The annual Birmingham Dinner, hosted by Richard Woodgate and organised by the Birmingham and West Midlands Branch, proved to be a lively and celebratory affair amidst the comfortable confines of the St Paul's Club. Forty-two guests enjoyed a sumptuous fivecourse meal, served with fine wines and port and were royally entertained by the excellent saxophone quartet from Shrewsbury School. Special guests included the Headmaster, the current President of the Salopian Club Peter Worth (S



1965-70), as well as current and former masters from the Schools; Mr John Alford (Art), Mr Chris Conway (Careers) and Mr Will Hughes (Housemaster Ridgemount & G 1988-90). Richard Woodgate (Rt 1954-59) and Mr Anthony Blakemore (St Paul's Club) officiated.

Following the loyal toast, speeches were given by Peter Worth and the Headmaster. In toasting the School's health Peter Worth highlighted the Salopian Club's efforts in developing effective careers support for Old Salopians of all ages, as well as the big challenge facing the Foundation to raise funds for the proposed development programmes at the Schools. In responding the Headmaster, Mark Turner, reported the School to be in "rude health", with numbers at their highest ever levels and competition for girls' places in the 6th form being particularly fierce. He explained that Shrewsbury's 2020 Vision Plan, endorsed by the governors, recognised the need to compete with schools of similar ilk, including Rugby, Oundle and Radley hence the need to invest in new educational facilities and to improve existing infrastructure. The Headmaster referred to the extended Shrewsbury family and the huge value the School places on its relationship with the Old Salopian community. He thanked those present for their continued support for the Schools and encouraged as many Old Salopians as possible to attend the Old Salopian Day on 22nd September. ADMB

A Week in the Life of Dan Edwards (S 4)

Tuesday 1 May 2012



Monday 23rd April

The dream was going swimmingly but as ever it was rudely interrupted by Shrewsbury's early starts. Nevertheless the day had broken and was to be tackled head on. I was up and off to breakfast. After running through my speech for the Junior School Debating final and prepared myself for the day I was walking on that long voyage that is the distance from Severn Hill to the main school building. First thing of the day was heavy subject of the Hitler Youth in History, with a double dosing of French grammar to follow just to test my stamina! Maths and Chemistry followed, a quick lunch and then I was off to a Junior School play rehearsal in the Ashton Theatre. The day continued but as I got to the final

lesson, Chemistry again, the tiredness started to creep in. Luckily, Doc. Samworth saw this coming and so prepared a lovely mixture of hydrogen and oxygen which, when ignited, made sure we'd be awake for a long time yet!

And so the day ended. No, I tell a lie it had only just begun. Now the academic day was over I could focus all my remaining energy on the big debate [Junior House Debating Final]. After tea, our team of three went up to the Ashton Theatre. Within ten minutes the judges and the audience had taken their seats and so it began. The topic to be debated: People who lead unhealthy lifestyles should pay for their healthcare.

Churchill's began; Sonny Koh's speech was sharp and full of vigour. Then it was my turn. I stood up, looked out into the great sea of light, and tried to think I was in Prime Minister's questions! media. The talk was very interesting but the idea of being a "runner" for the first five years of my career didn't really appeal! Anyhow I returned to house to finish off work and try and get a good night.

Wednesday 25th April

The weather was dismal, and would continue to be for the next few days. But the greyness of the sky didn't reflect into my life. Things were, as ever, busy! After a solid morning of lessons I was a least partially relieved to find I had a half day. Half day however does by no means equate to a rest. After a quick lunch I was having my weekly clarinet lesson with Mrs Landon, which although they are very productive, they also manage to leave me gasping for air as if I'd just been on a run. So after returning through the torrential downpour back to the house, I finished off some work and had a rare moment of rest.

Thursday 26th April

Thursday arrived but it kept raining. At first I wasn't too bothered, but when in my first lesson I asked someone what we were doing in CCF that afternoon and I got the haunting reply of "the river run" I was not the least bit comforted.

Lessons drove smoothly into lunch and following this I got changed for the last CCF of the year. After a lecture from Colonel David, the marines began with drill. After marching our fair share it was time for a marine's favourite activity (although it certainly isn't mine), Physical Training. For this we were to embark on a river run. This 2 mile walk and swim was to test my stamina to the limit. Our team set off and as we approached the boat house everything seemed to be going well... too well. We then arrived at the "stream" which because of the rain had become a river. I jumped in and immediately felt an ice rod pierce itself up my back. Nevertheless I trudged through and eventually arrived at the other side. Now was the long run back up the school bank and the eventual crossing of the finish line. By now we were so wet, that sitting in a very large puddle was not a hindrance, but a cooling and refreshing experience.

After returning to house, getting dry and having tea I made my way up to the Maidment Building for the Junior Wind Prize. Having slipped up in style in the previous year's competition I was determined to go out there and do well! Eventually my turn came to play and it seemed to go as well as I could have hoped, but with so many other great woodwind players around me the chance of getting an award looked hit and miss. So I was pleasantly surprised when I was awarded 3rd prize by the judge. A very positive end to a non-stop day.

Friday 27th April

Last day of the week for most people, but not at Shrewsbury! Friday was very unusually, a very normal day consisting of a long line of lessons. By the final lesson, French, the heat and sweat of a hard working classroom was seeping into my veins, and so I was relieved to have an hour in the cricket centre bowling in the nets! After returning to house that evening, end of the week syndrome had sunk in deeply. But there was Saturday yet.

Saturday 28th April

It was the weekend but still there was a morning of lessons to get through. This morning however, Period 1 was non- existent as the Rev Dobbie had called the confirmation candidates for a run through before the next day's service. After knowing what I was in for the following day, I returned to a portion of The Great Gatsby in English, and before I knew it I had found myself in the final lesson of the day, and what a surprise, it was French! Saturday afternoon arrived and the sun came out. After a swim and a routine visit to the grot shop I had a rare portion of time to myself. I was planning on using this time somewhat wisely



but eventually found myself waking up six that evening having collapsed onto my bed and slept for 3 lovely hours.

And so I settled down that evening with my Domino's Pizza and one of those action packed, explosion filled, lack of a story films feeling shattered, but in a very good mood.

Sunday 29th April

Severn Hill is usually dead to the world until around 10 on a Sunday. But this was no ordinary Sunday, today was to Confirmation Sunday. After a term of lessons every Tuesday evening, now was what it had all come down to.

So I woke at around 8:30, got ready and went down to meet my family in the Severn Hill private side. After drinks and a catch up with the family I made my way to the Library. Once here the Chaplain gave us a name card so the Bishop knew what to call us. From here we dashed to the Chapel through the hammering rain and took our seats in the first two rows. The service started and the choir, the Headmaster and the Chaplain processed up the aisle. Behind them was the person who was to conduct the service, the former Bishop of Stockport who happened to be the Headmaster's father, and whose hat Dobbie described affectionately as "a large tea cosy."

