intention to introduce modern eclecticism into such a traditional play. This was most effective in making the performance appeal to a modern audience and further engendered a feeling of power onstage.

Finally, Oscar Hamilton-Russell wins the award for the most sonorous and clear voice, confidently adding Shakespearean soliloquies to his repertoire.

Huge congratulations to Miss May and her incredibly talented cast for pulling off such a dramatic and forceful play with high energy – difficult to emulate in the last week of a busy year.

Wonderful Weather; Wonderful Wednesday.....

... at Henley. Don't you want to be there on this historic day for Sabrina and the RSSBC?

This Wednesday, for the first time, there will be three Shrewsbury crews racing at Henley on the same day. The Sabrina VIII, having qualified on Friday, will be racing Royal Chester RC 'A' at 2.20pm; the Second VIII will be racing Orange Coast USA at 3.05pm and the First VIII will be racing Great Marlow School at 7.00pm.



The Sabrina men's VIII qualified for the Thames Cup for the first time in three years and the School's second VIII also qualified for the Temple Cup. All this success following hot on the heels of Cesca Molyneux's victory in the Oxford Brookes VIII at Henley Women's Regatta a week before (Cesca is the first Sabrina Club member to have won at this the premier regatta for women in the UK - for more information, see <u>here</u>). With the first VIII pre-selected for the Princess Elizabeth Cup, this means that for the first time ever, Shrewsbury and its former pupils will have three VIIIs competing on a single day: Wonderful Wednesday.

Do try to be there to support them. There will be the usual School lunch party for Salopians on Wednesday too, as we get together to cheer the boys on. The rowers are all great people, who have given a huge amout already just to appear at Henley and deserve to be cheered to the rafters by all Salopians, their families and friends. The crews will be going afloat from the Regatta pontoons approximately thirty-five minutes before they race so, if you have time, do go there to give them a good send-off. If you cannot be there, do remember that all Henley races can be seen live (or as a repeat) on YouTube.

There is plenty going on at Henley this year to keep the most ardent Shrewsbury rowing enthusiasts excited: the Leander Club winning Thames Cup crew from 1968 (which had four



Salopians in it, Graham Davidson (SH 1960-65), Ian Morton (SH 1962-67), Charles Parry (1960-65), and Tim Redfern (SH 1962-67)) will be performing a row-over during the tea interval on Friday (they will be going afloat from about 3.45pm from the Regatta pontoons). In addition, the RSSBC Princess Elizabeth Cup crew from 1968 will be having a 50th anniversary reunion row from the Regatta pontoons at 10.30am on Friday before enjoying lunch together in Leander.

A Summer at Shrewsbury School conjures up different memories for Salopians. Remember the crack of leather on willow, echoing across Top Common, the rhythmic splashes of oars breaking the surface of the Severn, the unmistakeable thwack of racket against fluffed ball, next to Tudor Court, or perhaps the sounds of distant Shropshire countryside, where keen Gents and Hounds went to escape the confines of School for an hour or two. All activity gave the examined brain welcome relief from revision and tests that dominate the warm sunny months of term. But now, Bumps is over for another year and Speech Day has concluded with the ever lengthening Call-Over. Farewells are said to the Headmaster, some of the Staff and the Leavers, with a collection of happy memories of life at Shrewsbury.



It doesn't seem long ago that I was spectating at some of the Hunt's Lent events, such as the Spring Relays at Attingham and at the School Championships in Harrow and in Leeds. This summer term, I have managed to attend some athletic meetings, including the School's Inter-House Sports Day, held at the London Road Track, where, on a very hot day, records and personal bests were still achieved. I was also privileged to run with the boys and girls of the Hunt on some of their Tuesday Shropshire Way Runs (below). Then there were Wednesday Benjys, which suddenly came to an abrupt end in June, when the course was rudely interrupted by a substantial landslip of the top part of Ridgemount Drive. Plans are in hand to adjust the course for next term.





Back in April, I was able to witness 'the changing of the guard' at the Annual Hunt Presentations Evening, where Monty Hardcastle (I, U6) passed on The Whip and Horn to the next Huntsman, Charlie Ockleston (O, L6) and, after a two year Captaincy, Immie Evans (G, U6) saw Felicity Hayward (EDH, L6) take over the Girls Hunt as Huntswoman. I also welcomed 19 new members into The OSH that night and, in addition, since then, I also presented our Committee Member and previous Coach, Kait Weston (Housemistress, EDH), with her membership, before she leaves to take up her new post at Millfield School, in September.



On Sunday 17th June, I got up early to follow the 6th Shrewsbury Half-Marathon, on my bike, cycling frantically around town to cheer on the 60 or so Salopians who entered, running for the Andrew Grene Foundation, who work with children and women in Haiti, to help improve their lives after the devastating earthquake of 2010. Amongst Team Shrewsbury was Richard Hudson



(M 1967-72) who was a 1st VIII Hunt Runner of 1971-72, and completed this, his first halfmarathon, in 2 hours 20 minutes. Being the present Housemaster of Churchill's, Richard encouraged many of his House to join him on the start line and also raise over £12,000 for the charity.

