## Update on the Events Leading up to James Taylor's Enforced Retirement.

By now you will have all heard about the retirement of James Taylor, but the following article gives more information about the actual events on the day of his diagnosis and the long term impact of his condition.



Following the shocking news of James Taylor's enforced retirement from cricket, James has been tweeting regular updates about his progress but has, perhaps not surprisingly, been fairly quiet about the actual events leading up to the diagnosis of his heart condition. Speculation had been that the illness was picked up during a routine check-up following a suspected virus, however this was not the case.

On the 1st May the BBC News Sports Correspondent, Joe Wilson, posted a moving interview on the BBC website. In it James describes the frightening way in which he was taken ill during a routine training session and the fact that he thought that he was going to die. It's even more shocking to realise quite how close he actually came.

On 2nd May the website <u>www.espncricinfo.com</u> published a more detailed interview, which had been requested specifically by James himself. This actually makes quite difficult reading for friends and fans and indeed for anyone with a heart. We get the full detail of how events unfolded and just how incredibly close this came to being a terrible tragedy and a life cut short;



but whilst we are all thankful for the fact that it is not, it is impossible at the same time not to appreciate the awful injustice in James' situation and the conflicting emotions he must be experiencing. It's heartbreaking stuff.

In both interviews James takes the time in his interview to praise the NHS and the 'unbelievable' way in which he has been cared for. He says "I owe so much to them and I will continue to support them in any way I can."

Recovery is going to take a long time and a huge amount of adjustment. For the time being James carries a defibrillator, connected to a heart monitor, which will kick into action if required. As a result he is able to get out and about, although he is only allowed to walk until more is known about how much exertion his body can take. He hopes to have an internal defibrillator fitted next month.

Above all James Taylor's resilience, positivity and immense likeability shine through at all times in both of these interviews.

The sun came out, the birds were singing and there was a feeling that summer was really on the way. Reaching for my dark glasses and my sun hat, I ventured forth in search of a summer activity. A good session in the nets with a variety of youthful Ian Bothams meant that I was a little late to capture the full tension of a tennis match between Shrewsbury and Ellesmere girls.

I caught up with Jenny Hill who had been playing with her partner Esther McLaughlin. Jenny was pleased with how the match had gone. She and Esther had won a closely contested set 6-3. The score had been 3-3 until the Ellesmere pair wilted in the heat and Jenny and Esther's superior fitness came into play.



Jenny was quick to praise Shrewsbury School Tennis coaches Matthew Clark and Nicola Bradburne. "I must quickly praise Mr Clark and Mrs Bradburne. They are living embodiments of the concept of treating your body as a temple."

Just then, as if by magic, Mr Clark appeared and offered Jenny a few tips on her sliced backhand. Jenny told me that Mr Clark is one of the few coaches that she has encountered who is able to communicate his ideas without a racket and dressed in a sharp suit.





"Mr Clark is just a supreme coach. He makes tennis so much fun and so accessible. He gets on his invisible skate board and just brings a freshness and uniqueness to the game." Jenny told me that her parents had been keen tennis players but that she had recently lost her mother to golf, for which she blamed her father. I asked Mr Clark if the fact that Jenny's father was a Chief Superintendent had any bearing on her place in the team. Looking slightly nervous, Mr Clark asked me if he was watching. Realising that the coast was clear, Mr Clark relaxed and denied any such accusation. "I am innocent of that charge and many others," he told me.

Antonia Wordie and Ursule Taujanskaite played an epic match and were clearly revelling in the atmosphere at the Gorswen courts. "It is better than Wimbledon," Antonia told me. Ursule claimed that she had won at Wimbledon with Antonia. "Why would it, when I played tennis at Leeds and Brighton with my friends?" This was of course the kind of honest reply I expected and we can be clear that there was no rivalry between the coaches at all.

The Ellesmere team were very friendly and told me that they enjoyed playing on the high quality courts. I think what they were trying to say is that Shrewsbury is full of bounce. They were victorious on the day but my tutee Mima Price explained that tennis is about sharing the love. "You have to sacrifice to love sometimes," she told me. Wise words indeed, but that comes as no surprise as she did have the foresight to choose me as a tutor.

It is clear that girls' tennis is in rude health at Shrewsbury. The under-15s were not on the courts that afternoon as they were all playing cricket, such is the demand for their talents.

## Preparing for this summer's Medic Malawi Expedition

Wednesday 4 May 2016

Our third Community Service trip to Malawi takes place in July. For the first time, it will be a joint venture with The Shewsy, our Youth Club in Liverpool.



Nineteen young people will travel and work together at the project run by the charity Medic Malawi, which includes a hospital, two orphanages and 'The Shrewsbury School Eye Clinic'.

This year has been tough in Malawi: the rains were late and inadequate, and the Hospital's Malnutrition Centre has been a lifeline for adults and children. The Community Service expedition will include the chance to see the work of the Shrewsbury Eye Clinic first hand, as patients have their sight restored. Students will be painting the new bakery, built to generate income for the hospital, and will be helping out at the orphanage, which cares for over 100 children, from newborns to teenagers.





Preparations for travelling to Malawi took place in Liverpool and Shrewsbury last week.