The service began and after the opening hymns and blessings the Bishop gave a sermon about what actually being a true Christian means and also how confirmation is a great strengthening of faith in which we choose to follow God for the rest of our lives.

Now it was our turn. All the candidates stood and answered questions about our faith and if we wish to follow Jesus Christ. We then went in pairs to the altar where the Bishop was sitting in a chair. We then knelt in front of him and he confirmed us individually placing his hands on our heads with a particularly firm grip I must say!

Following this there was a final hymn and silent prayers, a part of service I particularly like, giving me time to reflect over things. The congregation departed and all the candidates stayed behind for a photo. I then joined my parents in the Alington Hall and returned home with the family for the afternoon exhausted, but in no way said no to the buffet lunch that was on offer!

And so I returned to school late that evening after a successful week. Life at Shrewsbury continuing as always. As you can probably see life as a Salopian is busy, but that is what I think makes it so appealing. You never stop but you absorb all the wonderful things it has to offer on the way.


Rosie Parr (EDH LVI) commended by Fitzwilliam College Cambridge



Memories sought by Old Salopian author for book about Liverpool Ramblers

Jonathan Russell (O 1959-64) is asking for any Old Salopian with memories of playing against Liverpool Ramblers to get in touch with him about his forthcoming book on the history of the Liverpool Ramblers:

Tam writing a book on the history of the Liverpool Ramblers, probably the world's oldest amateur football club in existence which has never played in a league. Founded in 1882 (by amongst others, Bruce Ismay of 'Titanic' notoriety), it did play in the FA Cup for three years before professionalism. The club began before the Corinthians, was the first to test out John Brodie's goal nets in 1890 prior to their use being sanctioned by the FA, appeared in probably the first European Cup Final in 1907 and undertook the first ever football tour to Ireland.

Liverpool Ramblers played Shrewsbury in its first season which the school lost 4-1 in March 1883. For as long as anyone can remember up to five teams have come down to Shrewsbury every September with an early rendezvous at The Boathouse. Last season was no exception as this photo of 55 Liverpool Ramblers shows, proving the popularity of this annual fixture and the close connection with the school.

Most Salopians who have played in a school football team will probably recall playing against the dark blue and gold halved shirts of the Ramblers. Since 1945 the membership has been dominated by Old Salopians who have heavily contributed to the Club's colourful history both on and off the pitch.

The School's football masters have starred at the Ramblers Easter Festival. Robin Moulsdale brought the Shrewsbury Moles to the Ramblers Easter Festival and Robin Trimby scored a record number of goals which has not been surpassed. Mark Dickson played many times in goal for a Barry Burns XI.

The Magic Flute

Thursday 3 May 2012

When a truly execptional performance is put on by the Music Department, we have got into the habit of asking Martin Knox, after the event, to write the review. Martin has an extraordinary ability to capture the essence of these events, and to write such a gripping piece that anyone reading it will wish that they had attended.

The two semi-staged performances of The Magic Flute last week surpassed the high expectations that we always have of our musical productions, and we hope that you'll agree that Martin has done justice to them here.

These are good times for the Music Department, with performances individual and collective winning widespread acclaim. It has already been noted in these columns that singing has made particularly rapid progress, to the extent that John Moore was inspired to include a full-length opera in this season's programme. I confess that when I first heard about the planned "Magic Flute", I envisaged a cast of professionals, with some student participation, giving us a few extracts, nothing more. It was a serious underestimation of the Director's vision and of the resources in which he had faith. A bridge too far? Not a bit of it. The adaptation for concert performance, with narrators filling the gaps left by discreet editing, worked a treat in the Alington Hall, never once seeming too long, for all that it lasted over two and a half hours.

For this semi-staged production, the orchestra was placed behind two slightly raised platforms either side of the conductor. The cast, otherwise seated along the walls, came and went with admirable efficiency. First to make an entrance was one of the two guest artists, Robyn Lyn Evans, who brought a superb tenor voice and much charm to the role of Tamino. His impassioned rendering of the lovely portrait aria set the tone for the evening. I hope we will hear more of him.

In this opera, villainy seems to be associated with top notes, and it was not surprising that the part of the Queen of the Night also went to a professional, Natalie Clifton Griffith, whose vocal agility won rapturous applause. In concert attire and without make-up, she was far from being a Wicked Witch in appearance, but she captured the menace in the score and never sounded in any danger of falling off the musical high wire.

Conversely, the Queen's opponent, Sarastro, is given the deepest imaginable bass part, and for this, Ed Chapman had the range, if not always the control of pitch. Some of the serene benevolence that lies in the great arias was missing, but the acting was authoritative, helped by excellent diction.

Sienna Holmes is firmly established as the School's leading soprano, with achievements in recital and oratorio to her credit. To these she added a splendid operatic debut as Pamina, singing and acting with mature command of every aspect of the role. We know she has ample power, but on this occasion it was particularly impressive to hear how movingly she held attention in the quietest passages.

From the moment he strode jauntily onto the stage, Rob Cross was Papageno. Not even the longest round of applause (there were several) could deflect him from his total commitment to the character – and what a mature interpretation it was, rich in wit and pathos. Mastering the art of Singspiel, he slipped seamlessly from speech to song and vice versa, every word and gesture



comprehensible and relevant. Months of preparation must have gone into making it all seem so natural on the day.

Similar attention to detail was evident in the acting of Sam Ansloos as Monostatos. His mocking of Papageno's bells, embellished by a scornful pirouette, was a gem, and his flexible tenor voice was projected with appropriate vehemence. Occasional loss of clarity can be put down to the speed at which he was sometimes required to sing; the overall effect was impressive.

Gus Haynes played the Speaker of the Temple with impeccable diction and an imposing stage presence. He made a valuable contribution to the drama, as did the excellent singers who took the walk-on parts of Armed Men (Tom Fletcher-Wilson and Will Heyes) and Priests (George Fowler and Ali Webb). The Three Ladies, Teresa Fawcett-Woods, Shannon Morgan, Kate Harrison, and Meredith Lloyd (one of the parts was doubled), also made a beautifully blended sound, though the hazard of projecting words in ensemble was not always overcome. With smaller voices, the Three Spirits, Angus Warburg, Edward Acton, Alex Howard (from Shrewsbury High Prep) nevertheless did manage to get their meaning across - with commendable confidence in what must have been daunting circumstances.

Papagena, sung by Carys Gittins, who was unfortunately omitted from the programme, has not been forgotten here. Her interaction with Papageno was one of the highlights of the whole performance and their final duet was a joyful tour de force, setting up the exhilarating conclusion in which Light triumphs over Darkness, Good over Evil.

The orchestra was very much part of this triumph, as it had been throughout. In spite of restricted rehearsal time, in spite of the length of the work, John Moore managed to conjure sensitive and authentic-sounding accompaniment from his players. Huge credit to the conductor and the music staff. Before the event, I had wondered pessimistically if a piano arrangement might not be safer, but from the first chords of the overture, it was apparent that all would be well. They were truly inspired in the Queen of the Night's second aria and the Trial by Fire (not enacted) was created for us by a glowing quartet of trombones and the magic flute of Eugene To.

