

Ladies' National Fives Championships: Shrewsbury 2nd pair win Festival Competition

Sunday 2 March 2014

In one of the major events in the Eton Fives Association calendar, Shrewsbury 2nd pair Charlotte Perkins and Eliza Woods played outstandingly at Eton College on Sunday 2nd March and won the Festival Competition of the Ladies' Nationals – a tremendous achievement and the first time Shrewsbury has won this title.

Competing in a field made up of the best senior women, university graduates and Highgate School National Champions, all our girls' Fives pairs did extremely well – despite the fact that many of them are relative newcomers to the game and lacked competition experience.

1st Pair Jo Cull and Charlotte Harris were promoted to the Main Ladies' Championship Competition, where they were competing against the best pairs in the country. To their great credit they came 2nd in the Plate competition, beating their great rivals Wolverhampton Girls' School 1st Pair along the way.

With a large entry in the Festival Competition and matches being played up to 15, the day proved to be a marathon event. But by 6.00pm we had achieved success as 2nd Pair Charlie Perkins & Eliza Woods won the Festival 15-8 against Bould & Lo from Cambridge University.



3rd Pair Alice Sykes-Waller & Gaby Byrne (both Upper Sixth) played their best fives ever and reached the semi-finals.

4th Pair Lower Sixth Formers Esmé O'Keeffe & Ciara Murphy, playing in their first event, improved dramatically and qualified out of their group. They lost in the quarter finals. 5th Pair Elinor Dolphin & Raf Major also qualified out of their group, improved match on match, and bowed out in the quarter finals.

6th Pair Honor Turpin & Emily Wood, also playing in their first event, were brilliant in their application and concentration and will have gained much from the experience. *Results*

RSSBC: J14 team win gold at the English Indoor Rowing Championships

Sunday 2 March 2014

Third Formers Tom Shepherd-Cross (O), Ed Lewis (Rb), Max Craik (PH) and Boris Kwok (Ch) gave a superb display of strength, speed and teamwork at the English Indoor Rowing Championships in Manchester on 2nd March and won team gold. This is the second successive year Shrewsbury has won gold in this national competition.

On Sunday 2nd March, a team of four Third Form oarsmen travelled to Manchester Velodrome in order to compete at the English Indoor Rowing Championships. In the individual event, both Tom Shepherd-Cross (O) and Ed Lewis (Rb) recorded personal bests to finish in fifth and eight places respectively before being joined by Boris Kwok (Ch) and Max Craik (PH) for the team event. Needing to cover 3000m on just one ergo in the shortest possible time, this involved each athlete rowing flat-out for 20 strokes before being replaced by each of the three other members of the team in rotation.

Despite having exhausted himself in the individual 4 minute event, Tom gave the RSSBC squad the very best possible start by keeping abreast of both the J14 and J16 teams from Trentham Boat Club in between whom we were sandwiched. Having spent most of the first half of term on ergos because of the floods – and having raced in a similar fashion on numerous occasions in the new Yale Boathouse – the boys' change-overs were very slick indeed, so Ed was able to pick up precisely where Tom left off. Being relatively fresh, Boris and Max were then able to provide an injection of real pace by raising the stroke rate a little before the whole cycle began again ... and again ... and again ... for the best part of ten minutes!

At the end of the race itself, there was a brief moment of confusion because the team had technically finished in ninth place but it wasn't clear how many of the teams ahead of them were direct competitors in their J14 category and how many were older J16 teams. However, when the final results were published, it soon became clear that their time of 9'58" was a full 15" seconds quicker than the J14s from any other school or club so RSSBC members were able to collect gold medals for the second year in succession.

RSSH: Strong performances at the Northern Championships

Last year the Hunt senior squad won an historic double victory on consecutive days in both the Northern Schools' Championships and the Midlands and Nothern Schools' Championships. With both races taking place on the same day this year, the squad had to split its forces to defend their titles. Although they narrowly missed retaining their trophies, both teams achieved impressive second place positions.

A beautiful spring day greeted us in Manchester as a small Hunt squad arrived at Longford Park with hopes of retaining the trophy we won here last year. Conditions were perfect for a fast, flat race - a course at entirely the other end of the spectrum compared with the gritty, hilly affair awaiting the other Hunt squad who had made the journey up to Sedbergh the same day.

With only five runners, this small team needed everyone to perform well if we were to stand any chance of competing for the 'Daily Despatch' trophy - awarded to the Senior victors of the Northern Championships, which has been going since 1939. After some lengthy discussions about spreading our resources in a bid to win both this and MANISCCC in Sedbergh, we eventually settled on a team comprising Upper Sixth formers Tom Lloyd (Rt) and Roman Faithfull (O), and Lower Sixth boys Ben Smith (Rt), Theo Clarke (S) and Alex Shaw (Ch).

Though the ground was quite soft (that is to say very muddy) in places, we knew this would be a fast course, with not even so much of a hint of undulation, and this suited Theo Clarke and Roman Faithfull especially. Both these two got off to a srtong start, though Roman stuck to his tried-and-tested method of beginning close to the back of the field and working his way up



through the places. I think he does this mainly to worry his coach. After half a lap, Theo had settled nicely into fifth place, and Roman was back in around 12th, with Alex and Ben working together well in around 17th and 18th. They would continue to stick together over the next two laps as they pushed on to overtake those beginning to tire. Not much further back was the implacable Tom Lloyd, fending off challenges from upstarts among the low-20s.

At the front of the field, a commanding lead was being established by St Anselm's leading runner, leaving everyone else to squabble for 2nd place. Theo kept his cool and overtook a boy from Calday Grange who had looked very strong in the first kilometre or so but who had evidently got his pacing wrong and who dropped back to 16th position by the end of the race.

Things stretched out a bit after the first lap, and Theo was largely running on his own, but he did a fantastic job of maintaining the quick pace he had established in the opening lap and it was clear that the two boys behind him were in no position to challenge. In this second lap, Roman predictably made some moves up the field, eventually engaging in an exciting battle for 5th place by the end of lap two. This continued throughout the final lap.

By the end of the second lap, Ben and Alex were still working together but at this point Ben made a brave move and broke away, taking the position of the man in front in the process. Alex battled away to hold his place and had a real fight on his hands in the closing stages. Tom continued to hold position a little further back from Alex and looked comfortable there.

As the finish line came in sight, Theo put on a good turn of pace to make a challenge for 2nd and 3rd, who were battling away ahead of him, but ultimately the distance was too great. A fantastic 4th place for him was one of the highlights of his running career though, and shows what a rich vein of form he's found in recent weeks.

Roman continued his battle for 5th to the bitter end, but was just beaten by a move around 100m from the line to which Roman couldn't quite find the answer, and come home in an extremely creditable 6th position. Ben secured a fantastic 12th place, showing what terrific progress he's made this term, and Alex came through in 15th, managing to hold off a very strong move from the boy behind him, and completing our team of four counters. Tom finished 21st, well ahead of the boy he'd overtaken earlier in the lap.

Despite a great effort from all five runners, it was clear that the trophy had eluded us this time - Lancaster Royal Grammar School had given a great show of strength in depth and placed their four counters all in the top ten, with a further four runners all in the top twenty. This was always going to be the danger of us trying to win two trophies on the same day, but reflecting on the way home we agreed it was worth going for. Second team place was secured, and hopefully we'll be back to reclaim the trophy next year. Well done to those five on a terrific day's running.

RSSH: Boys and girls triumphant in Midlands & Northern Schools' Cross-Country Championships

Monday 3 March 2014

In a thrilling day of racing in tough, hilly, muddy conditions at Sedbergh, the Hunt has set down a new marker in its long and distinguished history.