Getting to know the others on the trip was the priority for Sunday's visit to Liverpool, and this included team games based on Twister, teaching each other good hand-washing techniques, buying and selling in a 'market stall' and chatting over fish and chips. The Liverpool contingent took us on a 'Ferry 'cross the Mersey', and as we munched our McDonald's, it no longer seemed to matter particularly whether an individual was a Fifth or Sixth former, from Everton or Shropshire.



Sir Eldryd Parry, OS and former President of the Salopian Club, is a leading expert on Medicine in African Hospitals, and it was a great delight and privilege that he was able to speak to the Medic Malawi team, combined with the Medical Society.

His principles are based on understanding the person and their environment, before applying the science, and he emphasised the importance of respectful, careful listening and learning by observation. His case studies were carefully chosen from his own visits to Malawi, and it was fascinating to see how individual cases – a man's wounded hand, for instance – were described compassionately in the context of his livelihood, his working day, climate change and GM crops.





For those going to Malawi, his advice was to 'watch and learn'; for those going into medicine, he advised depth, not breadth: keep returning to the same country, to the same hospital, to deepen your understanding.

The team are planning a 'Busking in Shrewsbury' day on Saturday 21st May. They are in need of adult collectors; if anyone is able to volunteer as a collector for an hour or so between 10am and 3pm, please email ljd@shrewsbury.org.uk.

#### David Harrison Mathematics Prize




## Prep School Chemistry Shows keep on burning

Last Thursday, the Chemistry Department hosted another action-packed chemistry enrichment afternoon — this time with two prep schools: the Year 7 scholars from Birchfield and Year 8 pupils from Terra Nova, accompanied by their respective Heads of Science.

As the visits gain momentum this term, Senior Chemistry Technician Rachel Schofield has had a very busy time developing new ideas with Head of Chemistry Dr Andy Briggs and Chemistry Technician Kathryn Davidson.

The 18 pupils from Birchfield and Terra Nova had a whistle-stop tour of the Chemistry Department and prep room during their visit. The extent of our facilities was an insight into the science opportunities at Shrewsbury School. They then gathered in the Science Lecture Theatre for flash and bang demonstrations by Dr Briggs. A few enhancements to the show meant there were lots of flames, sparks and bangs, which the pupils may not have had much opportunity to see close up before. The show highlights the sights and sounds that is real chemistry at work. It seems the more dangerous the demonstration, the more eager the volunteers!




Moving on into one of the chemistry laboratories was where the real hands-on experiments of the afternoon took place and also where the pupils could experience the 'smells' of chemistry. This time they were able to use some household items which let them get their hands dirty too.







We endeavour to keep revising the experiments we offer the prep school pupils, to allow them to experience a variety of chemical situations and reactions themselves. In groups of twos and threes, the pupils had access to some equipment they do not often use in prep schools, including chemical solutions, polymer reactions, the magic egg in a bottle trick and most enjoyable flame tests; liquid nitrogen is always a highlight.





The pupils from both schools were very well-behaved and polite. They demonstrated excellent lab skills and concentration in a busy lab environment. It was a pleasure to host them and meet some girls and boys who will join us at Shrewsbury in September.

The finale was assisted by a fierce wind in the science quod, which made the exploding elephant's toothpaste even more dramatic - probably our best ever version of this demonstration.

With a few gifts to take away, it was another very successful and enjoyable afternoon.

#### Shrewsbury cadets visit adventure centre

It was an exciting day for some pupils of the CCF as we embarked on a new activity for Field Day. Stand up paddle boarding, or 'SUPPING' as it's called, is a crossover between surfing and kayaking. Finally, the day finished with Lazer tag, which is a slightly less painful version of paintball. The cadets had the opportunity to employ all the fieldcraft skills they had learnt to date, or they had the option to employ their own tactics! #### RAF glide on thermals

The day started with us unpacking the hangar and wheeling the gliders out on to the airfield. Once out, we were all briefed on the day's circuit and the likely changes in wind direction. The morning was good, however the thermals had not developed much energy so we flew a simple



circuit a few times. We stopped for lunch around 1:15, by which time we were all starving. The Gliding Club's café was very much appreciated and I think by far the most popular meal was the 'ham, egg and chips', which was delicious. After a good morning we were delighted to find some fantastic thermals developing.

After clearing the airfield of sheep and horses (for the second time in the day) I flew in a sheared thermal with what looked to be a buzzard following us up until around 3000 feet before pulling out and doing multiple reduced G dives and a spin as well. I stayed in the air for around 40 minutes and struggled to descend in the strong thermals in the end, resorting to stalling and opening the air brakes.

Once I touched down, it was nearly time to go. So after a fantastic day in the sun, we repacked the hangar and left for school.



## Cambridge University Choral Scholarship








## Transit of Mercury



## 'Fun and Flames' - Prep School Chemistry Show

Wednesday 11 May 2016

Another Thursday, another Chemistry Enrichment Afternoon. This week the Chemistry Department welcomed 16 enthusiastic Year 7 pupils from Packwood Haugh.