And so to two names that have been saved for the final bow, Jonathan May and Kathryn Turpin, the singing coaches responsible for bringing so much talent to the stage. That they had confidence in their charges is best illustrated by the fact that they resisted the temptation to put themselves forward, content instead with reading the narration – and, along with choirmaster Alex Mason, adding weight to the chorus. Congratulations and gratitude are due.

It is believed that this operatic venture was a "first" for Shrewsbury; let it not be the last. Next year is the Wagner Bicentenary. Now there's a thought.

A Week in the Life of Henry Binns (G 4)


Wednesday 9 May 2012



I also remember having to launch an egg through rugby posts, using bamboo and elastic bands. The team performed very well in the later tasks and I was pleased with how well they coordinated the skills our team possessed, and that was reflected in the scores we achieved at each station. My sport option for the day was tennis, in which the group marvel at my perfect Andy Murray serve, and my expert returns. Mr Clarke sets up a game of 'around the world', where the aspects of the School Hunt and Wimbledon are merged into a continuous marathon.

Wednesday 2nd May

Waking up and walking to breakfast, I realise that my weeks at this school are hectic but extremely short. Already I'm sitting in chapel, pondering on the same thoughts. Chapel is the most interesting forty minutes of my Wednesday, due to Reverend Dobbie's ability to create laughter in the most dismal situations. Chapel is almost immediately followed by double English with Doctor Law. His lessons give a great insight into the life of a staff member at Shrewsbury. The lessons are quite enjoyable on Wednesdays, and I find myself already walking back from Main School Building, and back to The Grove, where my books and seven pieces of chocolaty toast are waiting.

Biology and then physics are the last hurdles, in which the set is studying diffusion and plant structure, and the differences of mass and weight in physics. After lessons, the afternoon is mine, so I got my topschools out the way, including an essay given out from Doc. Law. That's my Wednesday out the way. Thursday here I come.

Thursday 3rd May

Thursday means I can finally have a lie-in, so breakfast is toast, grabbed just before lessons. After the walk to lessons, my housemaster, Mr Nicholas teaches us about Nazi-ideology and eugenics. Rugby Athletics Meeting: Saturday 5th March

Thursday 10 May 2012

In addition to a number of silver and bronze medals that were brought home from Rugby, five Salopians were also awarded six gold medals: Howard Stringer (Senior 400m), Rory Fraser (Inter 800m and 1500m), Ivan Sanin (Inter discus), Chike Kandi (Inter 100m) and James Plaut (Inter 200m).

Due to the coach weekend, we were forced to take a much depleted team to Rugby on Saturday. Those boys who made the trip, however, performed very well indeed, with several victories in the U17 and U20 categories in both track and field. Some fantastic individual performances meant that this was a very enjoyable and encouraging afternoon for Shrewsbury's Athletics team, despite the low team score which resulted from not being able to field a full complement of athletes.

The U17 category was always going to be our best chance of success, and while windy conditions made fast track times hard to come by, there was a season's best 11.3 for Chike Kandi in the 100m, taking 1st position, with James Plaut not far behind to take 3rd position in a personal best 11.8. James continued his excellent start by winning the 200m in a blistering 23.8 (all the more impressive when one considers that he was competing against boys who were mostly a year older). In the middle-distance events, Rory Fraser looked very sharp indeed in coming 2nd in the 800m with a personal best of 2:14.4, and then going on to take victory in the 1500m with another personal best of 4:47.9.

A very strong 4x100m team ran very well in 47.8 to take 2nd place, with a blistering final leg by Chike Kandi.

In the U15 category, we were heavily reduced in number, but there were good performances nonetheless from Finn McCormack, who showed great promise in the 100m, coming 5th in 13.7, and Barnabus Seager who ran a very strong 400m in 61.5 seconds to take 4th in a very quick race for this age group. In the 800m, Oscar Dickins and Ben Remnant ran well, coming 3rd and 5th respectively in times of 2:26.2 and 2:29.5. They both performed in the 1500m later in the afternoon, Remnant this time just pipping his team mate by taking 2nd place and Dickins 3rd in very encouraging times of 4:55.5 and 4:57.3. In the field, Alex Seager threw shot and javelin convincingly, taking 6th in both events, while his brother Barnabus competed in the discus, throwing 18.84m and placing 6th also.

In the seniors, Howard Stringer dominated the 200m and 400m, running 23.3 and 53.4 respectively to take first in both events. Rob Cross took 4th position in the 400m, and also competed well in the high jump, clearing 1.70m. Charles Cameron threw terrifically well in the discus, earning 2nd place with 29.45, and also came 4th in the shot with a throw of 9.50. Seb Blake ran both the 800m and the 1500m, and came second in both, with times of 2:10.9 and 4:32.2 respectively. In the latter he was joined by Ed Mallett, who ran a strong 4:35.8 to take 3rd position.

Well done to all who competed.

Celebrity Piano Recital by Freddy Kempf on Thursday 3rd May

Tuesday 15 May 2012

Freddy Kempf ended his piano recital at Shrewsbury School with a dazzling encore, Liszt's transcription of the Liebestodt from Wagner's "Tristan and Isolde". This final, virtuosic performance summed up a remarkable evening of pianism of the very highest quality. Through Liszt's amazing, extravagant writing the lyrical beauty and intensity of Wagner's composition soared majestically.

Mr. Kempf, once a winner of the BBC Young Musician of the Year competition, combines pianistic fireworks with a remarkable lyrical, poetic gift. His well planned programme showcased works by major 19th century composers -Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin and Schumann.

Beethoven's "Les Adieux" sonata opened the recital. It is a challenging work, not least because Beethoven wrote some moments of intense emotion, emotion which finds more mature expression in his final sonatas. The final section, described as "The liveliest time measurements", was wonderfully jubilant, ending with a typically brilliant ending.

Kempf's pianistic control throughout the Beethoven was equally apparent in the rest of the programme. His moments of quiet, reflective playing were as impressive as those at full volume. In particular, his use of pauses when time seems to stand still was breath taking.

Sixteen Waltzes by Brahms, Op.39, and two Ballades by Chopin showed Kempf's talent for investing popular, much loved music with the respect they deserve. Humour and vivacity in Brahms contrasted nicely with the poetic virtuosity of Chopin's 4th Ballade.

Schumann's "Kreisleriana" was the final programmed piece. Eight pieces, alternating slow and fast, major and minor keys, "Kreisleriana" is a marvellous vehicle for the pianist. Kempf's dynamic control was superb, emphasising the dualistic nature of a fictional musician, sometimes manic, at other times dreamy and introspective. It would be hard to imagine a more impressive interpretation of Schumann's master piece.