In a hard-fought and terrifically exciting race, Shrewsbury's Senior Girls' team battled against determined opposition to emerge victorious as team winners of the Stowe Shield - their first regional trophy and a huge landmark in girls' running at Shrewsbury - with Tory Mobley crowned individual champion. The Colts brought home the team trophy for the first time since 2011, with Freddie Huxley-Fielding winning the individual title; and the Senior boys won team silver, with an individual silver medal for Ben Remnant.

The Midlands & Northern Championships (MANISCCC) this year returned to the hills of Cumbria as Sedbergh hosted this prestigious event, now in its 55th year. With fell-running a strong tradition at Sedbergh, we knew that the course would be tough, hilly and very muddy. Having won the Seniors trophy for the past three years in a row, it was this year the turn of the Colts and the Senior Girls to shine, with both taking their respective championship trophies, which in the case of the girls, was the first time Shrewsbury School have ever won the event.

The long journey up on the coach saw the weather steadily worsen with the almost azure sky of Shropshire erased into a somewhat more monochromatic charcoal scene. This only seemed to encourage KMW whose knitting got increasingly furious, and it seemed she had almost knitted an entire skirt by the time we arrived in Cumbria.





The first race of the day was the Colts which saw our Third and Fourth Form tackle the 2.5 mile course. An immediate lead was established by Freddie Huxley-Fielding (R) whose upbringing on a sheep farm proved a useful background for this sort of running. With four to 'count' for the team event, there was excellent support for Freddie behind with Charlie Tait-Harris (S) coming up the first hill in 2nd place, and Will Hayward (R) in 5th. The team event looked to be a close run thing, with Sedbergh's home squad packing in well behind with 3rd and 4th place. It looked to be down to the fourth placed counter for both schools, but going into the final lap, Third Former Owen Mock (R) had pushed through the positions coming home in 7th place overall, an excellent performance for a young runner. With Hayward securing 5th place and Tait-Harris and Huxley-Fielding holding their positions, the Hunt's score of 15 was well clear of Ampleforth in 2nd with 38 points with Sedbergh having faded in the final stages. The team were delighted to take home the trophy – last won in 2011 – and Freddie becomes only the third Hunt runner to be crowned individual winner, following in the footsteps of this year's Huntsman Rory Fraser (Ch) who won the Colts title back in 2011 when the race was last hosted by Shrewsbury.

The girls' race was second up, and on the back of their superb 4th place at the National Relays in Coventry, there was confidence in the team and a determination to challenge amongst the leading schools at the championships, despite never having placed in the medals. However, the race got off to a good start with standout star Tory Mobley (EDH) immediately establishing her position at the front of the pack and going up the first hill to the ruined bothy, she had stretched out a lead of 10m and looked strong and confident in the early stages. She was followed by Tatty Hunt (EDH) in 2nd place, though she was soon under pressure from Sedbergh, Oundle and Wrekin's top runners. In the tough conditions, the girls needed to fight hard in what was a very tight race, and with Tatty dropping down to 6th place, the pressure was on, with local rivals Wrekin in the ascendency.

However, Girls' Captain of Running Lucie Cornwell-Lee (MSH) and fellow Upper Sixth Former Sophie Pelling (EDH) were motoring through the field, pushing up from 9th and 12th in the first lap, to 7th and 8th by the second lap. By the closing stages of the race, it couldn't have been more exciting, or indeed closer, with Wrekin's top runner moving up to 2nd place overall in the home straight, behind Tory Mobley who 'killed' in her first ever MANISCCC race, which was an historic win as no other Shrewsbury female runner has ever taken the individual title. She dominated the race in a time of 21.15, over one minute faster than 2nd place. With Wrekin moving up one point with their lead runner, we were pleased to see Tatty Hunt coming home in 6th place, somehow hanging on despite finding the hills very tough, just behind Wrekin's 2nd placed runner.

Down the field, Sophie and Lucie came under attack in the final home straight from Wrekin's third runner, whose slight frame seemed to float easily over the muddy final hill. It looked like the lead had been transferred, agonisingly, in the final 100m of the race, however, we were not quite sure what had happened to Wrekin's fourth and final counter, who had been in 9th place. However, when the results came through, Wrekin were announced as having taken team silver with 26 points (Sedbergh were third with 39 points), with the Hunt taking the championship title with 24 points. Sadly for Wrekin, their final counter had dropped down to 12th by the end of the race, meaning that Shrewsbury's tight 'packing' had ensured victory to take home the 'Stowe Shield' for the first time ever in the race's history. This was a significant milestone in Girls' Running, with their only previous trophy being the County Championship trophy in 2012. To now move up to take a regional championship win demonstrates a terrific progression, and it is well deserved given the hard work of the girls and their inspiring coach, Kait Weston.

The Senior boys' race was the final race of the day, with an extended course of 4 miles and with 6 runners to count. It was going to be a tough ask for our runners to retain the title (won for the last three years in a row) with a depleted side partly due to injury, partly due to five of our seniors taking part in the Northern Champs in Manchester on the same day. The course, too, would be a testing challenge, with few races on the cross-country circuit even coming close to being as testing as this course. That said, the boys were determined to put in a strong performance, and our top three runners of Rory Fraser (Ch, Huntsman), Ben Remnant (Ch) and Oscar Dickins (R) packed in well in the opening stages, all working through the field in the top seven, with Charlie Godman (M), Henry Newbould (Ch) and Henry Dashwood (SH) having got off to a strong start as well, all in the top half of the field.

Newbould sadly took a bad tumble going over one of the water jumps, twisting his ankle, so unfortunately was halted in the first lap despite looking extremely strong. It was extremely frustrating for Henry, particularly given the recent form of this young and very promising new runner. In his place, the ever-impressive Alex Perutz (Rt) steadily made his way through the field, eventually coming home as our fifth counter in 18th place, with Henry Dashwood battling through to 24th place as our final counter. Up at the top end of the competition, Charlie Godman fought against a sore hip to battle through into 15th position, with Oscar Dickins coming home in 7th, Rory Fraser placing 4th in a time of 29.50, and 5th former Ben Remnant (with two years left at the School) taking individual silver in a time of 29.04, 19 seconds behind the winner from Wrekin College. Our team total of 70 points was good enough for team silver, but not enough to challenge a very strong Sedbergh first team, whose 44 points was the result of very impressive packing from their hardened fell runners.

Despite having to hand over the seniors 'Nutter Cup' (an appropriate name in this case), it was an excellent performance from the Hunt to come home with the Colts title and the Senior Girls



title, with two individual titles to boot. Particular mention must go to our 'non-counters' whose support running was crucial in securing such high positions. Jasmine Douglas (MSH) in the senior girls' ran grittily to place 26th despite having forgotten her spikes (making for almost impossible running in the mud and the hills), and George O'Brien gained valuable race experience with 13th place in the Colts. In the senior boys', rising star Charlie England (Rt) was only three places behind Henry Dashwood, and Oli Pope pushed hard in the final stages to gain three positions and take 32nd place overall, and looks to be increasingly establishing himself as a runner of considerable promise.

Shrewsbury Relays 2014

On the back of a successful weekend of racing up in Sedbergh with individual and team victories in the Midlands & Northern Championships, Wednesday 5th March saw further trophy successes at the Shrewsbury Relays for both our boys and our ever-impressive girls'

squad.

The Hunt has dominated this event in recent years, with home advantage and strength in depth being difficult to compete against for visiting schools. At this year's relays, the Hunt won the event for the fifth year in a row, with three teams taking on challengers Wrekin College and King Henry VIII School.