Sixteen Year 7 pupils from Packwood Haugh School accompanied by Head of Science Mr Richard Herzog were entertained by demonstrations and experiments, designed by Senior Chemistry Technician Rachel Schofield, Head of Chemistry Dr Andy Briggs and assisted by Chemistry Technician Kathryn Davidson.

A brief introduction to our Chemistry Department and an eye-opening peek into the prep room started a great afternoon with an incredibly enthusiastic group of bright pupils.

Following this, the pupils gathered in the Science Lecture Theatre (SLT) for flash and bang demonstrations by Dr Briggs. There were flames, sparks and bangs a-plenty - and just as many volunteers - so everyone managed to take part. It was a great opportunity to see, smell and feel chemistry up close.



After the session in the SLT and because it was a very warm day, the pupils were welcomed into the chemistry laboratory with a surprise special treat of 'dry-ice' (solid CO2) cooled blackcurrant squash.





They then had a circus of multiple hands-on experiments to perform, which allowed them to get their hands dirty (and smelly) too!







We endeavour to keep revising the experiments we offer the prep school pupils, and all lab space was utilised with activities that would allow them to experience a variety of chemical situations and reactions themselves. In small groups, the pupils had access to some equipment they do not often use in prep schools, including chemical solutions, polymer reactions, dry-ice and liquid nitrogen. Household items have been brought into the session to show the pupils how they can perform chemistry at home (subject to parental approval!). A particular favourite now is making plastic from milk, which the pupils can take home once it's dried.



The pupils were very well behaved, enthusiastic in their questions and their answers and very polite. It is always a pleasure to host pupils with excellent lab skills. It was also fun sharing our facilities with siblings of current pupils.

The finale was the 'elephant's toothpaste' demonstration, and everyone went away with the satisfaction of having had a successful and enjoyable afternoon. Mr Herzog later commented, "Thank you so much for yesterday. Hugely enjoyed by both children and myself. I really appreciate the time and effort that goes into doing something like that." Roll on next Thursday...

## OSGS Make it to the Semi Final of the Halford Hewitt

Wednesday 11 May 2016

The Halford Hewitt has been described by the golf writer Nick Tremayne as 'the greatest of all truly amateur tournaments'. Founded in 1924 it is competed for today by the old boys of 64 English and Scottish public schools which each field five foursomes pairs, making 640 competitors in all. The sheer size of the "field" - plus the hundreds of supporters who routinely turn up - is part of what makes the "Hewitt" a unique sporting event. The tournament has a rich history, frequently pits average golfers against famous internationals, and produces moments of golfing pressure simply not experienced by amateur players elsewhere.

The OSGS made it to the semi-final this year, for the first time since 1993 and you can read Andy Pollock's fantastic account of the tournament blow.

#### Andy Pollock writes:

In the last couple of years we have lost in the second round in very closely contested matches against good sides. This year's draw gave us a first round draw against Hurtspierpoint, who are not one of the stronger schools in the competition, but the rest of our part of the draw was packed full of strong sides, so to progress beyond round two we knew we would have to play well.

Three of our stronger players, David Cassidy, Mark Ferguson and Alex Stewart, were unavailable due to business reasons but everyone else had played in a number of warm up matches and they were keen to progress further than previous years.

After our practice round one of the Hurtspierpoint team had been overheard in the changing rooms saying that Shrewsbury were only a middling Hewitt school these days and they fancied their chances. We knew it would not be a pushover but that was helpful motivation. Jon Howse and Richard Roberts out top won 2 and 1, Will and Jonty Campion at two won 3 and 2, James Skelton and captain Andy Pollock at four won 4 and 3 and we were one up in both the other matches. Job done but the prospect of two matches on Friday due to our position at the top of the draw was daunting.

First match out on Friday we faced the winners of Oundle and Malvern, both schools with a good record in the Hewitt. Oundle it was who beat Malvern 3-2 when the Malvern last pair missed a four footer to take it down to nineteen. Six of our side and six of the Oundle side had played against each other in 2010 when we lost to them three and a half to one and a half, the Campions being the only winners.

We decided to re-order our side with Will Painter and Simon Shepherd moving from five to first and they only lost on the eighteenth after a great scrap with Oundle's strong top pair. Howse and Roberts also lost by 2 and 1 playing second. The Campion brothers won 2 and 1, James Skelton and Andy Pollock won 3 and 2 leaving it to our inexperienced fifth pair, Angus Pollock and his nephew James.



Oundle had an eight footer on the eighteenth to win which they left short. James smote one miles down the middle of nineteen, Oundle were shorter off the tee in the light rough and proceeded to put their second in the water in front of the green. Angus hit long and left into the second cut of rough. Oundle play their fourth to fifteen feet past the pin and James, conscious that a thin puts us in the water, leaves it short for Angus to hole out from fully sixty feet!!

Angus had captained the Shrewsbury Saracens in two Cricketer Cup finals against Oundle in 1988 and 1989 both of which Oundle won narrowly so it was fitting that he should hole the winning putt from twenty two yards!!

A strong Cranleigh side were our next opponents on Friday afternoon. They had beaten Merchiston, winners a couple of years ago, in the first round and Canford, another strong side who usually do well as do Cranleigh. Their supporters were already booking their accommodation for Friday evening.