The 2012 Inter-House Athletics

Tuesday 15 May 2012



Thursday 3rd May saw the School's first Inter-House Athletics event for nearly twenty years. Almost every member of the School turned out at the track on London Road for an afternoon of track and field events, as well as a tug-of-war competition.

After the School demolished its own track in the mid-90s, a whole-school event like this hasn't been attempted, due to the logistical challenges of ferrying everyone down to an external venue and back. Nonetheless, the day was a great success, despite trying weather conditions, and it is hoped that this will once more become a regular feature in the Summer Term Fasti.



In the Junior category (3rd form only), there were some terrific talents on display which suggest that Shrewsbury can look forward to several years of success in Athletics. Nick Entwisle (SH) dominated the sprints, winning the Hurdles and 200m and coming 2nd in the 100m behind Max Paronage (S). Gene Ratanadaros won the Long Jump and came second in the Triple Jump, as well as earning 2nd place in the 800m behind Oscar Dickins. Oscar also ran in the 1500m, coming

second behind Ben Remnant (Ch), who won in a very impressive 4:51.5. Tom Breese (PH) showed great athleticism with a first place in the Triple Jump, second place in the High Jump and third place in the Long Jump. In the throwing events, Giles Holroyd showed great promise in the Shot, winning with a throw of 9.80m, while Leo Sartain won the Javelin with a throw of 25.30. Anton Nelson took gold in the discus, managing 27.15m - an excellent achievement in this age group. The relay was won by Severn Hill in a very quick 52.7. Indeed, overall honours - and a rather handsome trophy - went to **Severn Hill** in this age group, winning from their closest rivals Oldham's by 16 points.

In the Intermediate category (4th and 5th form), **Grove** were victorious, with excellent displays in both track and field. Stuart Brown (G) took gold in both 400m and Javelin, while Ivan Sanin (G) secured first place in the Discus and second in the Shot. Samson Yick (G) earned gold in the Triple Jump, and Grove also won a very dramatic 4x100m relay, which went right down to the wire on the home straight against Moser's. It was Moser's who took second place overall in this category, with some fine performances on the track from Chike Kandi who took gold in the 100m in a blistering 11.1 seconds - the fastest time of the day (and, incidentally, around the national standard in this age group). Chike also won the Hurdles in 16.0 seconds, while fellow Moserite Misha Lepekhov earned silver in the 200m behind James Plaut (S), who won in 24.4



seconds. In the middle-distance events, Otto Clarke (S) took first place in the 800m with a very quick 2:15.7, while Rory Fraser (Ch) led from the start to take first place in the 1500m in 4:50.8.



The Senior category (Sixth form) saw some exceptional performances, but once again it was **Severn Hill** who took the overall trophy, defeating their closest rivals Rigg's by just seven points. This victory was largely down to their dominance in the middle-distance events and the jumps. Seb Blake (S) took first place in the 800m, while Ed Mallett (S) took the honours in the 1500m, in times of 2:09.9 and 4:36.6 respectively, Alex Styles (S) won the Long Jump, and Rob

Cross (S) the High Jump. In the Hurdles, Matt Davies (M) was victorious in 17.9 seconds, while Jack Hudson-Williams (PH) took first place in the 100m, in a time of 11.5 seconds. Howard Stringer (PH) dominated the 200m and the 400m, winning both comfortably, while the relays was also won by Port Hill in an exceptionally quick 47.5 seconds. In the field, Charles Cameron (M) took gold in the discus and second in the shot, behind Sam Lapage (R) who threw 10.84m. The Javelin was won by James Kynaston (Ch), who managed to throw 32.50.



The girls' event was a closely-fought contest, with victories for both houses in both track and field. The sprints were dominated by Libby Naylor (EDH), who won both the 80m Hurdles and the 400m. Issy Barber (EDH) took gold in the 100m with a time of 14.9, and Anna Thompson (MSH) won the 200m in 32.9. Imola Atkins (MSH) ran away with victory in the 800m in 2:50.2, over 12 seconds ahead of her closest rival Becky Home (MSH). The 1500m was much closer,

between Amy Stockdale (EDH) and Imola Atkins, with Amy just taking it in 5:47.3. In the field, there were victories for Polly Bingham (MSH) in the Long Jump, and Daisy McConnell (EDH) in the triple jump, while Cressida Adams (EDH) took gold in the High Jump, clearing 1.35m. Lucy Emms (MSH) secured an impressive victory in the discus, managing to throw nearly two metres further than second place, while Holly Free (EDH) took the honours in the Javelin. **Emma Darwin Hall** just took the overall prize from Mary Sidney Hall, winning by just eight points in total.



The overall boys' victor on the day was **Severn Hill**, who showed great athletic skill and talent in all three age groups. Congratulations to them and to all 13 houses, each of whom took part with great spirit and energy.

The tug-of-war provided some light relief for the spectators, but it was a gritty contest for the several dozen competitors, and victory eventually went to Ingram's in a dramatic final on

what was, by the end, a rather muddy pitch!

Each age category, as well as comprising an Inter-House competition, was also the chance for individuals to shine, and the competitor who had won the most points for his/her House was awarded with a trophy: the Victor Ludorum (for the boys) and the Victrix Ludorum (for the girls). In the Junior category, **Nick Entwisle** (SH) picked up the trophy, for his two gold medals in the 80m Hurdles and the 100m, his silver in the 200m, as well as his part in the 4x100 relays, in which School House came third. In the Inters age group, **Stuart Brown** (G) took the





honours, winning both the 400m and the Javelin, and also competing in the winning Grove 4x100m relay team. The Seniors Victor Ludorum was awarded to **Howard Stringer** (PH) for winning the 200m, the 400m, and helping Port Hill to win gold in the 4x100m. The first-ever Shrewsbury School Victrix Ludorum was awarded to **Libby Naylor**, for winning the 100m Hurdles, the 400m, and her part in the victorious Emma Darwin Hall 4x100m relay team. Huge congratulations to these four athletes for their tremendous performances.

Thanks to everyone who supported this event and well done to all participants on a great day for sport at Shrewsbury School.

Henry Newbould (Ch 3) has been selected for the 2012 National Youth Jazz Collective Summer School (Junior Course). Henry's main instrument is the Alto Sax, but also plays the Baritone and Soprano sax in a number of school orchestras, bands and ensembles as well as the Bassoon and piano. Outside of school, Henry is a member of the Worcestershire Youth Jazz Orchestra where he plays lead Alto. The National Youth Jazz Collective is a vibrant National Youth Music organisation designed to support the creative and educational needs of the young jazz musician through regional outreach projects and an annual national summer school. Summer School students are selected by competitive audition, auditions having taken place during the Easter holidays across the country.