Our three squads were in fact 'mixed up' to add an extra dimension of internal competition to the racing, and this proved to make for some exciting racing. Indeed, the hotly-tipped 'Team 1' captained by Whip Sean Sawyer (PH, UVI) got off to a strong start with Harry Adair (Rt, V) taking on the first 'Colts' leg of the 2-mile route along the River Severn coming home with a tensecond lead over the Hunt's 'Team 2' (captained by Mark Huang (S UVI)). Adair's time of 10.19 was an impressive effort, as was fellow Ridgemounteneer Charlie Home's 10.29, particularly since he is a year younger.

The Hunt's third team (captained by Toby Harvey-Scholes (R UVI) came in next – ahead of Wrekin and KHVIII's opening leg runners – with Third Former Owen Mock (R) posting 11.00. The second leg saw a surge from Wrekin College who opted to place their fastest runner at this point in this race. So it was Wrekin who took the lead from the three Hunt squads by the



end of this leg, with their runner Matthew Giles (fresh from his individual victory at Sedbergh the weekend previously) posting one of the fastest times of the day (9.46). Fifth former Oli Pope (PH) made quick work, however, of re-establishing the lead for the Hunt's 'Team 1', a lead that they would hold all the way into the final leg of the race.

By this point, Team 3 had faded down into fourth place, with Wrekin in 3rd. The Hunt's Team 2 looked to be too far away to catch up to the lead, with over a minute separating the teams at the start of the final leg. However, Theo Clarke (S LVI) – who has shown impressive developments as an athlete this year – got off to a lightning start and was clearly determined to catch fellow Lower Sixth Former Alex Shaw in front of him. Amazingly, as the runners came round the bend opposite the School Boat House, with 800m to go, it looked like Theo might be able to catch Alex, having worked away at closing the gap. A hugely exciting sprint finish ensued, and accompanied by the fierce cheering of their team-mates, it looked like Theo would do it. Yet a final surge from Alex in the last 20m saw him hold position and bring his team home as victors by a margin of just three seconds! Theo's time of 9.43 was the fastest of the day, and in fact equalled the fastest time from 2013 set by fellow Severn Hill runner and last year's Huntsman Ed Mallett. Incredibly, in another bizarre coincidence, our very own version of Coe/Ovett in the Fifth Form (Ben Remnant of Churchill's and Oscar Dickins of Rigg's) posted exactly the same time of 9.46 to be awarded the joint fastest Colts' lap!

In the girls' race, having only just beaten Wrekin College into 2nd place at Saturday's MANISCCC championships, the rivalry was set to be resumed, with Wrekin no doubt hungry for some revenge. The interesting variation would come not just from the terrain of the race (a flat 2 miles opposed to brutally hard muddy and hilly cross-country) but also due to the fact that this would be a 6-leg relay rather than the 4 counters needed for Saturday's race. Reinforcements



were brought in from Jasmine Douglas (MSH UVI) and Alice Sykes-Waller (MSH UVI), with the latter normally to be found on a netball pitch.

Predictions of a close race were well-founded as after the first leg, the Hunt's first runner Lower Sixth Former Tatty Hunt (EDH) – was just 2 seconds off Wrekin's lead runner, coming home in 12.01. Wrekin stretched out a sizeable lead in the second leg of over two minutes, but the strength and determination of Sophie Pelling (EDH UVI) and a swift 12.18 leg saw the Hunt draw back to give us a chance again.

As Jasmine Douglas (MSH UVI) took over at the start of the third leg, we were a good 200m behind. However the flat course suited Douglas well (watch out for her during the track season), and by the halfway turnaround point, she had caught up with Wrekin's runner, and perhaps even surprising herself, she had by the end of her lap put the Hunt in the lead for the first time with her leg of 13.25.

With captain Lucie Cornwell-Lee (MSH UVI) next up, there was confidence in the air, and her time of 12.47 ensured that going into the final leg, the Hunt were well clear of their rivals Wrekin, and with speedster Tory Mobley (EDH LVI) to bring the Hunt home, the result by this point was never in doubt. An 11.20 from Mobley was the fastest leg of the day out of all the runners, a time that would in fact have put her amongst the top half of the boys' times.


Trips and excursions during the Study Visit included:




'Extreme Reading' by Niklas Amthor (R 3)



Competition for places in the National Youth Music Theatre is fierce; it is described by Andrew Lloyd Weber as "the best youth music theatre in the world" and boasts alumni including Jude Law, Tom Chambers, Amy Nuttall and Sheridan Smith – all of whom are now Patrons. Jude Law is quoted as saying "NYMT gave me a sense of discipline, a sense of improvement, a sense of responsibility, a sense of playing a part in a company".

Harry recently won accolades for his inspired work as Director of the School House Play, 'Our Day Out' by Willy Russell (see the report by Housemaster Hugo Besterman: Our Day Out receives excellent feedback). Last term Harry gave a striking performance as Haemon in the Senior School Play 'Antigone' (see review by Richard Hudson – Senior School Play 2013). He has also had leading roles in a number of other plays during his years at Shrewsbury, including the School House adaptation of Adrian Mole last year and the Junior School Play 'The Mignonette' in 2011, his first year at Shrewsbury.

Success in Chemistry Olympiad 2014

Three gold, ten silver and six bronze medals were awarded to Sixth Form students in the first round of the UK Chemistry Olympiad 2014.







Chemistry Olympiad Gold Certificate winners 2014

Twenty-two students took part in Round 1 of the UK Chemistry Olympiad in February – 19 students from the Lower Sixth and three from the Upper Sixth. The results were outstanding.

This competition is designed to challenge and stimulate the most talented young chemists in the country and is open to all post-16 students in the UK. There are three rounds to the competition, at the end of which the UK team is selected to train for, and compete in, the International Chemistry Olympiad. Further information is available on www.rsc.org/Education/events-and-competitions/Olympiad/.

The paper itself is based on the core of the chemistry A-level specifications, so that students taking any of the different exam board A-levels can compete fairly. The exam lasts two hours and comprises a series of structured questions designed to stretch able students by making them apply the principles they have learned to new and often more complex situations than they would meet in their A-level course. Thus, in order to score marks, it is essential to have a very sound base of knowledge and understanding, but also have the ability to think and reason – often "outside the box" – at a high level.

The Upper Sixth students had been working at this through weekly sessions since last June, initially taking the online LVI Chemistry Olympiad and then beginning intensive preparation for the more demanding Olympiad itself.

The plaudits roll in for Shrewsbury's Cadogan Hall concert

Thursday 13 March 2014

Shrewsbury's musicians were on dazzling form on Sunday 9th March and their concert in London's Cadogan Hall was hugely enjoyed by a warm and appreciative audience - among them former Master Martin Knox and former Music Scholar Alasdair Thomas, who both offer their impressions of a memorable evening.

"Returning to the capital after a gap of four years, the Music Department fielded a vast array of talent in a total of eleven items, too many to cover all in depth, but here are some impressions," writes Martin Knox.

"The Cadogan Hall is a welcoming venue, comfortable to sit in, acoustically excellent, and while the unusually spacious platform can accommodate large forces, the auditorium is small enough for more intimate numbers to flourish. It was with a grand gesture that the concert began, the orchestra warming up in one of their regular party pieces, Walton's 'Crown Imperial'.