We decided to change the order again. Howse and Roberts back to top after a pep talk from the captain to make sure they finish off early good work and they deliver 2 and 1. The Campions at two are in a real ding dong and always behind. James Skelton and Andy Pollock playing at three face a plus one handicapper from Sunningdale and John Davies, who played in four Walker Cups in the 1970's!! Playing at four the James and Angus Pollock combination are still on a high from their win in the morning and coast to a 3 and 2 victory and it is tight in match five.

The Skelton and captain's match is a real ding dong, one up, one down that sort of thing. Square at the turn Shrewsbury win ten, eleven, twelve. Cranleigh then go birdie birdie at thirteen and fourteen!! On the eighteenth tee Shrewsbury are still one up but ahead the Campions have fought back from three down with four to play and are moving to the nineteenth tee so there are two chances to win the overall match.

On the eighteenth after two good drives and second shots just off the green, Cranleigh are four feet away in three with Shrewsbury eight feet away. Cool as a cucumber James Skelton holes out to win the match. Ahead the Campions had two for it on the nineteenth and pair five were all square coming down the eighteenth. A very fine victory with all members of the side make a strong contribution.

It was such an exciting day that former Hewitt stars Anthony Parsons and Peter Broad who were there to support us stayed until the last putt was sunk in the evening. They had told us the night before that even if we won in the morning they would have to leave at lunch time!!!

The advantage of playing twice on Friday is that you only have one match on Saturday so we had a leisurely breakfast as we awaited the outcome of the Edinburgh Rossall match. At 12.30 we teed off against Rossall against whom there have been many famous matches in the past. We decided to go with the same order.

They were very confident in their first three with some young blood, one of whom was a young pro just returned to Amateur status. Howse and Roberts, now galvanised, sailed through 4 and 3 with a barrage of birdies, the Campions out second succumbed and James Skelton and Andy Pollock held on to the coat tails of the pro for as long as they could before the birdies started and lost 4 and 3.

Angus and James still on a high from the day before sailed through 3 and 2 giving Will Painter and Simon Shepherd the chance to show what they could do. Two up with two to play they



managed to lose seventeen to a six!! Rossall got up and down on eighteen to take it down nineteen.

It had rained heavily all day and nineteen was playing into a strong wind so getting there in two was impossible which suited us as Will and Simon never went for it in two even with the wind behind!!

Both pairs on in three, nothing much in it, probably about twenty five feet with Rossall's putt slightly easier but not straightforward. Simon's putt was a beauty and died on the lip of the hole. They left their's eight feet short and missed the next putt. Shrewsbury in the semi final for the first time since 1993 and we have to quickly find some accommodation!!

Radley are the opponents in the semis, they have been there or thereabouts for the last ten or fifteen years so have plenty of experience. We are all not sure what is going on! Another change in the batting order as we move James and Angus to two and the Campions to three with the captain and James Skelton to four.

Howse and Roberts win a great match on the eighteenth. James and Angus, playing arguably the Radley strongest pair manage to take it to sixteen before recording their first loss. The Campions against another strong pair also finish second. Skelton and the captain are in another real ding dong, all square on the sixteenth tee but putts from the captain on sixteen and seventeen failed to drop and it is not to be. The fifth pair took an honourable half.

It was a great few days, everyone enjoyed themselves and the team spirit was fantastic. The fact that everyone during the run played a crucial role at some point was very satisfying. Jon Howse and Richard Roberts have turned into a very fine top pair. Will and Jonty Campion, with over thirty years experience each are a match for anyone, former Cambridge blue James Skelton and Andy Pollock are a strong combination. Will Painter has played in 114 matches and even in his early sixties still plays a good game of golf and his partnership with Simon Shepherd was very successful, neither are long off the tee but chip and putt very well.

The surprise pairing was Angus and James Pollock. Previously not automatic picks for the side, although both had played four matches before, going into the semi final they had the best win percentage of any pair, three wins, and a half when they were leading anyway. Under extreme pressure they delivered against Oundle in the second round and then won their next two matches convincingly setting up the wins for the team.

As stated at the beginning, Messrs Cassidy, Ferguson and Stewart were unavailable. Ed Lowes and Mike Thelwall-Jones, both former team members are both playing regularly again and hopefully will be back again before too long.

The average age of this year's side was 49 and an average handicap of 4.2. If you would like to help get the average age and average handicap down please do not be shy in coming forward. There is a great spirit in the Shrewsbury squad and we hope that may have been excited by the report of our run this year and you may wish to come and experience it for yourself. The Halford Hewitt is one of the most interesting and exciting competitions in which to play.

They went on

#### House Quiz Competition

Thursday 12 May 2016

Seventeen teams entered this year's House Quiz; just four made it through to the final, which took place in the Ashton Theatre on 6th May. Quizzing at Shrewsbury follows a format similar to that of BBC TV's 'University Challenge' and is organised by Dr Oakley, captain of the victorious team from Corpus Christi College, Oxford in 2005.

After seventeen preliminary matches including a couple of rematches, Ingram's, Oldham's, Rigg's and Churchill's took to the stage of the Ashton Theatre for the House Quiz Finals. Although Dr Oakley comperes the early rounds, he retreats to the lighting box to make way for Mr Percival's 'Paxmaniacal' patter for the final three matches.