The 2012 National Youth Jazz Summer School will be held at the University of East Anglia, Norwich, from 12th to 19th August and culminates in a performance involving all participants on 18th August, preceded by a seminar hosted by Jazz FM's Helen Mayhew on "Good Practice for Young Jazz Musicians". The Summer School consists of 30 participants on the Senior course and 20 on the Junior course and is made up from the UK's most gifted and talented young jazz musicians aged 14 - 18 who will work on small group improvisational jazz with some of the country's leading performers and educators including NYJC's Founder and Executive Artistic Director Issie Barratt, Nic France, Nikki Iles, Mark Lockheart, Liam Noble, Jeremy Price, Percy Pursglove, Nick Smart, Martin Speake and Mike Walker.

Laurence Jeffcoate (Ch 5) took part in the Alderley Edge Music Festival last weekend. Alderley Edge is a large Festival running for five days in several venues and includes classes for choirs and ensembles as well as solo instrumentalists and vocalists. 'Non-rower', Dan Howie, to enter the Toughest Rowing Race on Earth

Dan Howie (Ch 1998 -03) - pictured left on the photograph - who never rowed at Shrewsbury or indeed ever until earlier this month, has entered for the toughest rowing race on Earth. As one of a 2-man crew, along with his rowing partner, Will North, Dan hopes to successfully compete in the Talisker Whisky Atlantic Challenge, 2013.. The race will start in December 2013 on the island of La Gomera in the Canary Islands and will



finish approximately 3,000 miles away in English Harbour, Antigua an estimated 40 - 70 days later. Dan is aiming to raise £100,000 for three charities; Cancer Research UK, Leukaemia and Lymphoma Research and St Anna's.

It is one of the ultimate tests of endurance which will require the two men to take approximately 720 two-hour shifts on the oars, a total of 1440 hours, facing 40ft waves, attention from sharks, shipping lanes and extreme temperatures.

On Thursday I have to be ready for School by 8am as it is Brass Quintet. I then have Double German with Dr Minns which is always a truly uplifting experience. I then have maths with the amiable Mr Lucas followed by Double Chemistry with Mr Schofield who has only been here a year. In the afternoon I become half of the dual coaching team (along with Toby Thomas) helping Mr Bell to train our mighty novice four crew. Although there is still room for improvement I am confident of success! I then have a hard rowing session myself followed by wind band in the evening. This is the hardest of all my ensembles especially when there is not much wind left in me after rowing!

Friday

No early start today. Friday lessons are nice and relaxing! Periods 4 and 5 I have IT and PSHE with The Reverend Dobbie. This is the high point of the week! Once again I have to get up early, (it is lucky I sleep well as I am in a typically well-ordered School House dorm), this time it is for the marching band. We can be heard sometimes playing in the Fives courts as people go to lessons. On Saturdays in English we have a resetting test this time on our study book, 'The Custody of the Pumpkin' by PG Wodehouse. At 1:45 I have to be down at the boathouse for a regatta. It is between the RSSBC, The Pengwern Boat club, Guildford and a crew from Paris - the vestiges of the Shrewsbury Regatta which was cancelled due to wet weather. To select our categories we do a timed 'head' type race. My eight happily set the fastest time of the day. In our first side-by-

Athletics: Shropshire County Track and Field Championship

Eleven individual gold medals, and a good collection of silver and bronze too! On Saturday we took a number of athletes to the Shropshire County Track and Field Championship at Oakengates in Telford. Several athletes were hoping to defend the titles they won at last year's event, which was particularly successful for us, while others were hoping to make a name for themselves on the local athletics scene in their first county event.

In the U15 category, Anton Nelson performed well in the field, picking up three medals: bronze for javelin and shot, and gold for discus, while Leo Sartain picked up silver in the shot. Gene Ratanadaros won gold for the triple jump and silver and bronze in the long jump and 1500m respectively. Ben Remnant also ran the 1500m, picking up silver with a personal best time of 4:49 - a very impressive time indeed for a third former, and a great platform to build on. Nick Entwisle was arguably the star performer in this age category though, with excellent sprinting performances to take gold in both the 100m and 200m, as well as taking bronze in the high jump. Finn McCormack and Sam Mitchell also ran well in the sprints and 400m respectively.

In the U17 category, Ivan Sanin was rewarded for some aggressive and determined throwing with gold medals in both the shot and the discus. Chike Kandi won the 100m by several metres in 11.5 seconds, while James Plaut took bronze. James had another chance to shine later in the afternoon, taking gold in the 200m in 23.5 seconds, with Stuart Brown unluckily placed just outside the medals. Chike also competed in the high jump and triple jump, gaining gold and bronze respectively in these events.

At senior level, Seb Blake ran a very quick 1500m to take silver in 4:19 (a personal best by several seconds), while Matt Davies picked up a bronze in the 110m hurdles. Howard Stringer stunned everyone by winning gold in both the 200m and 400m Junior Men events by a comfortable distance in his age group, despite running these events within 20 minutes of one another. After a 5-minute break, Howard then took part in the relay team, to win his third gold medal in half an hour! Admittedly, the opposition in the relays were in the U17 category, but they were all fully-rested, and their team included the individual gold-winning sprinters!

Charles Cameron, Rory Sykes-Waller and Josh Mason all threw well in the field events, but were pushed outside the medal positions by some national-level talents from Telford AC.

Well done to all who competed on this very enjoyable and successful day of athletics.

Leavers' interviews in Chapel: Charlie Straw (S)

Each summer term a small number of leavers are interviewed in Chapel about their time at Shrewsbury by their housemasters or tutors. Charlie Straw spoke movingly in his interview with his tutor, Kristina Leslie, earlier this month, and we have chosen to publish the interview here in lieu of a 'Week in the Life' article.



Can you say a bit about your background?

I was born in Chester and was brought up on the Wirral. I went to Birkenhead School, an all boys' day school. I have a Dad, Mum and Sister: Jonty, Debby and Bryony. Jonts is a Quantity Surveyor, Debs is a Cordon Bleu cook for her own company and Bryony is at Uni in Reading. We're a pretty standard family. My interests growing up were Rugby, Fancy Dress, Sailing and Ray Charles.

Why did you come to Shrewsbury?

I found out fairly recently that it was my parents' intention all along to send me here, therefore I didn't really look at any other schools. Furthermore, my uncle came here and my Mum went to Moreton Hall, so they will have been aware of the school for years. There is a history of a few boys coming here from Birkenhead, Jamie Bradshaw and I are the only representatives in the U6th.

What were your first impressions of Shrewsbury?

My First impression was probably the same as everyone else's: it was huge. Birkenhead was fairly large, but there were only sixty boys in a year, it seemed strange that I didn't know everyone's name in my classes when I came, having to make friends wasn't something I was used to as I'd been at the same school for 10 years before I came.

The U6th were demi-gods. They seemed to be fully grown adults who were unbelievably comfortable in their surroundings, riding their bikes, going into town and wearing their High School and Moreton Hall hoodies. They were feared but respected: I liked that.