Looking ahead to the new Michaelmas Term, the RSSH have been invited to Sedbergh School, in Cumbria (LA10 5HG) on Saturday 15th September, to a mixed age competition, including a 6 Km cross-country race for senior students and Old Sedberghians, where the Old Salopian Hunt Members would be most welcome to join in. They are holding a Junior Race at 2.30 and then the Seniors start at 3 pm. They are expecting a mixed bag of their old boys and girls to show up and possibly some of their pre-university recent leavers, but all levels of competence are welcome at this match. I hope some of you will be able to join me, along with the RSSH teams, on the coach from Shrewsbury, or perhaps consider meeting at Sedbergh School. Like Shrewsbury School, Sedbergh have a notable history for their cross-country running, so this is going to be a very competitive event and it would make it very special if we can also provide a team of men and women to run with their Alumni. For those of you still running, do give it some thought and let me know if you are interested in coming along.



Also, next term, there is going to be a great deal of excitement on Friday 12th October, when the whole School runs 'The Tucks', over a new course at Attingham. I hope some of you may like to put on your OSH Vest and run it with me amongst 800 students, staff and friends. Let me know if you are coming. Since the 1800's, the Tucks Run has kept evolving, to improve it by tweaking the course and staying one step ahead of problems. This new variation of this historic School Run keeps one of the oldest traditions of the Hunt alive for future generations to enjoy. The Master-in-Charge of The RSSH, Ian Haworth, has asked if there are any of our members who would consider contributing a few seconds of their memories of the Tucks to a new video about this run, which will be filmed in the next few weeks, ready to be shown in early October. We came into the regatta not really knowing what to expect, but having made the semi finals we will certainly aim to be back again next year and I believe that if we learn from our mistakes this year we can have a real shot at winning the event.'



The news this week 100 years ago: 13th -19th July 1918

Friday 13 July 2018

This week we remember two Old Salopians, killed in France on consecutive days.

Second Lieutenant Arthur Noel Ealand, 88th Sqdn. Royal Air Force.

Moser's, left in 1902. "He was exceptionally sturdy and thick set, an 'oar' of nature's own making and a full back whom no-one would tackle without thinking twice" – *The Salopian*.

But for a last minute illness, he would have been the sixth Moser's member of the 1st VIII in 1902 – an *annus mirabilis* for that House. The others were M Jourdier, CF Leake, J Summers, W Cooke and H Shimwell.

Serving initially as a Red Cross driver, he then transferred to the RAF Wireless Section. He was killed whilst flying in France, 15th July 1918, aged 33. *Buried at Dunkirk Town Cemetery, France. Grave IV. C. 4.*



Private Herbert Wynne Walton-Evans, 1817, 3rd Salvage Coy. Australian Army Service Corps.



Bennett's (now Severn Hill), left in 1892 to take up land in Australia. He was the son of Revd David and Annie Evans, who lived at The Vicarage, Abergele in Clwyd. He was killed in action in France, 16th July 1918, aged 42.

Buried at La Neuville British Cemetery, Corbie, France. Grave II. G. 36. He is also remembered on the Abergele War Memorial.





Tremendous performances from three Salopian crews at Henley Royal Regatta 2018

Friday 13 July 2018

The Royal Shrewsbury School Boat Club enjoyed a memorable Henley Royal Regatta at the end of the Summer Term with some fantastic performances to celebrate.

For the first time in nine years the 2nd VIII successfully made it through the qualifying races for the Temple Challenge Cup; the Sabrina crew raced in the Thames Challenge Cup for the second time in three years; and the 1st VIII raced in the Princess Elizabeth Challenge Cup.

The 1st VIII and 2nd VIII enjoyed a great training session together on the Tuesday afternoon before the Regatta started. The senior squad have had a fantastic camaraderie throughout the season and pushed each other hard, with nothing exemplifying this better than meeting each other in the final of open eights at Bedford Regatta. It was a tremendous way to end the season as they enjoyed a good meal together after the session.

On the Wednesday, the 2nd VIII took on a university crew from Orange Coast College, USA. Despite pushing them hard through the barrier, it was the stronger crew from the US that took



the honours on the line. With 55 crews entered into the universities event, it was a tremendous achievement for the 2nd VIII to qualify.

In the Thames Cup, the Old Salopian Sabrina crew gave a spirited and determined performance against a strong Royal Chester crew, eventually losing by two lengths.

After their strong showing at the Marlow Regatta, the 1st VIII were delighted to be drawn amongst the first four crews for the Princess Elizabeth Challenge Cup and thus avoid the other top three in the early rounds. On the Wednesday the crew were drawn against Great Marlow School in one of the last races of the day. With a 7pm start time, the crew were pleased to finally get on the water with a chance to banish the nerves that had built up through the day. In a commanding performance the 1st VIII drew away quickly off the start and held their two-length advantage through to the finish.