After this striking opening to the programme featuring guest appearances by young prep school musicians joining the School's Symphony Orchestra, Laurence Jeffcoate played the rondo from Mozart's 3rd Horn Concerto (not the 4th as in the programme) with panache and fine control of this very difficult instrument. He has been a versatile and prolific contributor to Shrewsbury School music as player and singer.

He was followed by the front desk violinists, Eric Cheng and Calvin Chan, stepping forward to give us two movements from Bach's Double Concerto, their "voices" blending and separating as required in a mellifluous account. The String Orchestra, under David Joyce, accompanied their colleagues in fine style.

Much moving of the furniture was needed before the wind ensembles were ready, but once in position, their contribution was worth the wait. It has been a feature of these items that the directors seek out lesser-known and very challenging repertoire. Adrian Williams brought out a kaleidoscope of instrumental colours from his brass players and Maria McKenzie conducted the Wind Band with her customary verve. "Jupiter" is admittedly familiar, but there remained the task of supplying convincing "cover" for absent strings. They accomplished it (with impromptu vocal intrusion from the audience in the big tune!).

It is fifteen years since the School Orchestra's triumphant appearance in the Royal Festival Hall. The work on that occasion was Schubert's "Great" 9th Symphony and on Sunday John Moore revived memories with a noble reading of the first movement. The main tempo was a good deal faster than Schubert's *ma non troppo* suggests, but the players were equal to the task and managed to sound both disciplined and spontaneous throughout, something that takes many weeks of practice.

The 5th Symphony of Shostakovitch was a highlight of the St Cecilia concert in November and it was a wise move to repeat such a showpiece for the benefit of new listeners. JFM loves a rousing coda and the programme provided plenty of opportunities for indulgence, not least in the finale of this work, where the "victory" of D major is emphatic to the point of parody. Paradoxically, however, the most highly-charged moment of the entire evening came with the



pianissimo ending of Bruch's 'Kol Nidrei', in which the cello soloist, Awen Blandford, was outstanding. Her sumptuous tone and eloquent phrasing had gripped the audience from the start and the hushed serenity of the ending was profoundly moving. "Superb," murmured my neighbour; and so it was, all of it."

Also among the audience was Alasdair Thomas (S 1993-98), a former Music Scholar who is now a City lawyer but continues to play the bassoon and sing in his spare time. He was warm in his praise for the current musicians at his former alma mater:

"The Music Department at Shrewsbury clearly continues to go from strength to strength under the guidance of John Moore and his team. It was particularly good to see the depth of talent across all sections of the various groups, whether strings, wind or brass. There was a wind band in my time, but as I recall it rarely performed even back at School, never mind in front of a London audience!

The performance of two movements from Shostakovich 5 was very impressive. This is not an easy piece, even for top amateur orchestras, so it was great to see it performed with such verve and accuracy by the Symphony Orchestra. I remember our making a pretty decent fist of Tchaikovsky 5 in St John's Smith Square in 1998, but this latest Shostakovich 5 gives us a very close run for our money!

My other personal highlights were the two beautiful solos: a clear, well-rounded even tone from Laurence Jeffcoate in a lively and engaging performance of the third movement of Mozart Horn Concerto No. 3, and a gorgeous, pitch-perfect and soulful cello solo from Awen Blandford in Bruch's Kol Nidrai. These two (and indeed all of the young musicians on show) must keep playing at university and beyond. If I had £1 for every time someone has bemoaned to me the fact that they gave up their instrument after leaving school, I'd be able to afford a better bassoon!"

After leaving Shrewsbury, Alasdair went on to be principal bassoon in the Oxford University Orchestra, and he now performs regularly with groups including the Chelsea Opera Group, Bloomsbury Chamber Orchestra and the BBC Elstree Concert Band. Next weekend the choir that he helps to run at his law firm will be taking part in the final of Office Choir of the Year 2014.

We were delighted to welcome several talented young musicians from Broomwood Hall, The Pilgrim's School, S. Anselm's Preparatory School and Northcote Lodge, who joined Shrewsbury's Symphony Orchestra for some of their performance. Henry Cramsie, a pupil The Pilgrim's School and Head Chorister at Winchester Cathedral, who has recently been awarded the top Music Schoolarship to the School said later:

"I arrived after lunch slightly nervous, having rushed up to London from my morning Catheral commitments. I went to the rehearsal and really enjoyed being in a proper, loud orchestra. As the day went on I felt more at ease. After the rehearsal we went to Pizza Express to refill. We then had the concert itself and I could go home exhausted."

Writing to John Moore after the concert, Mrs Street, mother of Louis (a pupil at S. Anselm's) said:

"Louis said it was the most amazing thing he has ever done, he loved being on the big stage and was only a little bit nervous at the very beginning. He said it has definitely made his mind up that that is what he wants to do – perform and play! He is full of praise for Henry Thomas who looked after him so well. We can't thank you enough for giving him such a fabulous opportunity!"

On 9th March, six musicians from Ingram's performed in a stunning concert in the Cadogan Hall, London, as described here by Calvin Chan (LVI).

Setting off half past eight in the morning, all six of us had a nice sleep in the coaches. Rehearsals immediately kicked off as soon as we arrived at the amazingly grand concert hall, for we had a long programme to run through. We had an enjoyable free time in London, especially when having our supper with our friends.

The concert started off with the Walton's *Crown Imperial* and Mozart's Horn Concerto No.3. The following piece was the Violin Concerto for Two Violins by J.S. Bach, accompanied by the Shrewsbury School String Orchestra. One of the soloists was Calvin Chan (LVI). Being able to perform as a soloist in Cadogan Hall, also representing as an Ingramite, was certainly exciting for me. I am very grateful to have this unique opportunity which has also given me a fantastic 'lesson'.

Guy Balogun (LVI) then joined the Brass Ensemble and performed two bright pieces, Millennium Fanfare by Francis Clifford and Jealousy by Jacob Gade. The second half of the concert began with Franz Schubert's Great Symphony in C Major, which was stunning with a slightly faster and energetic tempo than ma non troppo and disciplined and carefully played notes. We had Michael Cheng (UVI) leading the second violin, Jonathan Cheng (LVI) and Calvin Chan (LVI) on the first violin and Kevin Jim (V) on the cello in the orchestra. The next piece, in great contrast, a beautiful cello solo, Kol Nidrei written by Max Bruch, has brought the audiences to a completely new world of music. Then we went back to The Planets, for which Mars has raised the level of adrenaline in the audiences with all those cymbals clashes and pumping timpani rhythms. Last but not least, the concert was finished off with the second and forth movements from Symphony No.5 in D Minor by Dimitri Shostakovich. It was a fantastic, yet technically challenging, piece of orchestral masterpiece. Nevertheless, all of us enjoyed this unforgettable concert outside the home town and we certainly look forward to perform again with other repertoire.

RSSH: Clean sweep at the Spring Relays, Attingham Park, Wednesday 12th March

Spring Relays, Attingham Park, 12th March 2014

Last year, the annual Spring Relays relocated from its traditional setting in Sutton Park to the grounds of the nearby National Trust property Attingham Park. It is a stunning setting for what once again proved an exciting series of relays over the 2.3km course, with the Hunt hopeful of a strong showing in all three races at U16 level, Senior Boys and Senior Girls. Having won the U16 trophy for the past three years and the Senior trophy for the past two years – but never the Girls' trophy – we were hopeful of achieving an historic 'treble' at the 2014 running of the relays.