The teachers were mad. Teachers were boring at Birkenhead. Here they had character and actually cracked the occasional joke (and I am not referring to Mr. Bell). I'll never forget my first latin lesson, with Mr Sheppe coincidentally. It was a resetting test and once we had finished the paper he asked us to write a short story of a pigeon that was found dead on the floor. Being the overly keen 3rd former I was I poured my heart in that essay, I thought it was quite profound. Sadly I have never seen it since...

What three moments have defined the last five years?

The first moment actually came before I arrived at Shrewsbury. It was when my mum was battling cancer for the second time that a group of old friends decided that they didn't like me



any more. I was already down, and now didn't have the support of my friends. I wouldn't say I had a rough time, but I certainly felt excluded and a victim. I still don't know to this day what I did wrong but for some reason they don't feel that way towards me. The good thing that came out of this time was that I made the conscious decision to be friends with every person I met here. I'd like to think that to this day I could have a chat with anyone in my year as a friend, if of course they like me back. It makes me sound very self righteous, as of course everyone falls out with people and some point, but I'm talking more about not judging someone because they're not popular or 'cool' or if you do fall out, get over it and move on.

The second was playing the song 'Driftwood' in the house soirée in Third Form. It was the first time I'd ever sung for an audience and I loved it. It led to being called 'drifters' by my house for a few years, but that was just banter. Now music is a huge part of my life; I play with a variety of people, all of whom are far more talented than me and have played in some great venues. I also took the first cringey steps of writing my own songs. In short, if I hadn't come to Shrewsbury I'm not sure I would have found my passion - even though that passion isn't sport.

Another moment I won't forget came last year. This was not being made a postor. Prior to the selection people would say to me that they I hoped I was Head of School etc etc. I wasn't. Firstly this was great as my ego exploded. The whole of my school career I had wanted to be a postor, but just because something is assumed to be a good, doesn't necessarily mean that it is the right thing for you. I do what I do because I love doing it.



What are you favourite parts of the school, what makes this school special?

Location wise, probably that bit at the bottom of Oldham's gap where you look down on The Quarry, the river and the boathouse. We all over time forget how great the location of this school is and how picturesque this area is.

I also think the art building has got the best atmosphere in the school and I would recommend studying art to anyone here who enjoys being creative.

Apart from that, I love the things that the school does that aren't designed to get you and A in your exams, such as Thursday afternoon activities and Societies' Hour. I really enjoy debating and have done so for most of my Shrewsbury School life. I also learnt useful skills on a Thursday such scuba diving, cooking and even riding a horse.

As you're in your final term, any regrets?

It'd be great to stand here and say I don't regret anything I've done or not done here, but I think I regret not doing art for GCSE; not going on any Spanish exchange trips; spending so much money in the grot shop; not working hard enough for AS (retakes are a pain); signing up for morning swimming;

getting a cringe-worthy quote on the back of my iPod AND misspelling it; not getting a hair cut over coach weekend.

What does the future hold?



MAGALUF! After exams I'm going for a lads' holiday with Severn Hill. All being well and I get the grades I hope to go up to Leeds Uni to study Graphic and Communication Design as I hope to end up in the world of advertising in the future. If not, I would love to become a musician and play songs for my dinner. Yet that dream is on the back burner for now as exams are probably more important.

Any messages?

Yes, I would just say that don't hold grudges with people, as you'll only end up a bitter person. Be nice and smile! We don't live a *Made in Chelsea* or *Only way is Essex* world so don't get hung up on small things, as a famous person said: 'Great minds talk about ideas, average minds talk about events and the worst minds talk about people'.

Sara Hankin's appointment as Housemistress of Mary Sidney Hall (MSH) was a momentous occasion in Shrewsbury's history. Not only would Sara become our first Housemistress (a post for which she was ideally suited, having already broken one glass ceiling when she was appointed Housemaster of Port Hill, which she ran for five years), but she was going to be in charge of our first girls' house, Mary Sidney Hall.

Mary Sidney Hall was named after the sister of Sir Philip Sidney - renowned poet, diplomat, courtier and soldier of the Elizabethan Age, and one of our most famous Old Salopians. Arcadia is undoubtedly Sidney's most ambitious literary work, a romance that combines pastoral elements with intertwined stories of jousts, political treachery and kidnapping. Sidney dedicated Arcadia to his sister Mary Sidney, and several versions of it were published posthumously after his death in 1586 - one of which was a reworking by Mary Sidney herself, now known as the Countess of Pembroke, in 1593.



By the time our first cohort of girls arrived into our newly co-educational Sixth Form in September 2008, Sara and Peter Hankin had made themselves at home in Mary Sidney Hall. After considerable research, Peter undertook to paint a stunning mural of Arcadia in the hall of Mary Sidney Hall, which has been much admired ever since.

Every so often, Peter has made a small change to his mural here or there - some of the sheep have shifted positions, a bit more detail has been added - and at

one point for fun he recently he painted in one of the girls. This caused a flurry of requests from the other girls, and has resulted in Peter spending days poised on the floor, painstakingly painting every one of the current cohort of girls in MSH, along with all the house team.

Clicking on the photo above right will show the whole painting in more detail, as well as some close-up shots.

As Sara moves on from MSH at the end of this term, to join the school's Senior Leadership Team as Deputy Head (Academic Staff), this mural has particular significance. Peter has even painted in Sara's successor, Anna Peak, with her family, who appear to be walking slowly down from the North towards the centre of the picture.

Batting first Shrewsbury made 153 for 4, with Harry Flowers notching a half century (54) ably supported by Ed Pollock (41). Bromsgrove never looked in serious danger of reaching the total and finished their 20 overs on 88 for 8. Henry Blofield the pick of the bowlers taking 4 wickets for 13 runs. The U16B side took on Lucton during the week and recorded a comprehensive victory. Batting first, the hosts put 210 on the board for the loss of 4 wickets. Ben Lyster-Binns the outstanding batsman on 80 not out. The visitors were all out for 47 giving Shrewsbury a 163 run victory.

The U15A XI were involved in an outstanding match at Sedbergh on Saturday, coming out 4 wicket winners. Needing 17 off the last over, and with the help of two no-balls and a six & four from incoming batsman Nick Pearce, Shrewsbury won from the last ball. Freddie Adair was the mainstay of the Shrewsbury innings completing a well-deserved half century, with support from Freddie Earlam. This followed a dicey fielding performance from Shrewsbury, whereby only Nick Pearce and George Lewis were the only bowlers demonstrating control over the Sedbergh batsmen. Earlier that week, the U15A XI defeated Wrekin College in the County rounds of the National ESCA T20 Trophy. They now play Ludlow School in the semi-final.

The **U14A XI** had a mixed week. First up was a dominant victory over Wrekin College in a Shropshire Cup match. The visitors batted first putting 166 for 3 on the board. All rounder stars: 'Sax and Bats' (or whites, at least)

Henry Newbould (Ch), formerly at Winterfold House, a breeding ground for some of our top musicians, has recently won the senior wind prize, beating off competition from several sixth formers. In his spare time he is captain of and wicket keeper for the



U14B cricket team, currently enjoying a very successful season. George Panayi (formerly at Lockers Park), also a Churchillian, took up the saxophone six months ago and has just won the junior wind prize. George captains the U14A cricket team and is a fearsomely fast bowler with a considerable tally of wickets to his name in what is also proving a very successful season.