Ingram's, who had previously seen off a much fancied Ridgemount team on a sudden death tiebreak, were extremely convincing in their semi-final win over Oldham's. They shared the starter questions with each team member getting at least two correct. Harvey Hancock made the biggest contribution with 80 of their 225 points, just shy of the Oldham's team total of 90.

The second semi-final saw Rigg's take on Churchill's. Rigg's had chalked up easy wins over The Grove and Churchill's B, whereas Churchill's had had much closer and more controversial encounters. ## Shrewsbury athletics team compete in the Achilles Relays

Thursday 12 May 2016

On Thursday 5th May Shrewsbury School was represented at the Achilles Relays in Oxford, arguably the most prestigious date in the Athletics calendar. (They take place on the 'hallowed ground' of the Iffley Road Track, where Sir Roger Bannister broke the four-minute mile in 1954.) The School took four teams: at U15, U17 and U19 categories for the boys, and one U17 girls' team.

The clash with Field Day for the Third and Fourth Forms made our teams a little thin in the younger age categories, so many of those who went were asked to do rather a lot of running! We were at full strength in the U19 boys category, though, and confident of some success here with the quality of sprinters and longer-distance runners we have. A core of four Fourth and Fifth Form girls (all from The Grove) made up our U17 girls' squad.



Warm conditions greeted us in Oxford, which certainly poved to be a factor in the latter stages of the event, especially in the 4 x 800m races. The heats for the 100m were first up, and though none of our teams progressed at this distance, we were at least competitive and were unfortunate not to get through in the U19 category, where we only narrowly missed out.





We had better success in the 4 x 200m, where the U17 girls and the U19 boys progressed through to the final with some excellent running and nice, smooth change-overs. We only entered one team in the 4 x 400m, in the U19 boys, and though we only had one 400m specialist, the team put on a very good display against some strong opposition and qualified through to the final. In the 4 x 800m, the U17 boys did well to come 5th in their event, while the U19 lads went one better with 4th, averaging just 2:14 per leg – an excellent show of strength here.



In the final of the 4 x 200m, the U17 girls managed a really encouraging 5th place, up against some of the best schools in the country – a sign of real growth here since last year. In the U19



category for the same distance, the boys managed to hold on to 5th place in the final straight, despite not being the best prepared. (They'd munched their way through some sandwiches just beforehand, not knowing they'd qualified!) This was one event too far for them though, and since two of these runners were slated for the final of the 4 x 400m final, we decided not to contest it – some of them had already run four races, and were exhausted!

Overall, while we may have been a bit disappointed not to come away with any medals, there were some excellent team performances here and a great day of athletics was had by all. There are signs of real strength here for the rest of the season. Well done to all who competed. *IPH*

In the first part of the programme, a string quartet by Saint-Saëns, all four proved equal to the technical demands of the work and produced a notably rich sound. The excellent acoustics of the auditorium have never been more in evidence. David Joyce was a confident, eloquent leader, ably supported in the first item by Jayne Robinson, and by Fanny Cobus (viola) and François Ragot (cello) in both. We are grateful to the latter two for making the long journey from the South of France to lend their expertise to the venture. They radiated commitment and enjoyment in everything they did.

Conscious of the looming shadow of Beethoven, Brahms famously delayed the composition of a symphony, but his piano quartet is a mighty work, symphonic in scale and given here an impassioned, noble reading. At the piano, John Moore gave a performance that was both massive and lyrical, a formidable feat, but to the credit of all concerned, the string players were not swamped and the whole was an achievement rightly given a rousing reception.

I feared that the decision to give an encore might result in anti-climax, but such was the elation within the quartet that they rounded off the evening with a triumphant flourish. More cheering.




## Why I'm running the Shrewsbury Half Marathon

Passy Goddard (G UVI) explains why she is proud to be running the Shrewsbury Half Marathon next month as part of Team Shrewsbury School, raising funds for the Restart Centre in Kenya.

Last October, Passy was one of a squad of 13 runners who took part in the Hunt's tour to Kenya and Ethiopia. In amongst their intensive training programme, a major highlight of their trip was a visit to the Restart Centre in Gilgil, which provides a safe home to just over 100 orphans and street children from the surrounding area.



"We had the opportunity to meet, play and learn with the children. Despite differences in language and culture, the sense of human connection transcended these barriers and really hit home the value of mutual human care and interaction.

Surrounded by grinning, excited children, it was too easy to forget the reason for them being there. Behind smiling eyes, each had their own tragic story; their upbringings tales of brutality, neglect and corruption. Yet, at the Restart Centre, they have been given the support, security, love and education that we so easily take for granted. Essentially a restart at life. With every contribution, Restart strives closer to making its motto a reality: "Think not what you are, but what you can become".

With this motto in mind, I will be proud to don my vest on 19th June not only to support the Restart Centre, but also to represent the School one last time. The Half Marathon will be my final race for Shrewsbury School, which I have been honoured to represent over the past two

## Sidney-Darwin Dash and Quarter-Mile Challenge 2016

Sunday 22 May 2016

Now in their sixth year, the Sidney-Darwin Dash and Quarter-Mile Challenge have rapidly established themselves as Salopian sporting traditions, with the races keenly contested and the whole School spectating after Sunday morning chapel.