On Thursday afternoon the crew were up against Monmouth School. The 1st VIII once again got off to a very good start and settled into a strong rhythm to record a comfortable win and earn a spot in the quarter-finals.



On the Friday the 1st VIII met another selected crew in the form of Bedford School who had come 4th at the National Schools' Regatta. A tightly fought contest saw the 1st VIII take a small lead off the start which they maintained and used that cushion to respond to Bedford pushes down the course. The crew recorded a win by one length.

For the first time since 2010, the 1st VIII made it into the semi-finals at the Regatta, with the opportunity to race in front of a significant audience both of those attending the Regatta and many more watching live on BT Sport.

The semi-final saw a rematch of the Marlow Regatta final two weeks previously, where the 1st VIII had lost out by half a length to Eton College. With much anticipation, the 1st VIII took to the water with fantastic support from families and rowers past and present. The atmosphere was electric with the GB eight and Olympic sculling legend Mahe Drysdale warming the crowds in the two races prior to our own. The 1st VIII relished the opportunity and gave it their all. It was a nail-biting race, with both crews remaining in contact throughout the 2112m course. The 1st VIII tried desperately to overhaul Eton's narrow advantage as they came past the crowds in the Steward's Enclosure, but disappointingly fell short by three-quarters of a length.

Well done to the 1st VIII and 1st VIII coach Mr Grant for a fantastic performance at the Regatta. Thank you to all the supporters and the many Salopians who sent in messages of support before the race.

Sabrina's part in Leander's 1968 Success



As mentioned in our pre-Henley roundup, 2018 is the 50th anniversary of an epic win by four Salopians who were part of the Leander Club crew who competed in the 1968 Thames Cup. Seven members of this crew rowed past the enclosures during the tea interval at Henley on Friday July 6th.

With 124 Olympic and 3 Paralympic medals to its credit, Leander Club in 2018 is the most successful rowing club in the world. In the mid 1960's, however, the Club had been in the doldrums for some time, inviting membership, as they always had, mainly to Oxford or Cambridge Blues and HRR winners. In 1965, an initiative to restore the club's fortunes with a squad of young oarsmen drawn from schools, was conceived and implemented. It was largely the brainchild of Donald Legget, Captain of Leander (ex Radley) working with Old Salopians John Hall-Craggs (Rt 1945-50) and George Brown (S 1950-55). Brown later succeeded Legget as Captain.



In late 1967, Legget persuaded the Emmanuel School coach Derek Drury to take the so called 'Cadet' scheme in hand. From a squad of 15, after training and selection almost entirely in sculling boats, the eventual Thames Cup line up in 1968 consisted of 1 Radleian, 4 Salopians (Charles Parry (I 1960-65), Ian Morton (SH 1962-67), Graham Davidson (SH 1960-65) and Tim Redfern (SH 1962-67)), with the remainder from the outstanding 1966 and 1967 Emmanuel School crews.

After a shaky start to the racing season, wins at Marlow and Reading regattas prompted the newspapers to follow Leander more closely.



Drury's carefully choreographed training schedule, begun in September 1967, was designed for the selected crew to peak in Henley week and was evidently succeeding. Following a practice row on the Monday of that week, Desmond Hill of the Daily Telegraph, wrote "*The incredible Leander Cadets, on a morning which left the flags limp and motionless, rowed unpaced to the barrier in 1 minute 49 ^{1/2} seconds, only 2 ^{1/2} seconds slower than the record set, in a following wind, by the world champions, Ratzeburg, when beating Olympic champions Vesper.*" The current Thames Cup barrier record stands at 1.45.

The subsequent Thames Cup win (which was repeated in 1969 and 1970) is widely credited as the beginning of the revival of Leander and indeed British rowing.



After Henley, the ARA somewhat inevitably had selected the University of London winning Grand Challenge Cup crew to go to the Mexico Olympics, prompting Desmond Hill to write "*It makes one wonder even more whether last-minute arrangements cannot, after all, be made to vaccinate the Leander Cadets for Mexico. They beat Quintin at Reading and could well be faster than the big guns of the Grand*".



Even though that was not to be, members of the crew went on to become Oxbridge Blues, win numerous Henley, and World, and Olympic medals and no less than 6 members of the crew are still rowing competitively as veterans. Coach Donald Legget, who has been a part of the coaching team at Cambridge for 50 years, is also one of the coaches of the outstanding St.Paul's winning Princess Elizabeth crew of 2018.

The G L Mellin Tournament is a Public Schools six-a-side golf competition contested annually between the second sixteen schools from the Halford Hewitt.

Founded in 1960 by T R Parry and aptly named after G L (Susie) Mellin, the founder of the Halford Hewitt it is played every July at the wonderful, heathland course that is West Hill Golf Club in Surrey.

- The G L Mellin Salver for those over 55
- The Peter Burles Salver for those over 65

Our Support