An Evening of Song with Jamie McDougall, accompanied by John Moore - a review

Monday 28 May 2012

It takes an artist of exceptional versatility to bring off a sequence of pieces as varied as those which Jamie McDougall presented to an appreciative audience on Friday evening, but such was his command of the several genres that everything fell into place. Between items he added perfectly judged linking narrative, always to the point and never too long; not for nothing is he known as "the voice of classical music" on Radio Scotland.

Beginning with three of the 429 (!) Scottish folksongs arranged by Haydn, he made an immediate impression as a communicator, putting to good use the fact that he was singing from memory, as he was to do throughout. Some prefer to hold the music in front of them as a prop, but here was a performer who had such control of facial expression and body language that his every move enhanced the effect of his glorious voice. For a tenor, he has a remarkably strong lower register, without any loss of power in the high notes, which were thrillingly secure.

To Schumann's *Dichterliebe* he brought all these qualities, projecting the German text with deep understanding across a wide range of emotion. In this, as elsewhere, he was superbly accompanied by John Moore, whose playing, even when he is sight-reading, always goes to the heart of the score. The duo cannot have had even a day's rehearsal, but to hear them, you would have thought they had been touring for ten years. Coming after all the *angst* of the verse, the long coda, in which the piano seeks alone the consolation denied to the poet, was movingly realised. The performance, dedicated to the memory of the work's most celebrated exponent, the late Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, was worthy of the occasion.

After the interval, some Vaughan Williams, followed by a rarity, Britten's "Who are these children?" A chill wind blows through the poems of William Souter, their stark anger reminiscent of Blake, and the setting is of uncompromising difficulty, often pitched uncomfortably high (the Peter Pears factor). This was bold programming, adding spice to the evening.

A gentler breeze prevailed in the finale, a set of traditional Scottish folk songs, lovingly delivered. "The White Heather Club revisited" might have been the heading, as our guest evoked memories of Kenneth McKellar, in his day the Bonnie Prince of Scottish tenors. Can there in the present generation be a more persuasive, more charming advocate of this repertoire than Jamie McDougall? Backed by JFM's authentic accent on the piano, he was in his element, entertaining us with anecdote and humour to complement his graceful, effortless singing. It would be worth a trip across the Border to experience such quality; to have it brought to our doorstep is a cause for gratitude and rejoicing. Will ye no.....?

A Week in the Life of Clare White, Examinations Officer

Monday 28 May 2012

Having decided that it was unfair to ask anyone in the Fifth Form upwards to contribute a 'Week in the Life' article at this time of year, we asked possibly the busiest member of staff instead for a bit of an understanding of what her job entailed.



Clare White was appointed Examinations Officer in January 2011, taking over from Bob Kendall on his retirement in July 2011. Bob had been working here as a Maths master for many years, before taking on the (then part-time) additional role of Exams Officer in 1990, but the job has grown steadily since then.

To give an example of the size and complexity of the role, Clare rattled off a few facts and figures based on the first week of public exams this term (GCSEs and AS levels):

1,482 papers were sat during the week.

142 separate invigilation duties needed to be timetabled with, and carried out by, 78 members of teaching staff, and 12 external invigilators. All of them, obviously, have to be in the right place at the right time.

14 different rooms were used for exams that week.

5 members of the teaching staff are assistant exam officers - and Bob has dusted down his jacket and come out of retirement to help out too. Each paper is started by either an exam officer or a lead invigilator, who have to be fully briefed before each exam session. At the end of each one, scripts are returned to the Exams Office for collating, checking, and despatching via courier.

30 individual supervised lunches were arranged during the week. Inevitably, pupils will find that they have clashes in their exam timetable; when this happens, the pupil has to get collected by a member of staff immediately after their first exam, and kept out of contact with anyone else until they sit the next exam. Quite often, they will be taken to the library or a classroom before having a supervised lunch, and then escorted back to the exam hall to sit the paper that they had missed that morning. If they wish to do some last-minute revision for their second paper during the supervised period, any notes etc. that they want to look at need to be handed in before they sit their first exam.

80 packed lunches had to be given to pupils in the Ashton Theatre when GCSE French clashed with English Literature. The pupils then had to be escorted to the Gym, San or Library for their afternoon exam.

On that same day, our annual inspection from <u>JCQ</u> (Joint Council for Qualifications) took place - unannounced. The inspectors needed to see all the exam rooms and check our seating plans, access arrangements (extra time etc.) and school policies.



IT and a member of the Library staff help out. Pupils needing to use a laptop for their exams have to sit in a separate room. The staff set up each laptop, which is linked wirelessly to a printer in a neighbouring room - with a member of staff in both rooms. Pupils need to print out their work, which they have to check and sign.

IT also have to check that all the CDs needed for language listening exams are working correctly. They also provide technical back-up as necessary.

The San staff help out. One room in the San is set up as an exam room, for any pupils who are unwell. Pupils sustain last minute injuries, fall ill or have other personal circumstances which can make it necessary for special provisions to be put in place. This could involve organising a scribe or using a laptop if injuries prevent them from being able to write for themselves.

Although the Summer Term is the busiest one for our Exams Office, there are other peaks too a lot of work is done in the few days leading up to the official publication of GCSE, AS and A2 Level results in August, after which requests for re-marks need to be put in and then processed something that carries on well into the Michaelmas Term. Then there are the Oxbridge entry exams, other admissions tests including, for example, BMATs (BioMedical Admissions Tests, required by many universities as part of the application for medicine, veterinary science or biomedical sciences). Entries for the public exams in January need to be processed during the Michaelmas Term. In addition, our trial exams that take place in January for the Fifth Form and at the start of the summer term for the Sixth forms, have to be arranged. Later, the internal end of year exams for our Third and Fourth forms start just after the Summer half term exeat.

These are just some of the practicalities of organising examinations, but there is another aspect of the role of the Examinations Officer which is just as important. The public examinations are the culmination of years of work and preparation by the pupils. It can be a very stressful time, particularly when an unforeseen situation occurs for a student. It is essential we offer not only the correct advice, but also support and understanding to the pupil and/or parents to help calm situations. Our main aim is to give our pupils the best possible environment in which to demonstrate their true ability in the exam room.

The helpful and knowledgeable Cheese Cellar staff was on hand behind the display counter to serve and answer questions about all things cheesy!

Not to be outdone on the other side of the counter, our very own Chefs had prepared home-made tagliatelli and tortellini pasta with Italian breads for the students to sample. Such a wonderful spread in the dining room coupled with the tasty lunchtime offer on the serveries, meant that the students faced the puzzling dilemma of what to choose to eat – the serveries versus the Food File fodder! 


Musings from our Head of English: Why reading is the future...