Despite having shown dominance in the U16 race since 2011, this year it would prove to be the most competitive of all the races, with a very strong outfit from the ever-improving Loughborough Grammar School challenging the best of our junior runners. Indeed, after the first leg, Fourth Former Will Hayward (R) had to do all he could to stay level with Loughborough's lead-out runner, with our opponents three seconds ahead at the end of the first leg. On debut, second leg runner Luke Lloyd-Jones (Rb) managed to assert himself and put the Hunt ahead, albeit by only a matter of a few seconds.



By this point in the race – despite being in the early stages – there were only two teams really in it, with the likes of Wrekin, Adams' Grammar, Dudley College and Lucton School trailing, and the RSSH 'B' team pushing through the places after solid opening legs from relative newcomer Naveen Garikipati (Rb) and Severn Hill's Scott Hatton. In the middle stages of the race, the 'B' team pushed ahead to challenge for a medal position, sweeping aside the other schools' 'A' teams with excellent laps from Port Hill duo Oli Pope and Dan Orchard, a late replacement for an injury.

In the 'A' team race, the Hunt looked to have asserted an unassailable lead through Charlie Home (Rt) and Freddie Huxley-Fielding (R) with Loughborough trailing by 20 seconds going into the penultimate lap. However, the 5th leg runner for our opponents mounted a terrifyingly swift challenge to Third Former Owen Mock (R) who had no answer to the ever-decreasing gap. In fact going into the final lap, the positions had been reversed and the gap was now 20 seconds in our opponent's favour.

Ben Remnant of Churchill's had it all to do, though there was confidence in the camp given that Ben had recently won the Hunt Club Championships, so despite being a Fifth Former, is generally rated as being one of the top runners in the entire School – if not *the* top runner. However, the job of hunting down the race leader proved a harder job than we had hoped, with the Loughborough anchor runner proving no slouch. But by the hill climb, the lead looked to have narrowed to 15 seconds, and by the top forest section it was down to 10 seconds, but the course was running out by this stage. It was 5 seconds going down the hill coming in towards Attingham House, and by the bridge with just 100m to go, incredibly Ben had managed to level



with the Loughborough runner. To the mad cheers of his team-mates and his watching Housemaster RTH (see his account: A spectator writes...), Ben somehow managed to find one last final kick, and pushed ahead with just a matter of metres to go before crossing the finish line first and promptly collapsing in an exhausted heap. It was a truly heroic performance, possibly the bravest run I have ever seen, and it made for an incredibly exciting relay race, made all the more special because we had won!

As the final leg runners came through a number of minutes later, it was the Hunt's 'B' team that took team bronze with solid laps from third former Niklas Amthor (R), watched by his parents visiting from Oman, and final leg runner Ollie Lansdell (PH).

The girls' race looked to be equally competitive, with a field of ten teams, including a strong outfit from Shrewsbury High School and our close rivals Wrekin College who we had beaten the week before at the Shrewsbury Relays. By the end of the first leg, nobody seemed too willing to take on the pace, with six teams all packed in at the front. Sophie Pelling (EDH) ran a welljudged lap to keep the Hunt in the mix in 4th position, just behind Wrekin in 3rd, and Shrewsbury High School 'A' and 'B' in 1st and 2nd respectively. Captain of girls' running Lucie Cornwell-Lee (MSH) made quick work of pushing us into the medal positions, however, with probably her best run of the season. Lucie looked strong and fluid and ensured that the Hunt were in a good position going into the final two legs of the race where we were holding back our top runners. Indeed, Lower Sixth Former Tatty Hunt (EDH) promptly sped off in pursuit of the lead runner and by the half-way stage had flown right past her to take the front for the first time. A gap of 20 seconds between the Hunt and the chasing pack had emerged going into the final lap, and with Tory Mobley (EDH) on the anchor leg (having placed in the top 30 at the weekend's UK Inter-Counties) the result was never in doubt. Tory crossed the finish line comfortably ahead, with the girls securing their third trophy of the season, an exceptional haul given that our previous best had been one trophy from the 2012 season.

The final race of the day was the senior boys, and with Marling unable to field a team, it looked like the hat-trick of trophies would be secured. Indeed, opening leg runner Oscar Dickins (R) brought the Hunt home first at the end of the first leg, getting his revenge over Wrekin's top runner Matthew Giles who had taken the MANSICCC title at Sedbergh a few weeks before. Oscar's time would in fact be the fastest of the day, and he gave Charlie Rogers (Rb) and Charlie Godman (M) an easy job in the middle stages of stretching out the lead.

Once Huntsman Rory Fraser (Ch) got the baton, the race was done and dusted with an extremely impressive lap that pushed the lead out to nearly 30 seconds. Adams' Grammar, Wrekin and Dudley College were all battling it out some way behind us, but it was in fact the RSSH 'B' team who were now comfortably in the silver medal position after strong opening laps from Alex Shaw (Ch), Ben Smith (Rt), Charlie Davis (PH) and Tom Lloyd (Rt). With strong final laps from John Dempsey (Ch) and Sean Sawyer (PH) the silver medals were assured, and this was a 'B' team which most schools would be delighted to have as their 'A' team. The gold medals, however, were snapped up by our own top team with Roman Faithful (O) and Theo Clarke (S) doing their job and bringing home a commanding victory, securing the title for the third year running.

It was an excellent afternoon of running, and having taken a total of 28 runners to compete, it was wonderful that every single won of them returned with a medal. PIM

Stunning inaugural performance on the School's new Steinway piano

Friday 14 March 2014

A capacity audience in the Alington Hall on St David's Day were treated to a dazzling recital by Welsh pianist Llyr Williams, performing on the School's newly acquired Steinway Model D full concert grand piano — as John Moore describes.



Llyr Williams

There is something quite unique about a piano recital. A single performer, often a massive feat of memory, interpretation and technique, and at the heart of it a concert grand piano, an instrument which, since the mid-17th century, has been subjected to constant refinement and development for the changing nature of public performance spaces and musical styles. In the mid-19th century, Steinway patented the process for casting one piece solid cast iron frames for concert grands, and in so doing, changed the nature of the power and impressiveness of the instrument and gave us what we now associate with the modern-day grand piano.

A Steinway Model D full concert grand is some nine feet in length and is an instrument of extraordinary refinement and complexity in its manufacture. Shrewsbury has had a fine instrument for some 30 or more years, but in recent years it has started to show its age and is now in need of some refurbishment, although still a potentially very fine instrument for years to come. So it was fortuitous when one of our long-serving Governors, Sir Algie Heber Percy, who retired from the Governing Body at the end of last year, suggested that, with a bit of generous help from himself, the School might like to think about acquiring another more modern Model D.

Together with support from the School, we have been able to purchase a truly wonderful second Steinway Model D Grand, which means now that the School has in total five Steinway Grands of



various sizes and ages, but all wonderful pianos for our students and visiting performers to benefit from playing.

And so, on St David's Day, our new Steinway received its inaugural recital from one of the UK's leading pianists, Llyr Williams, who has established himself as one of the most exciting pianists of his generation and whose playing career has taken him to the Carnegie Hall and all over the world, both as a solo performer and with our top orchestras.

We have a well-established tradition of welcoming distinguished piano recitalists to the Alington Hall. Freddie Kempf, Nicolai Demidenko, Stephen Hough, John Lill, Peter Donohoe, Pascal Roge, Joanna MacGregor, to name but a few, have all played to large enthusiastic audiences beneath the portraits of generations of Salopian Headmasters, holding their audiences in rapt attention. And these have all been made possible by the spirited generosity over the last 12 years or so of one Salopian family, Mike and Fleur Bradley, whose son James was in Moser's Hall in the early 1990s, and who himself was a fine musician and scholar. They were joined on this occasion as sponsors by Gareth Jenkins, a great supporter of music at Shrewsbury and further afield, and himself guardian to Galin Ganchev, Shrewsbury's rising pianistic star pupil.