The genesis of the event came when a local resident of the town contacted the School asking whether we would be interested in a silver butter dish top that she had found in her attic, presented on 17th June 1869 to a certain H. Hughes for winning the Shrewsbury School Quarter-Mile. Having gratefully received this donation, we added a rather fine plinth and silver plates and considered the idea of recreating the old 'Quarter-Mile' event. A suitable location was scouted for, with various areas around the school campus and beyond considered, but the area around Central was settled on to include a loop down past the Main School Building and around the Alington Hall. We decided, moreover, to extend the event to include a sprint, with the tree-lined avenue from the Sidney to Darwin statues providing a natural 'track' to put our speedsters to the test.

It was certainly quirky and not your average athletics event, but the first year's event was a tremendous success, with competitors and spectators relishing the uniqueness of the event and the exciting action that it generated. The trophy was won by Port Hill's Howard Stringer in a time that remains the event record, a title that he retained in his Upper Sixth year in 2012. The junior Quarter-Mile was won in that first year by Stuart Brown from The Grove, with Chike Kandi from Moser's Hall taking the winner's tankard in the newly-christened junior 'Sidney-Darwin Dash'. Howard Stringer completed an impressive 'double' in winning the senior Sidney-Darwin Dash, a feat not yet repeated by a Salopian.

As Darwin himself would have noted, the event itself has evolved over the years with the races moving to the grass of Top Common in 2015 and girls competing in both age-groups since last year, now that the School is fully co-educational. It remains an exciting and dramatic event with the School's top athletes competing for the trophies in this eagerly-awaited contest.





In the first race of the day, the Junior Boys' Quarter-Mile, fastest qualifier Harry Remnant (Ch) led from the front in a dominant display that never looked under threat, with the real battle behind him for the minor medals. Remnant's time of 55.75 was well outside the Junior record (Charlie Tait-Harris's 52.41 set in 2014) but it was a comfortable run and a well-deserved victory. Behind, Felix Kenyon-Smith (S) held off the challenge from Henry Ludlam (R) with the pair crossing the tape in 58.69 and 58.98 respectively.



The Junior Girls' Quarter-Mile saw Abi Watkinson bring home the first of The Grove's silverware in what was to prove a very successful day for the House. Her time of 71.37 was just enough to hold off Sophia Dixon (MSH) behind, who finished in 72.50, with Groveite Laura Elliot taking bronze in 72.57.





In the Senior Girls' event, The Grove secured two further medals, though neither Immie Evans nor Passi Goddard could match the powerful running of reigning champion Olivia Papaioannou (EDH). Evans (the Junior record holder with 70.07) posed an early threat to Papaioannou, with her tactics clearly focusing on staying on the shoulder of the reigning champion and this year's Huntswoman. It bodes well for the Hunt that next year's Huntswoman Immie Evans has really stepped up at this senior level and could challenge the ever-impressive Papaioannou. In the end, she couldn't match the speed of Papaioannou in the final bend, who came home powerfully to retain her title (the second Salopian to do so after Alice Sykes-Waller's victories in 2013 and 2014) in a time of 62.81, smashing Sykes-Waller's record by over a second.

Howard Stringer's 2011 record in the Senior Boys' event may not have come under threat again this year, but an incredibly exciting race saw the one-lap speedsters fighting an astonishingly dramatic race in the final Quarter-Mile event of the day. It was Sam Mitchell of Radbrook who took the surprising early lead, keen to improve on his third place from 2015. Behind, Scott Hatton (S) and Huntsman Oscar Dickins (R) hung on to his coat tails. But as they neared the final bend with just 150m to go, as anticipated, the attack came from reigning champion Charlie Tait-Harris (S). This was how he won the race in 2015, waiting until the latter stages of the race before pouncing. However, this year he had the electric pace of Fifth Former Monty Hardcastle (I) to deal with, no doubt buoyed by his performance in Thursday's heats where he emerged as fastest qualifier.



Hardcastle went early in the final, injecting astonishing pace into the final bend to go clear with just 100m to go. Tait-Harris responded and kicked, but a gap of 5m had emerged and Hardcastle didn't appear to be flagging. Indeed, he stretched clear in the home straight to the cheers of the crowd alongside the track. He crossed the line in 52.06 to take the title, the first time an Ingramite will have their name engraved on the trophy. Tait-Harris had to settle for



silver this year with a time of 54.37, though with one year left at Shrewsbury he'll no doubt be keen to exact his revenge and reclaim the trophy in his Upper Sixth year! Severn Hill also picked up the bronze medal, with Lower Sixth Former Scott Hatton holding off the late challenge from Oscar Dickins to take third with 55.25.