2. Did you choose your house? Which one was the "best" in your time?

I had no choice. Moser's was chosen for me — my father went there, but I wanted to go to Rigg's at the last minute because I had got to know some prospective Riggites from staying there during the scholarships (the Moser's housemaster had five children and no space). I think Moser's was actually the best house then; we won all the prizes in music, sport and academics. At the beginning, our year was tiny, as we only had five people (Cooper Davies Hudson Robinson Sharp), but that's because in those days some people would come in September and some in January. We definitely had the best housemaster. He's 85 now and I'm still very close to him. He believed everyone was equal and senior boys weren't allowed to fag, so we were known as the "Communist State".

3. Were you very involved in sport?

I was never a very good cricketer, footballer or rugby player, but I enjoyed playing them all for fun except for rugby. With football I never rose above house leagues. I was very into my running, though, and I have just remembered that I was the 2nd VIII cox and we went to Henley one year. I don't think we won anything.

4. Did you win any prizes?

I think I won a music orchestral prize, and maybe a Bentley Elocution Prize one year, but maybe this is false memory syndrome. I definitely won the Hall Mathematics Prize three years running. Each year I shared the prize with the only other competitor, Richard Vaughan-Williams. I entered with him for fun. You had to write a mathematical essay. I've still got one of them somewhere at home. It is called 'Some interesting curves!' Richard Vaughan-Williams was the nephew of Vaughan-Williams the famous composer.

5. Were there any eccentric teachers you liked?

There were loads more teachers then than now whom you would call ... let's say unemployable in any other walk of life. There was Frank McEachran for starters, whom you probably know from the McEachran prize. We called him "Kek". He never followed any syllabus and was not allowed near any exam set. He wouldn't even teach in a classroom; he would take his set in his flat and encourage us to chant poetry standing on a chair. I loved his lessons.



Then there was "Morty", whose real name was Mark Mortimer, our form master. He taught classics, and so far as we could see he actually thought in Latin. He was proud of never having once been to Rome or Greece. Later in life I published a book of his poetry, much of it written in Latin.

Then there was Mr Charlesworth, a great English and History teacher. The irony here is that I later published his autobiography. For years he had read and corrected my grammar, and now I was doing the same for him! His book was pretty well-written, I thought!

6. What was the highlight of your school career?

Mmm ... it's the worst moments that stand out. Actually, I think it was leading the house to victory in Senior Paperchases, even though, after a furious argument, which I lost, I had had to surrender two of my best runners to 1st House football which we won on the same day.

7. And what was your lowlight?

I think it would have to be my first house dance, the first ever House dance actually. When the girls came in, it was literally like a cattle market, with the boys on one side and the girls on the other. There were some pretty girls, but I came too late and I ended up with a girl who was at least a foot taller than me. I went out with her once and that was it.

8. How did you feel about leaving Shrewsbury? Did you have any idea you were going to come back?

I was very sad — and quite frightened about going out into the real world - but I had no thoughts of return.

9. And with the Olympics coming up: if you were in an Olympic event, which one would you choose?

Oh, crikey

Athletics: Shropshire County Track and Field Championship

An excellent victory for the junior team of James Plaut, Nick Entwisle, Sam Mitchell, Jiro Wongsrisuk, Gene Ratandaros, Oscar Dickins, Anton Nelson, Leo Sartain, Tom Flowers and Jonathon Hurcomb at the Repton fixture over the weekend. The senior team were third up against teams from Repton, Welbeck College and Worksop College.

On Saturday we took two teams to the Moorways Stadium in Derby, for a four-way competition against Repton (the hosts), Welbeck and Worksop. Due to small numbers in the 6th form because of exam leave, the usual junior, inter and senior teams were merged into two: Under 16s and Over 16s. We had considerable success in the Under 16 category, winning the event, with some terrific performances on a very hot afternoon. The over 16s were less fortunate, with a weakened team through injury and absence, but still managed a respectable third place. Again, there were some notable individual performances in this category.

In the Under 16s, James Plaut (S) and Nick Entwisle (SH) forged a dangerous partnership in the sprints, taking second and third places in the 100m and first and second in the 200m (James just pipping Nick in both cases). James will be very pleased with his 11.13 in the 100m, a personal best over this distance. Further success came in the 400m, where we took first and second again, this time with fantastic running by Anton Nelson (S) and Jiro Wongsrisuk (O), taking the top two places with a comfortable gap in front of their nearest competitor. In the 800m and 1500m, Freddie Hill (Rt) ran very well in spite of an injury, taking 2nd in the 800m (after a somewhat illadvised 59-second first lap) in a time of 2:21, ahead of fourth-placed Gene Ratanadaros (O) in 2:24 - rather a conservative performance from him, but understandable in the heat! The 1500m saw Ben Remnant (Ch) put in another commanding display, taking second place from Freddie in third, in a time of 5:00 exactly. Jiro Wongsrisuk and Charlie Rogers (Rb) were pushed hard in the Hurdles, taking 4th and 6th in a non favoured event for both of them. In the field, there were strong efforts from Gene Ratandaros in the long and triple Jump, winning the long but only managing sixth in the triple, behind James Plaut in 5th. Jonathan Hurcomb (I) put in a fine performance in the High Jump, taking second, ahead of Nick Entwisle in fourth. Anton Nelson threw the discus very well, taking second place with a throw of 25.25, but could only manage sixth in the Shot. New Recruit Tom Flowers (I) also threw well, taking fifth in the discus and fourth in the javelin, while Ben Remnant took sixth in the latter event. The relay team managed a very creditable second place in 49.53, which is very quick indeed for a team with two thirdformers in it, up against generally older and larger opposition!

In the Over 16s, there were good runs from Seb Blake (S), who took second in both the 800m and 1500m, in 2:14 and 4:40 respectively. Chike Kandi won the 100m in a blistering 10.75 seconds which, if accurate, sets a new course record and a personal best at that distance. Another personal best went to Stuart Brown in the 400m, who came second in a time of 56.44, a fantastic effort from him. Nick Douglas also ran very well in the 100m and Hurdles, picking up valuable points and a very decent time in the case of the 100m - 11.43. Rory Fraser came back from injury to run well in the 800m and 1500m, but the heat took its toll and he placed fifth in both events. In the field, Chike Kandi picked up second in both the High Jump and Triple Jump, while Ivan



Sanin came fourth in both the Shot and the Discus, which considering he was up against competitors up to two years older than himself, is a significant achievement. The same goes for Stuart Brown, who added to his 400m success with a very impressive 3rd place in the javelin. Our Over 16s relay team was once again a force to be reckoned with, but without two of our regulars in Howard Stringer and Matt Davies, were always going to find it difficult. They managed third place in 46.88, which is actually the fastest our relay team has run this season, so well done to them.

Overall, we were extremely pleased with our performance this weekend, and the signs are there among the Junior years that we could be in for some real successes in years to come as they progress. Well done to all who participated.