The recitals are now presented almost in the round, in order to give as intimate and salon a feel as we can to each performance. Llyr had chosen a wonderfully varied programme of music from Mozart to Szymanowski, and he demonstrated from start to finish why he is held in such high regard by critics and audiences alike.

Llyr's brand of pianism is never brash or flamboyant, his subtle use of the piano's tonal registers always carefully considered and the architecture of the music always revealed in its entirety. His Mozart C Minor Fantasia was a beautifully executed, with Llyr revealing every subtlety of this, one of Mozart's finest solo piano works.

There was much else to enjoy in Llyr's programme. Beethoven's two-movement Piano Sonata No. 27 is a lyrical work, particularly in the second movement Rondo, whose gentle flowing theme Llyr judged perfectly in tempo and feel. Schubert's immense *Wanderer Fantasie*, multi-faceted and technically demanding in so many ways, was for me the highlight of the programme and brought huge applause from a packed Alington Hall to bring the first half of his recital to a close.

The second half of Llyr's recital consisted of Schumann's Fantasiestiicke, a series of eight evocative piano pieces, each with a title, miniature studies in programme and mood. Llyr captured exquisitely Schumann's intense romanticism, lyrical beauty and impetuous muscularity. These are relative miniatures in comparison to the Wanderer Fantasie, but no less perfect for that. And so on to some wonderful Mazurkas by Szymanowski, before finishing with Chopin's epic Polonaise Fantasie, Opus 61, a work which twists and turns through an enormously long slow introduction before finding the customary brilliance of pianistic writing one associates with this composer.





The whole programme was marked by flawless playing from Llyr, whose only reservation as he finished was that it had been a little long for his audience. Thus for an encore he treated them to Bartok's *Romanian Dance* – short, pithy, but just enough to savour after the most sumptuous of pianistic feasts.

The final question remains. What did Llyr Williams make of the new Steinway? I asked him that very question at the end of the evening, and after considering his response he replied, "Well, it actually could do everything I wanted from a piano, which is very unusual!" High praise indeed for our new Steinway, and hopefully this remarkable performer will be back to perform on it again many times more in the future.

Giles Bell's 'Team of the Week'

This week - Squash.

I would like to thank the Royal Horticultural Society for their kind assistance in researching this article. This will particularly please my mother who feels that I do not show enough enthusiasm in the garden; which reflects badly on her. I certainly bow to her superiority, as she recently won a third prize at the Upper Beeding Spring Show with nine different flower blooms. She is currently wondering where to invest her winnings; the entry fee was 25p and she won 30p! If you do not know Upper Beeding very well; it is a large city near Brighton. If you have heard of my home 'city', you may have just spotted an example of literary exaggeration! Inspired by the matriarch, in the past I have entered the Shrewsbury Flower Show in the single rose bloom category; this gained me entrance to the show as an exhibitor and was considerably cheaper than paying for a two-day pass. That loop-hole appears to have been shut now!

"Squash come in all kinds of shapes and sizes," according to the RHS "from massive pumpkins to tiny patty pan squashes. There are winter squashes (such as pumpkins and butternut squash) and summer squashes (such as yellow crookneck, yellow straightneck, and scallop, which are harvested when immature). They are all relatively easy to grow from seed."



It is clear from this picture that squash players at Shrewsbury do indeed come in all shapes and sizes. They also cover a vast range of abilities, from the casual social player to those who are willing to push themselves to the limit to win a point. Generally our squash players are of the winter variety, as I have heard that squash in the summer can lead to heat exhaustion; although I am quietly wondering if this applies to Shropshire even in these days of climate change. Therefore you may find it hard to spot a yellow crooknecked player, or indeed a scallop!

The man responsible for nurturing Shrewsbury squash is Myles Harding. In an in-depth and very honest interview I learnt a lot about the man who puts the 'squish' into Shrewsbury Squash! A man of faith, it is not surprising to learn that at an early age young Harding was dominant at St Faith's Prep School, winning the tennis tournament and reaching the final of the squash championship. (Myles is still bitter about losing, as he usually beat his opponent — who I will not name for fear of raking up past angst.) Then the competitive young man went on to a minor public school you may not have heard of called Felsted, where he made quite a name for himself with his racquets. From there it was on to Nottingham University and various other clubs.

It was clear from talking to his current squad of players that Mr Harding does not like to lose. I asked the senior squad what they had learned from playing the 'Harding way'. They would rather not be named, so we will use their 'secret codes'. 'Yellow straightneck' told me that Mr Harding tells them, "Never lose"; and 'Butternut' said he has been inspired by comments such as, "We win and that's the main thing". 'Pumpkin' told me that he loved hearing Mr Harding relating stories of his triumphant past and that he had developed a winning philosophy as a result, even if he did not always win the actual match!

The rising star of Shrewsbury squash is Alex Webb (R IV). Alex is not pictured here as he had been given a day off for good behaviour! He is somewhat feared by Mr Harding as a pupil who could perhaps one day challenge the master! He has already beaten him at tennis – a feat that has only been achieved by one previous Shrewsbury pupil (see Myles' article admitting this fact, published on the website a few weeks ago – Squash news: Rising star Alex Webb)

When I visited the courts, the senior squad were being put through their paces by their coach Mr Rutter, who was Captain of Shropshire Squash and stills plays at a very high level. There was a great spirit among the players and they are rightly proud of the fact that they are unbeaten this year (not counting adult opponents). Indeed even here there are stories of chivalrous defeat



when victory could have been theirs. Tiger Vechamamontien told me that he had recently lost a match to the headmaster 3-2. He went on to say that he felt he had to be diplomatic in the last game as he valued his school future!

The top five players at the moment are Alex Webb, Anton Nelson, George Bates, Tom Edwards, Ed Graves and Tiger. They are all in business in the under-19 and under-17 County Championships this week, so good luck to all the squashes! Make sure you squish your opponents! *GJFB*

Shrewsbury's heroes of the wettest term on record: the Grounds Staff

Friday 21 March 2014

Famously described by Neville Cardus as "the most beautiful playing fields in the world", Shrewsbury's sports pitches are still in first class condition despite having just experienced the wettest winter on record. How is that possible?

The answer is that they are looked after by an extremely skilled and dedicated team of grounds staff, led by Grounds Manager Andy Richards. Andy joined the School in 2010, having previously worked at Christ College Brecon, the British Airways sports ground and Birmingham City FC, where he was their youngest ever Head Groundsman.

Hugely respected among his peers and colleagues for his expertise in what is increasingly a very scientific and technical industry, Andy says the secret to maintaining top class pitches in the face of the relentless unpredictability and extremes of the British weather is to be pro-active. So when the forecast for much of the term was wall-to-wall rain, he and his team worked hard to make sure that the sports pitches were as aerated as possible – to enable as much of the water as possible to pass into the ground rather than lie on the surface of the grass.

The priority, of course, is to keep pupils playing sport – whatever the weather. While many sports grounds had to shut for two months this winter with waterlogged and completely unplayable pitches, Shrewsbury managed to survive the term with only ten days of no competitive fixtures and just two days with no training on the pitches. Andy works closely with the Heads of Sport, meeting daily this term with Head of Football Steve Biggins, Head of Rugby Duncan Kirkby and Senior Sportsmaster Will Hughes to discuss their training and fixture requirements. With careful rotation of training areas, they work together to ensure that the pitches are protected for matches.