Into the sprints, and first up it was the Junior Boys' event. Race favourite Matt Brinkley (PH) had run the fastest time in qualifying and was in imperious form in the final, showing his lightning pace in breaking the tape in 12.06, smashing the Junior record by close to half a second. His time would have placed him joint 5th in the Senior Boys' race this year, so there is no doubting his talent. Behind, Tom Plaut brought home a fourth medal for Severn Hill with 12.19 and second place, carrying on the family tradition of sprint excellence (elder brother and last year's Head of School James Plaut holds the Senior Boys' record for the Sidney-Darwin Dash and father Michael was the man to beat in the sprints during his time at Shrewsbury). Third place was Aaron Lewis (SH) with 12.44, just ahead of Toby Pattinson (Ch) and Third Former Antoine Ceolin (Rt).



The Junior Girls' race also saw a new record with Daisy McMullen (G) lowering her Housemate Claire Richard's mark of 13.35 last year to 13.31. It was a Grove 1-2 with Laura Elliot



recovering well from the Quarter-Mile Challenge, where she had picked up the bronze, to go one better in the sprints and pick up silver with a time of 14.81. Amelie Davies (MSH) completed the podium with 14.94.

Having just seen her Junior record go in the previous race, Claire Richards marked her debut in the Senior event with an astonishing performance that saw her win by over a second and take over half a second off the record, lowering the mark to 13.04. With the sun shining and possibly the hint of a tailwind, conditions were perfect, as demonstrated by three records in the Sidney-Darwin Dash; though it is worth pausing to congratulate the Grounds staff on preparing such a fast track for the athletes.



It was another Grove 1-2 in this event, with Sally Joyce taking silver in a time of 14.19 ensuring that every one of their athletes came away with a medal, scooping up eight of the twelve available and three out of the four winner's spots. They will be hard to beat at Sports Day! The Sidney-Darwin Dash podium was completed with Nell Kirkby (MSH) taking bronze on debut in a time of 14.31.

In the final event of the day, the starting line-up was without Max Parsonage of Severn Hill, the fastest qualifier from Thursday's heats. Struggles with an injury meant he was unable to challenge for the title. With Ladi Okusanya (SH) also out injured, that opened up the event to a number of contenders in what is always a fiercely contested race. With the rousing music from 'Chariots of Fire' playing in the build-up, the crowd were ready for an explosive race – and so it proved.

Out of the blocks a strong start from Angus Drummond (O) showed his intention to challenge, though Charlie Tait-Harris (S) was determined to make up for the disappointment of the Quarter-Mile Challenge so was also up there in contention. However, a blistering second half from Nifemi Okusanya (SH) saw him push through the field in the closing metres to break the tape and take home the title with a swift 11.46. Behind, Tait-Harris picked up another silver with 11.69, and whilst he will no doubt be disappointed not to have won either title, it is a hugely impressive achievement to come away with two silvers with very little recovery time in between



the two events. Drummond just held on to take the bronze with a time of 11.88, with Ridgemount's Josh Malyon just outside the medals with 11.93.



As ever, this proved an exciting set of races, and my thanks go to all those who helped ensure the race ran smoothly: Dr Foulger and Ms Davies for taking charge of the races; the Praepostors for time-keeping and place-judging; Julian Chesshire for the music; the Headmaster for presenting the prizes; and most importantly the Groundsmen for preparing the whole event. I will be handing over the event next year to Ms Davies and look forward to seeing the event continue to make its mark. I very much hope that I can return as a 90-year-old and be wheeled out to see the event still going strong! *PJM*

Sportswoman of the Year - Olivia Papaioannou

She started her Shrewsbury career as a serious lacrosse player but wanted to further enhance her performance by improving her fitness and so joined The Hunt. From the first outing it was clear she had enormous drive and determination to improve. Her performances in The Hunt have got better and better and most recently culminated in her being crowned Northern Schools' Cross-Country Champion, taking the title at Trafford at the end of last term. Originally Shrewsbury were only going to take a boys' team to the event, but Olivia decided to get a girls' team together, managing to persuade others to come along to the race despite term having finished. It was a trip well worth making because she led the girls home to take the team title for the first time ever. Thus it was a fitting end to what has been a superb season for her.

Some of Olivia's peers have described her as an inspiration, stating that not only is she an outstanding sportswoman herself, but she also turns up to every session with good humour and so much energy that it's contagious and she carries the team. She is endlessly giving of both her time and her support and she is a great role model.

They have different strengths as sportsmen, but both fit the criteria of true hard-working and high-achieving Salopian sportsmen and therefore it is fitting that they both receive the David Spencer Award.





#### **Oscar Dickins**

has been an outstanding runner from the very outset of his Salopian career, winning the New Boys' Race in 2011. In the Fourth Form he was a member of The Hunt's silver-medal winning team at the English Schools' Cross-Country Championships. Since then he has been a dedicated and devoted senior member of The Hunt, becoming Huntsman this year and joining the tour party for the Club's trip to East Africa last October. He raced in our top squads, winning bronze medals in the 2014 and 2016 National Relays. In the last year he has perhaps achieved an unprecedented individual haul of all the major running trophies in the School, at one time holding all four at the same time: Birley Cup for Hunt Club Champion; Steeplechases Trophy; Derby Cup (historic trophy given to winner of the 1500m); and the Hector Rose Bowl for the winner of The Tucks.