"Shrewsbury's 1st XI pitch is as good as most premier league football pitches," says Andy Richards. "I'm not sure that all the boys are fully aware of just what high quality surfaces they are playing on." Recently the School has hosted Shrewsbury Town FC training sessions. Manager Mike Jackson was extremely grateful to be able to use such top quality facilities – particularly at a time when the club's own pitch and other local grounds were in relatively poor condition. "The conditions at the School, the pitches, the setting are excellent. It's a great help to us, so we thank Shrewsbury School for that," he said. In between the School's rugby and football training and fixtures, the grounds staff are nevertheless looking well ahead to the summer and have been busy preparing the pitches for cricket for weeks. "Usually the pre-season rolling begins in February. This year that just wasn't possible, so until recently we were almost a month behind," says Andy. "But the good spell of weather we've had in the last ten days has meant that we've caught up and are on schedule again now."

The team enjoy the the challenge of working on multi-sport pitches. Over the course of the next few days, they will be preparing the pitches for the final few rugby matches, followed immediately by a series of football matches. Then they will be transformed almost immediately into cricket pitches, ready for the 1st XI and U15 XI pre-season festival in mid-April, just before the start of the Summer Term. Meanwhile, the team have been marking out a lacrosse pitch in



readiness for hosting Shrewsbury's first ever lacrosse match this Saturday. As with the vagaries of the British weather, variety for the grounds staff is the spice of life.

National Junior Sculling Head at Eton Dorney

On 14th March, 27 Third Form rowers competed in the National Junior Sculling Head at Eton Dorney on 14th March, one of the biggest events on the Third Form rowing calendar.

It was a fantastic achievement to have such a large number of boys competing, especially as the bad weather we have had to face this winter has resulted in only a handful of water sessions since December. The arrival at Dorney Lake was a shock to some, as the sight of a lake 2200m long by over 100m wide was somewhat more daunting than even the flooded River Severn.

After a quick lunch and boat-rigging session, there was a bit of time to kill before the J14 octople event started to get on the water. The nerves started to build as crews were called to start boating. This hectic part of the day ran very smoothly for all the boys involved; they conducted themselves very professionally and didn't let the chaos of the situation phase them in any way. Once on the water it was a paddle to the warm-up channel before getting into number order before the start. This event is run in a head race format: crews race one by one against the clock in hope of achieving the fastest time.

There were over 50 crews entered into the J14 category, many of these having had much more time on the water than the RSSBC crews, due to their training stretches of water not being vulnerable to flooding. The first of the Shrewsbury crews set off and looked very strong into the slight headwind going up the course. Passing the warm-up channel outlet, the crew got a great cheer from the third of the Shrewsbury crews waiting to race, a great thing to hear from their fellow Third Form team mates.

The second leg of the race was with a slight following wind, a relief to some of the boys after the effort they had put in to the first 1800m section. Reaching the finish line they were greeted with many cheers from the large group of parents who had made the trip down to watch all three crews race.

The second of the Shrewsbury crews set off with huge determination and energy. They put on a very good show, only catching a few crabs (where the oar gets stuck in the water), which they recovered from quickly and showed some extremely positive rowing. As the event was run in alphabetical order, the final boat from Shrewsbury was the last of the day to race. The third octo showed amazing purpose to overtake crews and put in a controlled, consistent row – a display which made me as a coach, very proud.

After a quick de-rig of the boats, whilst feasting on homemade flapjacks and brownies, the event was over. The results were that the three boats from Shrewsbury came 20th, 38th and 41st out of 50 finishers. This result is a fantastic achievement and all three boats finished ahead of many other schools' B team boats.

The results of this event are very promising for the J14 rowers in the Summer Term. The boys now have experience of an event on this scale and have plenty to build on and develop going into the future.

In a fittingly triumphant end to a very exciting season, the Hunt secured both the Colts and the Seniors Midlands Independent Schools' titles at the final race of the League on Saturday 22nd March.

Saturday 22nd March saw the Hunt make the relatively short trip to Bromsgrove for the final race of the Midlands Independent Schools' League, and indeed the final race of the season. Having dominated the Colts age-group throughout the term, the title had already been decided in the younger year group, but there was all to play for in the Seniors, with our squad trailing Oundle School by 18 points going into the final event. The League has becoming increasingly high-profile in recent years, with over ten schools competing – Uppingham, Rugby, Oundle, Wrekin, Wellingborough, Welbeck, Worksop, Stamford, Nottingham HS, Repton, and of course the Hunt.

After a long hard season there were tired legs on board the coach, and on arrival, we were greeted with an icy cold downpour of wintry rain. However, with the race start looming, the rain thankfully abated and the sun broke through, lighting the way over the flat and fast course. The Colts would be tackling a shorter than normal 4km route of two laps, and from the off, the expected tussle between Ben Remnant (Ch) and Oscar Dickins (R) resumed, with Will Hayward (R) from the year below not far behind. The team were packing well, with Scott Hatton (S) making a strong start and settling in to the top ten, and a strong start, too, for Ollie Lansdell (PH) who now seems to be back to some of the form he has shown in earlier years.

With the team trophy already secured (and in fact the 'B' team medals already secured) this race was more about laying down yet another marker and demonstrating the significant depth that the Hunt have enjoyed at this age group in 2014. Indeed, at the end of the Bromsgrove race, our four 'B' team counters were all in the top 20 – Scott Hatton (S) in 8th, Owen Mock (R) in 9th, Naveen Garikipati (Rb) in 16th after a storming run, and Charlie England (Rt) in 18th. Naveen's run in particular was exceptional given just how new to the Hunt he is, and we are certainly expecting big things from him in the next two years.

Up at the top end of the race, after a long hard battle, Ben Remnant exerted control over the race stretching out on the top fields of the course, with Oscar Dickins unable to respond. Ben came through for his fourth 'kill' (win) of the League, with Oscar just behind in 2nd. Will Hayward (R) – with a year to go at this age-group – was 4th, and Charlie Rogers (Rb) back from injury came home in 7th, marking a welcome return to competitive racing after a somewhat frustrating season.

The Seniors race was set to be a tense affair, and in anticipation we had drafted in some of the Old Guard in Ralph Wade (Rb) and Tim Atkins (M). Given that Oundle had logged their lowest score at a race in which the Hunt hadn't competed, we were determined to be crowned champions, particularly since we had beaten Oundle every other time this season. However, as it was the last race in the League series, we knew that it would be a big field with most of the big names there. Indeed, from the very off, the scramble for positions was fierce, with Rory Fraser (Ch) and Theo Clarke (S) having to start quickly to secure places amongst the lead runners in the first lap.

At 5km, the course was again shorter than normal, perhaps playing into the strength of the track specialists, and indeed, for a time, it appeared that Theo might fancy a crack at taking on the Huntsman. However, Rory was engaged in his own private battle with Wrekin's Matthew Giles (who had won the Midlands & Northern title up in Sedbergh but had lost the previous week to Rory at the English Schools' Championships). With Bromsgrove's lead runner in a league of his own (and having placed top 10 the week before at English Schools), it was a battle for second place, with Theo battling it out for third.

Behind our lead pair, Ralph Wade was doing a sterling job of keeping in the top 10, with Charlie Godman (M) struggling a little with a hip problem that has hampered the second half of his season. We had reinforcements coming through, however, with Ben Smith (Rt) continuing his rich vein of form that this week saw a sub-8 minute benjy for the first time, and some strong running from Roman Faithful (O) in his last ever race for the Hunt.