Aside from his individual achievements that culminated in winning The Tucks, he also led The Hunt team to their first national title in 20 years, lifting the Knole Run trophy alongside fellow Huntsman Ben Remnant in January, the first time in more than 50 years of the competition that The Hunt have won the Knole Run. He was a pivotal member of that team where he placed 9th out of 300 runners. His dedication and commitment to preparation and training were key to The Hunt being crowned national champions in this event for the first time. Though our winner today has focussed mostly on one sport, he has committed fully to this sport across all three terms throughout his fives years at the School. He is not only a credit to himself but a credit to the School and he has been instrumental in the rise of The Hunt in the national standings.





#### **Paddy George**

is a very modest young man, who plays down his extraordinary sporting talent. However, when you look at his regular three-term commitment to rowing and achievements to date, it is clear he is a worthy winner of this award. He started rowing at the School in the Third Form under the tutelage of Mr Wilson and was selected to represent the J14A Octuple which went on to win gold at the National Schools' Regatta in 2012. In the Fourth Form he raced in the J15 VIII that won bronze at the Schools' Head and silver at National Schools'. In the Fifth Form in the J16 VIII, he helped the crew to silver at the Junior Inter Regional Regatta and won bronze medals at National Schools'.

Since then he worked extremely hard to earn his seat in the 1st VIII in the Lower Sixth and represented Wales at the Home Countries Regatta 2015. In the Upper Sixth he was made Captain of Boats and is now a key member of the 1st VIII. He won the Victoria Sculls in September 2015 and came 5th in GB trials in November. He is currently still involved in trialling for GB crews in the summer and has been selected to represent Wales for the second year running.

Paddy's commitment to his sport cannot be questioned – training six days a week, three terms a year, come rain, wind or shine. He is an extremely talented oarsmen, whose presence in the boat is felt by the power and determination with which he trains and races.

It is not just these high-profile teams that are enjoying success. The recent fixtures against Repton saw a clean sweep for Shrewsbury. "In the 2nd Edition of the *Handbook of Emotions* (2000), evolutionary psychologists Leda Cosmides and John Tooby say that happiness comes from 'encountering unexpected positive events'," Pat said.

For Dan Humes, cricket has not brought happiness lately as he has broken his thumb and is now unable to play against his brother Jamie in the Old Salopian fixture. Luckily he is acquainted with



the work of Sonja Lyubomirsky who concludes in her book *The How of Happiness* that 50% of a given human's happiness level is genetically determined (based on twin studies), 10% is affected by life circumstances and situation, and the remaining 40% of happiness is subject to self-control. "I recognise that 10% of my happiness has been affected by my injury and I am learning to cope with that," he told me.

With his classical background, I wondered just how happy Matthew Clark was. "I am very happy. Of course in the Nicomachean Ethics, written in 350 BCE, Aristotle stated that happiness (also being well and doing well) is the only thing that humans desire for its own sake, unlike riches, honour, health or friendship. Note that Eudaimonia, the term we translate as "happiness", is for Aristotle an activity such as cricket. In fact I am sure he meant cricket, rather than an emotion or a state."

So it would seem that cricket is bringing a lot of happiness to the Shrewsbury community. Even the dour, withered frames of Coaches Paul Pridgeon and Andrew Barnard are looking a little more life-like. I know that they are a very positive pair and are renowned for praising their young charges. I wondered why that was and Paul told me that "according to Mark Leary, as reported in a November 1995 issue of *Psychology Today* [a favourite read of Mr Pidgeon's] we are happiest when basking in the acceptance and praise of others". Mr Barnard added, "Sara Algoe and Jonathan Haidt say that "happiness" may be the label for a family of related emotional states, such as joy, amusement, satisfaction, gratification, euphoria, and triumph. All these emotional states can be achieved through playing good cricket."

# Cricket news update on a successful first half of term

As we reach the halfway stage of the season, our cricket teams have much to celebrate and lots to look forward in the next half of term. Here are some latest news updates from the 1st XI, U17A XI, U15A XI, U14A XI and the Girls' U15 XI.



#### 1st XI

The 1st XI have completed 10 games (having had their first 4 games cancelled due to poor weather). Despite some Arctic conditions at times, they have won 7 and lost 3 (2 to strong adult sides). A further game was abandoned due to rain with Shrewsbury well on top. In addition, they have played 4 T20 games and won them all, reaching the last 32 of the National Schools T20 cup with either Bromsgrove or RGS Worcester our likely opponents.

Only two Myerscough College batsmen reach double figures as they struggled against an accurate Shrewsbury attack and only captain George Panayi remained wicket-less. Myerscough College managed just 106, bowled out in the 33rd over.

The Myerscough College bowlers struggled with their accuracy in the first few overs, bowling with a white ball, but at the same time still managed to bowl enough unplayable deliveries to



decimate the Shrewsbury top order. George Newton, Harry Adair and Panayi all perished cheaply as the 1st XI crashed to 30/3. Charlie Byrne with 18 and Max Parsonage with 10 steadied the ship, but then 4 quick wickets went down as Shrewsbury slumped to 68/7. Head of School Tom Breese was joined by Josh Malyon (13\*) who added an unbeaten 44-run partnership to secure victory in the 26th over with Breese (26\*) hitting his 2nd enormous 6 to win over long off and in to the Fives Courts.