It looked set to be close if we were to secure a team total low enough to beat Oundle, but we knew that if we had three in the top 10 and our other three counters in the top 20, we stood a good chance. The closing stages of the race were therefore very tense, firstly seeing Rory Fraser engage in a final lung-bursting sprint only to be overhauled in the final home straight and pushed into third. Theo Clarke had also dropped down with severe pain in his ear that had affected him the previous week at English Schools', meaning he faded down into 7th. However, Ralph had moved up to 8th by the finish, with Ben Smith and Roman Faithful posting 12th and 14th respectively. Godman manfully pushed through to come home as our final counter in 16th, securing a team total of 60 points. Would it be enough, though? As Messrs Middleton and Haworth furiously scribbled out some sums, it looked possible that the seniors had in fact done enough. Just. Their team total (based on your best three scores across the League) had now been lowered to 178, two points lower than Oundle's 180. However, there was a tense wait to see if Oundle had in fact lowered their score, but when the announcements were made, there was a huge sigh of relief when the Hunt were named as the 2014 Senior Champions, bringing home the trophy last won in 2012, and 2010 before that. It was a fitting finale to what has been a very exciting season, and we were delighted to return with both the Seniors shield and the Colts shield (last won in 2011 and 2012).



An individual silver medal went to Huntsman Rory Fraser in the Senior Boys and to Oscar Dickins in the Colts, with the individual titles going to Ben Remnant in the Colts championship and Tory Mobley in the Senior Girls, with both Ben and Tory notching three 'kills' (wins) during the campaign. Congratulations to these four, but let me close by pausing to mention all the many runners (numbering over 50) who have competed for the Hunt in this League over the course of the season. They have been terrific ambassadors for Shrewsbury School, and I have been proud to see them all run in the Hunt vest, running with pride, determination, and focus. On, on!

This year's Hunt Club Presentation Evening was a particularly special and poignant event, as the recently established Will Ramsbotham Award was presented for the first time.







Up to Under-16 level, Will was (in Hugh's words) "totally absorbed by anything with a ball – School teams in cricket, football, rugby, Fives, etc." Hugh describes the moment his son turned to Hunt running as being pivotal in the trajectory that his life took, and the combination of his two great loves – running and climbing – "dominated his life and gave him immense joy and a very full, though tragically short, life".

His involvement with the Hunt – where he arrived late but went on to become a key member of a hugely successful squad – was an extremely influential one that impacted on many of his later decisions, such as a gap year teaching in Nepal because of the trekking and climbing, and his route to Edinburgh University where there were more mountains to be climbed and an exceptionally strong university Fell Running team. In fact, had he not taken up a geology scholarship to India, he would have been competing in the World Fell Running Championships – and this was a runner who only took the Hunt up in the Fifth Form.

Tragically, the day after breaking the record on the Cader Idris Fell Race in June 1993, Will Ramsbotham was killed in a climbing accident on the same mountain. In memory of this truly inspiring Salopian, his fellow Hunt runner Oliver O'Callaghan-Brown (Huntsman 1985-1986) has this year established the Will Ramsbotham Award in order to reward and support a Fifth Form Hunt runner who has shown considerable promise, though has perhaps not yet reached the elite level of the club.

The very first recipient of this prestigious award is Charlie Rogers (Rb) who, like Will, has come to the Hunt later than some, but already Charlie has shown significant improvements and indeed this year ran sub-8 minutes in the Benjies for the first time. He is a young athlete of considerable



ability and potential, and it is our hope that the achievements and ambitious spirit of Will Ramsbotham will both influence and inspire Charlie and others within the Hunt as they progress on their own journey through the School and beyond. *PJM*

The Richard Hillary Essay Medal

The Richard Hillary Essay Medal was inaugurated last year and ran for a second time earlier this term. It provides an opportunity for Sixth Formers to spend two hours pitting their wits against a one-word essay title. The event was modelled on the historic competition undertaken to select fellows of All Souls College, Oxford. Twenty-four pupils volunteered to take part, and each competitor opened an envelope on their exam desk to reveal this year's one-word title, "Time".

The competition was judged by Professor Patrick Finglass, himself a fellow of All Souls College and also Head of the Classics Department at Nottingham University. He commented positively on a number of the essays, but felt that two stood out from the rest. The winner was Daniel Edwards (S LVI), with Esme O'Keeffe (MSH LVI) as runner-up. Daniel will be presented with his medal at Prize Giving on Speech Day.

The prize is named in honour of Richard Hillary (Old Salopian) and was launched in association with the Salopian Club. Hillary was born in 1919 and joined Churchill's Hall in 1931 and he went on from Shrewsbury to study at Trinity College, Oxford. He was called up to the Royal Air Force in October 1939 to train as a Spitfire fighter pilot. He joined 603 Squadron and moved with them from Scotland to join the Battle of Britain on 27th August 1940. Within a week Hillary had shot down five German fighters, but he himself was shot down on 3rd September 1940 and was very badly burned while escaping from his aircraft.

Hillary was badly disfigured and never regained full use of his hands. He wrote the story of his experiences, "The Last Enemy", which is widely regarded as one of the best books to have emerged from World War Two. He convinced the RAF that he was fit enough to return to flying in November 1942, even though the damage to his hands remained severe. On 8th January 1943 his Bristol Blenheim crashed in Scottish woodland during a night training exercise, and he died aged 23.



He is remembered today at Trinity College, Oxford by an annual literature prize, a portrait outside the college library, and an annual lecture in his honour. At Shrewsbury, his name appears on the War Memorial and his name is also on the Battle of Britain memorial in Chapel.







RSSBC: Schools' Head of the River

The Boat Club took a fleet of eight crews to the postponed Schools' Head of the River held in London on Wednesday. The event is a national competition that saw over three hundred crews racing over the 4.25-mile course. The Club produced some very encouraging results, with four of the eight crews winning bronze medals in their events: J15As (3rd of 26), J15Bs (3rd of 20), J16Bs (3rd of 10) and 3rd VIII (3rd of 6).

Shrewsbury were one of only two schools that had three crews inside the top 30. The 1st VIII came eighth (of 33) in a very tight field which saw 3 seconds separate 5th to 11th places. The 2nd VIII came fourth (of 12) in their event and the J16As came seventh (of 24).

The mixed quad had to endure a hail storm mid-race as they came in 4th in their event.

Looking through the results of various teams, as I tried to decide who to focus on in the last week of term, I found myself drawn to the under-15A rugby team. One or two coaches have approached me of late, keen for their charges to be featured in this column. I have had to gently tell Mr Moyes that this column generally focuses on success but I found it harder to ignore Mr Parsons, Mr Cowper and Mr Percival; especially when they barred my exit from the Common Room, firmly shut the door and locked it. You should also know that this article was written in close proximity to them and that they have had 'editorial' freedom to correct anything they deemed not in keeping with the ethos and philosophy of the under-15A coaching staff manual.

Mr Parsons and Mr Cowper are known by some as Laurel and Hardy which is quite an accurate comparison although I always thought that Hardy was taller! As our current Head of Drama, I am sure that Brian Parsons would not mind being compared to a screen icon. Brian admitted to me that he will miss coaching the under-15A



squad perhaps more than anything at Shrewsbury. He feels that he has helped revolutionise their way of play by instilling method acting as part of the training schedule. "I tell the lads to get inside the heads of the current England team and replicate their moves on the pitch; it seems to be working, although Loughborough Grammar had a couple of French lads and that seemed to unsettle us." Loughborough aside, Toby is immensely proud of his team's feats. He regards himself as the squad statistician and told me that the team have scored 379 points over the season and conceded only 93, giving them a healthy balance of 286 which could be a school record.
